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## Part I – General

#### Message of the Vice-Chancellor

The year 2016 was a year of strengthening and consolidation of teaching and research for the University of Ruhuna. The university improved its position while contributing significantly in the fields of knowledge creation and dissemination. All the academic and administrative programmes of the university were launched as scheduled while reaching its goals through improving the quality and relevance of its educational and research programmes.

During the year, curricula of the certain degree programmes were revised to ensure more recognition to the graduate programmes of the university. Faculties of Agriculture, Engineering, Management and Finance and Science organized international symposia contributing to the productive expansion of knowledge in addition to the national and student research symposia.

The infrastructure development has also been taken place prominently during the year with the formation of number of buildings and other physical structures.

Two main academic events of the university namely, the General Convocation and the Annual Academic Sessions and the Vice Chancellor's Award Ceremony were held as scheduled.

The first batch of the Faculty of Agriculture after introducing three degree programmes was graduated in the year 2016. IESL (Institution of Engineers, Sri Lanka) has granted full accreditation for the B.Sc.Eng. degree programmes specialized in Civil and Environmental Engineering and, Electrical and Information Engineering for the period of 2016 to 2020. Accordingly, these degree programmes are

recognized in all Washington Accord signatory countries.

The Faculty of Technology was officially established in 2016 and it has planned to offer two degree programmes for the first batch of students to be enrolled in 2017 namely, Bachelor of Engineering Technology (BET) focusing on Electromechanical Technology and Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology (BICT) focusing on Application Development.

All supporting units of the university including Centre for International Affairs, Medical Center, Career Guidance Unit, Center for Modern Languages and Civilization, Physical Education Unit, General Administration and Legal and Documentation division provided their services positively for smooth running of the operations of the university.

As a leading national university of Sri Lanka, University of Ruhuna strives to provide the best learning environment in order to achieve international standards and provide accredited academic programmes. The university has already started on a radical shake up in various fields to keep face with rapid changes in society and the labor market which needs national graduates capable of taking responsibility.



#### Scholarships other than Mahapola & Bursary

#### Faculty of Engineering

Through the arrangements made by University, two students received Jayamini Samaraweera scholarships each worth of Rs. 2,500.00 per month for 10 months and two students received Ensina Wickramasekara scholarship of Rs. 500/= per month for 12 months. One student received Chandrapala Weerakoon scholarship of Rs. 1,000/- per month for 12 months.

## Part IV - Reports of Faculties

#### **Faculty of Agriculture**

#### **Dean's Statement/Review**

We have risen above the challenges we faced in the year 2016 in several areas and emerged stronger, building new successes with advanced teaching and research programs while successful in community services. The first batch of students from all 3 degree programs graduated in the year 2016. #### **Faculty of Engineering**

#### **Dean's Statement/Review**

The Faculty of Engineering functioned smoothly during the year 2016 under the leadership of Dr. P.D.C. Perera who has been serving as the Dean since 1st January 2013.

The 3<sup>rd</sup> Annual Research Symposium (ARS - 2016) of the Faculty was held successfully on 14th January, 2016 at the Faculty of Engineering. This annually organized symposium aims at sharing the research outcomes of the academic staff, students and prominent researchers in various organizations. Undergraduate Research Symposium on 'Recent Advances in Civil Engineering' was organized by the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering for the 5<sup>th</sup> time. The symposium was held on 5<sup>th</sup> January 2016 at the Faculty of Engineering. 4th International Symposium on "Advances for Civil and **Environmental Engineering Practices for Sustainable** Development (ACEPS – 2016)" was held on 3rd March, 2016 at the Faculty of Engineering with the participation of foreign and local delegates. 8<sup>th</sup> IEEE International Conference on Information and Automation for Sustainability - 2016 (IEEE ICIAfS2016) was held at the Faculty premises from 16<sup>th</sup> – 19<sup>th</sup> December, 2016. It was the largest international conference held in the Faculty and participants from 18 countries presented their research papers.

The 17<sup>th</sup> batch of students with 222 students was admitted to the Faculty of Engineering on 7<sup>th</sup> January, 2016. The Development Programme was started on 11<sup>th</sup> January, 2016 and their first semester Academic programme was started on 28<sup>th</sup> March, 2016. The 18<sup>th</sup> batch of students with 219 students was admitted to the Faculty on 24<sup>th</sup> November, 2016.

