Incorporation Act and Registration

The National Design Centre, which was incorporated under the National Crafts Council and Allied Institutions Act No. 35 of 1982, is a state service institution established for the development of the local handicrafts industry by taking handicraftsmen beyond the tradition for the advancement of the nation's handicrafts industry. It is operating under the Ministry of Traditional Industry & Small Enterprises Development at present.

Organization

National College of Designs, which also serves as an educational institute creating new designers through certificate and diploma courses, situated at the Head Office premises and provides youths creative talents with the opportunity to obtain vocational knowledge ranging from local level to international level.

In addition, the brass, lacquer and leather based workshop and common facility centre situated in Nattarampotha provides the handicraftsmen with ongoing services.

The National Design Centre, in its fulfilment of Objectives through its Mission driven by its Vision, implements its activities according to the Action Plan with support from the Branch Office located in Naththarampotha and direction from the Head Office. In addition to this, the guidance of the Ministry of Traditional Industries and Small Enterprise Development and the support of organisations which handle similar subjects, Provincial Councils, government and non—governmental organisations, private sector organisations engaged in handicraft industries, craftsmen and other institutions link with us in executing the above objectives of the institution.

The Head Office is assigned with the responsibility of dealing with important matters relating to the main objectives such as administration, finance, sales promotion, design development, design education, technology development as well as research and development, Common Facilities Centre and library facilities as well. The Project Office in Naththarampotha also deals with the same activities except the operation of administration, finance and sales promotion.

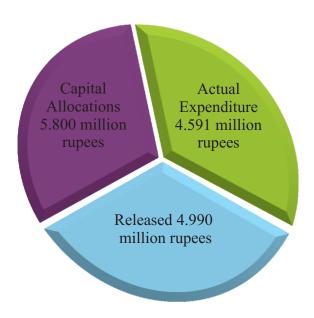

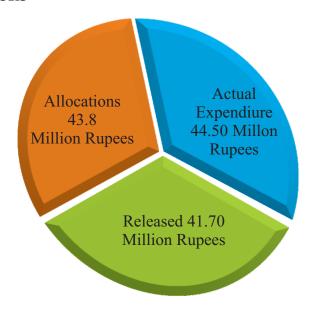

Development Activities

Planning & Development of New Creations

Planning, introduction and development of new products is a prominent task of the National Design Centre. It is essential to fulfil the important tasks of strengthening the rural handicraftsman to streamline handicraftsmen for uplifting the rural economy by introducing timely products targeting local and international market.

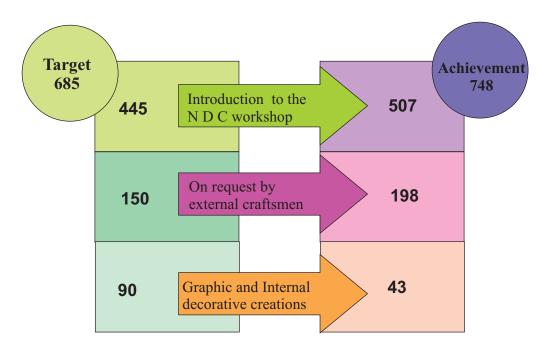
Local raw materials are used for this purpose. The National Design Centre always acts as an untiring guide for the handicraftsman to move beyong traditional products.

The National Design Centre performs the creation of new designs for all types of handicrafts in the handicrafts industry. Handicrafts based on rush & reed, red clay, coir, bamboo and cane, fabric, timber, lacquer, brass

and leather and jewellery take prominence among them.

The National Design Centre identifies new market expectations, depicts new creations displaying innovativeness through new concepts and presents them outside the norm. Also, the Centre creates new designs on the request of clients of the Centre. The National Design Centre bears the responsibility to launch new creations through the handicrafts sector in repect of souvenirs and gift items on which government's special attention is focused.

Planning and developing new designs has been done as follows in the year 2013 by keeping to targeted objectives as mentioned above as well as creating designs of high quality and seasonal demands in order to uplift the handicraftsmen and small industrialists who are engaged in the production process aiming at local and international markets:



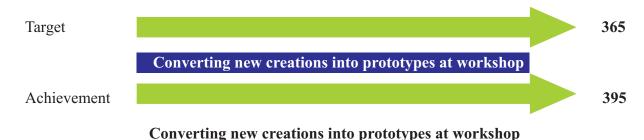
Turning New Creations into Prototypes

Creations selected from among those incorporating new design concepts are developed as prototypes by the factories located in Moratuwa and Nattarampotha. Steps are taken to manufacture through external craftsmen the products that cannot be manufactured in the workshop. As such, the annual target was planned to be met by developing 315 at the workshop and 50 through external craftsmen. Under this move, 102 brass, lacquer and leather based creations were converted to prototypes at the Nattarampotha workshop and 278 creations associated with rushes, reeds and fibers, red clay, coir, bamboo and cane, cloth (fabric) and timber were turned to prototypes at the Moratuwa Workshop.

As such, it was possible to launch 395 new

product prototypes, 380 of which were from the workshop and 15 from the external craftsmen, for the handicrafts sector in the year 2013.

Steps will be taken to introduce these prototypes to craftsmen at the development programmes conducted by the National Design Centre and through the craftsmen's training programmes conducted through Provincial Councils, the Export Development Board, the National Crafts Council and other state agencies and NGOs and to direct them to manufacture new products. Also, steps have been taken to introduce these new creations to the market largely through product exhibitions and trade fairs, through craftsmen who come to the National Design Centre to obtain services, and through training programmes for craftsmen conducted by Provincial Councils, the Export Development Board, the National Crafts Council and other state agencies and NGOs.



Launching Souvenirs through New Handicraft Creations

Compared to the last year, the field of handicrafts has grown more vibrant through the development of products and the introduction of new creative designs. The National Design Centre has performed a significant part of work in the handicrafts sector for the purpose of placing specially the rural economic sector at the foremost place of the national development programme.

Attention will be focused as to how the quantitative increase in the tourist arrivals resulted in by the massive development in the tourism industry of this country could help enhance the living conditions of local craftsmen. Souvenirs and gift items produced targeting tourists will take a prominent place in this regard.

Therefore, the National Design Centre has acted to launch new products focusing on souvenirs and gift items that showing local identity and to introduce such products to the handicraftsmen. As such, the National Design Centre has worked to create 23 souvenirs and gift items representing local style depicting places of interest such as the House of Parliament, the Temple of the Sacred Tooth and Anuradhapura for 22 such items and those depicting elephants in various postures.

Programme for the Development of New Products

The National Design Centre, which functions continuously identifying the market trends, creates new products that suit the market and capable of creating a demand in the market and works to introduce them to the market through handicraftsmen.

In this connection, the National Design Centre

implements its development programmes with a proper consciousness about its mission that should be undertaken in the field of handicrafts as envisioned in the Mahinda Chintana Vision for the Future. At the same time, the Divi Neguma Programme is a gigantic development programme that has been commenced by the Ministry of Economic Development to cover the whole island to give financial contributions in opening an effective pathway for working people. In addition, the traditional handicrafts villages development programme that was inaugurated this year is also a productive programme launched for the good of the handicrafts sector.

The National Design Centre has been able to implement awareness programmes on new creations and product development training programmes covering various Provinces, making its contribution to all these development programmes under the guidance and direction of the Ministry of Traditional Industries and Small Enterprise Development as follows:

Introducing New Creations

The National Design Centre, targeting the current market needs, plans new creations suitable to the market, makes their initial samples within its workshops, and introduces such new creations through awareness and training programmes and on the request of craftsmen who approach the Centre.

The Contribution by the National Design Centre through the Development Projects for the Upliftment of the Handicrafts Sector

Divineguma National Development Programme

This year, too, the National Design Centre, functioning with active contribution under the Divineguma National Development Programme, which was commenced in the year 2012, conducted new creations training programmes conducted in the Galle, Matara and Kalutara Districts and provided equipment and implements necessary for the beneficiaries who attended new creations training programmes conducted in the Matara, Monaragala and Jaffna Districts.