With the funds received from previous year, 100-room hostel building (Phase II) was completed and it was opened on 24<sup>th</sup> October, 2016. As a result, now, the Faculty can provide hostel facilities to all students if needed. Construction of two blocks of academic quarters consisting of eight apartments and the renovation of the existing quarters of the Faculty were completed in this year. Also, Faculty received

special UGC grant worth of Rs. 200 M to upgrade the laboratories.

The Engineering Education Center of the Faculty arranged three months industrial training for 4<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> year Engineering undergraduates at various industries in Sri Lanka with the support of National Apprentice and Industrial Training Authority. Surveying Work camp for 15<sup>th</sup> batch of students in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering was organized from 25<sup>th</sup> July to 6<sup>th</sup> August 2016 at Wellawaya.

IESL (Institution of Engineers, Sri Lanka) has granted full accreditation for the B.Sc.Eng. degree programmes specialized in Civil and Environmental Engineering and, Electrical and Information Engineering for the period of 2016 to 2020. Accordingly, these degree programmes are recognized in all Washington Accord signatory countries (Presently, there are 18 countries).

Accreditation evaluation for B.Sc.Eng. degree programme specialized in Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering has been conducted and the results are pending.

A proposal for the B.Sc.Eng. degree specialized in Marine Engineering and Naval Architecture was submitted for approval. Moreover, a proposal to increase the intake of students by 25 was also submitted.

Students' Union of the Faculty under the guidance of the Faculty staff organized several activities such as new-year festival, cricket, badminton and volleyball tournaments, musical programs, annual farewell and Christmas Carol programme, during the year 2016. Thambarawilla — 2016, the talents show of the undergraduate students was held on 17<sup>th</sup> September, 2016 at the auditorium of the Medical Faculty. Inter-Faculty Orator Competition-2016 was organized by the Faculty of Engineering and it was successfully held on 22<sup>nd</sup> June, 2016 at the Faculty Auditorium. A religious activity related to *Katina Pooja Pinkama* was held on 26<sup>th</sup> and 27<sup>th</sup> October, 2016 with the

participation of the academic staff, non academic staff, students and the villagers from Hapugala area.

The XBOTIX 2016, a Robotics Competition, was organized by the Electrical and Information Engineering Society (EIES) collaboration with IEEE student chapter, IET Ruhuna Chapter and Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering Society. University undergraduates and students from the schools took part in this competition which was held at the Faculty on 19<sup>th</sup> October, 2016.

Faculty participated the "Techno 2016", National Engineering and Technology Exhibition held at BMICH in October 2016. In this exhibition, Faculty's stall won the Silver award for the Best Display with University Projects. In parallel to the exhibition, there were several competitions were held for the Engineering undergraduates. The students of the Faculty have

actively participated for those competitions and won the 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> places in the CAD Eager Competition (For Mechanical Engineering students), 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> places in the Spaghetti Bridge Competition (For Civil Engineering students). In addition, Faculty won the 1<sup>st</sup> place in the National Competition on Concrete Mix Design organized by Siam City Cement (Lanka) Ltd for Civil Engineering students.

Faculty has also actively participated in the Ruhuna University's Inter-Faculty Literacy and Dancing Competition – 2016 which was sponsored by the Indian High Commission in Sri Lanka. ### Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology

### **Dean's Statement/Review**

Year 2015 is the 10<sup>th</sup> year of the faculty of Fisheries and Marine Science & Technology which was established in year 2005. So far the faculty has produced five batches of graduates specialized in the field of fisheries, aquaculture, Oceanography and Marine Geology. At the beginning of 2015, the faculty changed its location in the new permanent building at wellamadama premises at the first time after ten years of period locating at the faculty complex building of the faculty of Science. New location was FMST new Building phase-1 which is about 500 m<sup>2</sup> building containing, Deans office three lecture halls three laboratories, reading room, auditorium and museum. At the same year faculty also got the opportunity of begin the construction of building project phase -II of the faculty. Considering the requirements faculty introduced two new course modules for level IV undergraduate and updated eight course modules. By understanding the future

requirement of the country faculty of FMST also submitted Full curriculum for the new degree programme on B.Sc in Marine and Freshwater Science special honors degree programme to UGC approval. Moreover, Faculty also submitted proposal for changing the name of the department of Limnology to Department of Limnology and water technology. Department of Limnology recruited a ph.D holder for the post of Senior lecture (grade II). Faculty members has published 4 international indexed journal papers, 2 non-indexed papers, more than 15 abstract. Moreover faculty members also have involving in social service activities and developed relations with other institutes such as Geological survey and mines bureau, Marine Pollution Prevention Authority etc. In addition to that faculty members also have worked in special committees assigned for different types purposes within and outside of the university.