Similarly the National Design Centre displays these creations at the "Yugayata Nimawum" annual exhibition, "Shilpa" national exhibition and other exhibitions in which it participates.

As such, the National Design Centre was able to present 380 new creations within the year 2013 to the handicrafts sector although the Centre had only targeted 315.

<u>Traditional Handicraft Villages</u> <u>Development Programme</u>

A bigger part for the Traditional Handicraft Villages Development Programme, on which awareness and data collection tasks were performed in the villages shown in the table below in the year 2012 under the allocations from the Ministry of Traditional Industries and Small Enterprise Development, was implemented during this year. Under this Programme, the National Design Centre took steps to conduct new creations technical development training programmes, introduce new creations suitable to the current market and build market links.

Market Links Building Programme Conducted by the National Design Centre in collaboration with the UNDP for Handicraftsmen in the Northern Province

New Design Development and New Technology Practical Training Programme

The National Design Centre, in collaboration with and funded by the UNDP, took steps to conduct new creations development training programmes for both trained and trainee youth groups and women engaged in handicrafts sector within the Jaffna, Mulativu and Kilinochchi Districts and to lead them to markets through new creations with a view to providing all handicraftsmen with innovative craftsmanship training throughout the Northern Province to provide the consultancy, technical knowhow and support necessary to launch innovative and quality products so that they

Yugayata Nimavum Innovative handicrafts Exhibition

The Yugayata Nimavum New Creations Handicrafts Exhibition was held from 15th to 18th of August, 2013 at the Sirimavo Bandaranaike Exhibition Centre parallel to the Shilpa 2013 National Exhibition for the purpose of launching new creations of the National Design Centre. More than 350 new creations were exhibited and introduced to craftsmen at the exhibition. It enabled the building of market

could carry out promotion to suit the local and international market trends for the purpose of encouraging production activities in the sectors that are mainly based on the handicrafts sector and rural industries and resuscitating the handicraftsmen who have been affected by the past war menace of 30 years.

Implementation of the new creations development programme, which is the second phase of this project, was commenced in January 2013 and six 5-day training programmes were completed. In addition, craftsmen were directed to the exhibition organized by the Ministry of Traditional Industries and Small Enterprise Development side by side with Fiest of the Nallur Kovil and the JITF International Trade Fair held in Jaffna since 18 January 2013 and opportunity was given for them to sell their procucts through the trade stalls at the exhibition. At the same time, activities such as market research, providing sales opportunities and local market opportunities etc were carried out through this project.

links and conducting a **sales promotion programme** by providing trade stalls for 20 craftsmen and they were given the opportunity to sell the products introduced by the National Design Centre and produced by these craftsmen.

Awareness was created on the new creations by printing a Handbook on New Creations containing 100 selected products and distributing it among the craftsmen who came to the exhibition, to buyers and to those who show an interest in the handicrafts sector.

SHILPA 2013 Exhibition

Under the pre-exhibition duties of this exhibition, which was organized by the National Design Centre under the consultancy of the Ministry of Traditional Industries and Small Enterprise Development, the National Design Centre made its contribution in respect of all awareness programmes conducted for handicraftsmen and provided consultancy on new creations. In addition, the "Yugayata Nimawum" exhibition, which was conducted to launch new creations of the National Design Centre, was also conducted side by side with the SHILPA 2013 Exhibition.

Devata Kirula National Exhibition

During the ten days in which this exhibitions was held under the Ministry of Traditional Industries and Small Enterprise Development, an exhibition stall was maintained to bring to limelight the new creations of the National Design Centre and awareness was raised in those interested in handicrafts while services were provided.

In addition, a programme was implemented to introduce new creation concepts to schoolchildren in the Ampara District, who were directed to produce new creations targeting this exhibition. 431 students were included in this process and new creations from among the ones they produced were exhibited at the exhibition with a competitive element and prizes and certificates were handed out for winning entries.

Contribution to Other Exhibitions

Entrepreneurship Exhibitions

At this Exhibition, which was organized by the Small Enterprises Development Division of the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Skills Development and held at the exhibition premises of the Bandaranaike International Memorial Conference Hall for three days, the National Design Centre maintained an exhibition stall and enlightened viewers on the services of the National Design Centre and its services.

Wayamba Mal Dakma Floral Exhibition

The National Design Centre maintained an exhibition stall for four days at this exhibition and awareness was raised on the new creations and the services of the National Design Centre.

Bingiriya Flora Springtide Exhibition – The National Design Centre contributed to this Exhibition, which was organized by the Export Development Board and held for four days, by running a stall for new creations.

The National Design Centre contributed to the exhibition styled "Reflections of 2013" held side by side with the Commonwealth Heads of Governments Meeting (CHOGM) from 13th to 17th by keeping an attractive exhibition stall and designing and presenting a File Bag made using jute.

Importance of Innovative Concepts for Entrepreneurship Development – The awareness seminar organized by the National Design Centre under the above topic was conducted at the Industrial Development Board auditorium on 25 July 2013 with the participation of 32 enthusiasts.

Marketing Research Programme

Under the marketing programme commenced in collaboration with the Sri Lanka Handicrafts Board, the National Design Centre implemented a marketing research programme for its new creations and coordinated the channeling of orders received through it to handicraftsmen and to the market in turn, which gives the opportunity to uplift the economy of handicraftsmen.

Providing Library Services and Information

Steps were taken to develop the library by purchasing books through the capital allocations provided for the libraries situated in the Katubedda Head Office premises and the Naththarampotha branch office. Library and information services were provided to 168 handicraftsmen and enthusiasts and also images of creations needed by them were photocopied from books for them.

28 students joined the above course during the year under review.

Higher National Diploma in Design (2011-2013 Weekdays Course

Nine students joined this course during the year 2011.

National Diploma in Interior Design (2011-2013 Weekend Course)

Five students joined this course.

Website of the National Design Centre

The website of the National Design Centre was launched in 2012. Action has been taken to introduce 167 new designs by posting in the website. During the year, 2990 log-ins have been recorded.

Services by the National Design Centre

In the year 2013, the National Design Centre has provided services to 2509 individuals, which included conducting new creations awareness and practical training programmes, providing orders and sales opportunities, information on market, craftsmen and the field, training at the workshop of the Centre, common facilities, designs including graphics on request and

library services, and carrying out sales promotion and market research programmes.

In addition, 812 persons including university students and schoolchildren interested in or studying the handicrafts sector, have benefited from have benefited from awareness activities or information provided.

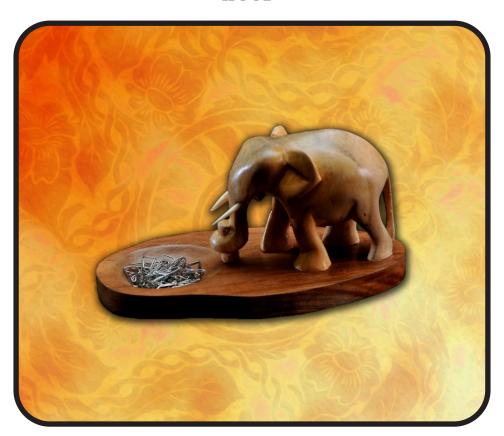

Inventories are valued at the lower of the cost and the net realizable value. Issue of stocks have been carried out on a first in and first out basis.

- 6. Events after the Balance Sheet
 - Adjustments have been made in respect of all events recognized after the date of the Balance Sheet.
- 7. Common Facility Centre, machinery, equipment, tools and implements have been revalued on market value.
- 8. As the Department of Small Industries has not formally transferred the lands in the possession of the Centre in favour of the Centre, the values of the lands in which the Head Office and the Naththarampotha branch are located have not been included in the financial statements.

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the National Design Centre for the year ended 31 December 2013 in terms of the Section 14(2)(c) of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971

The audit of financial statements of the National Design Centre for the year ended 31 December 2013 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2013 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Section 13(1) of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 and Section 84(3) of the Affiliated Crafts Councils Act, No.35 of 1982. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the Centre in terms of Section 14(2)(c) of the Finance Act appear in this report. A detailed report in terms of Section 13(7)(a) of the Finance Act was furnished to the Chairman of the Centre on 23 June 2014.

1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.

1.3 Auditor's Responsibility

My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000 – 1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the Centre's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Centre's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Sub-sections (3) and (4) of Section 13 of the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971 give discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

1.4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My Opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.

2. Financial Statements

2.1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the National Design Centre as at 31 December 2013 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

Comments on Financial Statements Statements Statements Statements Statements Statements

The following observations are made.

- (a) Credit balances amounting to Rs.2,079,398 consisting of accrued expenses amounting to Rs.751,823, creditors balances amounting to Rs.893,220 and balances in suspense amounting to Rs.434,307 and debit balances amounting to Rs.2,230,700 consisting of debtors balances amounting to Rs.1,223,410, advances amounting to Rs.644,453 and balances receivable amounting to Rs.362,856 relating to preceding years had been adjusted to the Accumulated Fund as at the end of the year under review without being brought to account as restatements according to the retrospective applications or retrospective effects.
- (b) Even though depreciating an asset commences from the date on which it is made fit for use, according to the accounting policy of the Centre, assets are not depreciated in the year of purchase and as such the provisions for depreciation had been understated.

2.2.2 Accounting Deficiencies

Provision had not been made for the audit fees payable for preceding years amounting to Rs.533,900 and the audit fees payable for the year under review.

2.2.3 Unreconciled Control Accounts

The following observations are made.

(a) A difference of Rs.7,482,770 existed in relation to 04 Fixed Assets Accounts according to the accounts and the Verification Reports and the reasons for the difference had not been furnished to audit.

- (b) A difference of Rs.31,781 was revealed between the balance of the staff loans and the Individual Loan Accounts as at 31 December 2013.
- (c) Even though the value of motor vehicles had been shown as Rs.21,895,563 in the financial statements, the value thereof according to the Reports of the Board of Survey amounted to Rs.19,915,471. As such a difference of Rs.1,080,092 existed.

2.2.4 Transactions not Supported by Adequate Authority

Debtors balances totaling Rs.1,734,890 and creditors balances totaling Rs.1,103,346 brought forward over a long period had been treated as balances that cannot be identified and written off from the books in the year under review without formal authority.

2.3 Account Balances Receivable and Payable

The following observations are made.

- (a) According to the financial statements presented by the Centre, the total of the Trade and Other Accounts Receivable for the year under review amounted to Rs.6,532,740 and a sum of Rs.233,255 had been balances older than 05 years.
- (b) The Trade and other Accounts Payable of the Centre for the year under review totaled Rs.505,398 and a sum of Rs.290,398 out of that had been balances older than 05 years.

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2.4 Non-compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions

The following non-compliances were observed.

Reference to Laws, Rules, Regulations, Non-compliance etc.,

(a) Establishments Code of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka Chapter XIV Section 28

Reimbursement of travelling expenses should be obtained by submitting an application within 30 days after the completion of duty travel and a surcharge should be imposed on applications not complying with the requirement. Nevertheless, a travelling claim totaling Rs.12,379 delayed for more than 03 months had been treated as a special case and paid without imposing the surcharge.

- (b) Financial Regulation 396 of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka
- Action in terms of the Financial Regulation had not been taken on 03 cheques totaling Rs.5,286 deposited but not realized.
- (c) Treasury Circular No. 842 of 19 December 1978
- A Register of Fixed Assets had not been maintained for buildings valued at Rs.19,842,682.

3. Financial Review

3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented for the year under review, the overall working of the Centre had resulted in a surplus of Rs.3,157,429 as against the deficit of Rs.6,513,683 for the preceding year, thus indicating an improvement of Rs.9,671,112 in the financial results. The increase of the recurrent grants and capital received from the Treasury as compared with the preceding year, by Rs.5,348,200 and Rs.2,172,637 respectively had been the main reasons for the improvement of the financial results.

4. Operating Review

4.1 Performance

The following observations are made.

(a) The Centre has 10 designers and each designer had been given a target of making 05 designs per month. Out of the 705 designs completed during the year under review, 507 had been issued to the workshop while 198 had been issued to external designers. A methodology had not been introduced to take follow up action in connection with implementation of programmes to popularize the designs among the craftsmen. The measurement of the extent of productivity accruing to the country from the new designs had become problematic.

(b) Physical Progress

Out of the 03 courses planned to be conducted in the year under review, 02 courses had not been conducted. The new designs presented under providing market facilities for new designs had achieved only about 58 per cent while the handicraft designs and the designers had not been done as planned. Out of the targets set for the supply of designs advisory services only 50 per cent had been achieved. As such, out of the total of 05 programmes targeted in the Annual Action Plan, the expected targets of 03 programmes had not been achieved.

4.2 Management Inefficiencies

The following observations are made.

(a) New Showroom - Battaramulla

Even though one of the primary objectives of the Centre is the popularization of new designs, the new showroom at Battaramulla had been opened on 28 November 2011 by spending a sum of Rs.2,853,627. As the showroom had been closed down from the preceding year, the goods valued at Rs.998,400 from a private institution received in the year 2011 and 338 design samples valued at Rs.250,024 sent by the Nattarampotha Branch had been stacked in different places in the Head Office. Those goods remained idle without being used even by 30 May 2014. The expected objectives had not been achieved.

(b) Construction of Chicken Pens Under the Divineguma National Project

Contrary to the objectives of the Centre and on the instructions of the Ministry of Economic Development and the Line Ministry an agreement had been entered into with a supplier in Kandy for the construction and supply of 67 chicken pots valued at Rs.2,074,474. Accordingly, 15 model chicken pots had been constructed, but the Centre had not taken action for the takeover of those chicken pots. The contractor had sent a letter of demand to the Centre informing that Court action will be taken for the loss of Rs.3,621,895 incurred in this connection.

4.3 Idle and Underutilised Assets

The following observations are made.

(a) Even though the Centre and the Sri Lanka Tourism Development Authority had jointly constructed a common facilities centre and a rest room at the Nattarampotha Kalapura and purchased machinery for the Centre at a cost of Rs.68,470,615 and handed over to Crafts Society, those remained idle without being used over a period of 04 years.

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- (b) Even though a sum of Rs.1,008,576 had been spent on the construction of the car park, playground and the Parapet Wall of the Common Facilities Centre of the Kalapura Village, those remained idle without being used for any purpose. Even though 20 feet of the Parapet Wall constructed near the car park and the playground had broken down over 04 years ago, action had not been taken to repair the wall.
- (c) As an officer had not been appointed to the laboratory of the Nattarampotha Branch, 79 inventory goods valued at Rs.145,089 and 48 kinds of chemicals valued at Rs.47,074 remained idle from the beginning of the year 2010 up to the end of the year 2013.

4.4 Staff Administration

A reconciliation of the approved and the actual staff of the Centre as at 31 December 2013 revealed 05 excess staff and 36 vacancies and the Centre had failed to fill those vacancies six non-substitute employees not belonging to the approved staff deployed in service had been paid a sum of Rs.1,930,500 as salaries and allowances during the year under review.

5. Accountability and Good Governance

5.1 Action Plan

Even though an Action Plan had been prepared, the Centre had failed to implement several targeted training programmes during the year under review.

5.2 Budgetary Control

Variances ranging from 12 per cent to 100 per cent were observed between the budgeted and the actual income and expenditure, thus indicating that the benefit had not been made use of as an effective instrument of financial control.

Systems and Controls

Deficiencies in systems and controls observed during the course of audit were brought to the notice of the Chairman of the Centre, from time to time. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of control.

- (a) Accounting
- (b) Fixed Assets
- (c) Financial Control