In addition to those the faculty comprised of an English Language Teaching Unit, Information Technology Unit, Center for Modern Language & Civilizations and Center for Conflict Studies. The faculty conducts undergraduate programs leading to the Bachelor of Arts general and special degree in twelve disciplines under semester based course unit system. The scope of teaching and research of the faculty is also extended to offer postgraduate study programs such as MA., MPhil. and PhD etc. The faculty also conducts number of external degree, diploma and certificate level programs to meet the needs of the community.

The faculty is striving to make the full use of resources available to restore and foster the past glory and to enhance the historical social image of the country. Specifically, it contributes to develop economic and social sphere of the southern province. The faculty of Humanities & Social Sciences grooms the students for a professional life by providing them

with a broad understanding of the traditions that operate in a wide range of humanistic and social science disciplines.

During the year 2016, the faculty introduced English and ICT subjects for general degree students. The Department of Geography and Economics started to offer special degree programs in English medium. The Department of Sinhala introduced new course unit for special degree students in Geography. The Faculty conducted one international conference and over 70 local and international authors presented papers. Furthermore, the faculty could conduct a students' session for the first time and more than 70 students who are following degree programs in the national universities presented papers. The Department of Geography introduced a certificate course for external students and the curriculum was developed to introduce English and ICT for BA (External) degree students. The English extension courses and postgraduate degree programs were aligned to the SLQF. The Department of History & Archaeology and Geography conducted teachers training programs and around 300 teachers were trained.

## **Faculty of Science**

## **Dean's Statement/Review**

Faculty of Science offers general and special degree programmes in Physical Science, Biological Science and Computer Science. The Faculty consists of six departments in the subject areas of Botany, Chemistry, Computer Science, Mathematics, Physics and Zoology.

The faculty provided the building area that was used by the Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Sciences & Technology to the Faculty of Technology for the commencement of their work for starting the first academic year of the Faculty of Technology. This facility was provided until the Faculty of Technology moves into the Kamburupitiya site where new buildings are being built for the faculty.

The faculty has been developing new curriculum so that students get the opportunities of following different subject streams. These subject streams will be providing opportunities for students to complete four year Bachelor of Science Honours Degree programmes with three core subjects or two major subjects. Faculty submitted the proposal for the approval of the UGC and the UGC recommended to submit 8 applications to distinguish 8 degree qualifications that were listed within the proposal. The Faculty submitted 8 applications for the review process through the Internal Quality Assurance Unit (IQUA) in order to obtain reviews from subject

experts before the applications are submitted to the UGC.

The Department of Mathematics submitted a proposal for offering a new Bachelor of Science (honours) Degree program in Financial Mathematics and Industrial Statistics for the review process through the IQUA of the university before submitting the proposal to UGC.

Faculty successfully held the 3<sup>rd</sup> Ruhuna International Science and Technology Conference. Members of the faculty published their research findings in local and international research conferences and journals.

Many number of academic staff members of the faculty received a number of research/travel grants and awards from University, National Research Council, National Science Foundation and foreign universities and entities.

In addition to that faculty members worked in special committees for different types of purposes within and outside of the university.

## Faculty of Technology

## **Dean's Statement/Review**

The Faculty of Technology was officially established under the gazette notification issued on 26.04.2016 with four Departments, namely, Engineering Technology, Information and Communication Technology, Biosystems Technology Multidisciplinary Studies. The Faculty will be located at Karagoda Uyangoda, Kamburupitiya, close to the Faculty of Agriculture. The foundation laying ceremony for the main building for laboratories and two student hostels were held on Nov. 02<sup>nd</sup> 2016 with the participation of the Hon. Lakshman Kiriella, Minister of Higher Education and Highways and the construction work continues. The first phase of the building and the hostels are expected to be completed by the end of 2017. Until then the classes will be conducted at the premises of Faculty of Science, Wellamadama. Some of the buildings available at the new site have been renovated and some are in the process of renovating.

The Faculty has planned to offer two degree programmes for the first batch of students to be enrolled on 02<sup>nd</sup> January, 2017, namely, Bachelor of Engineering Technology (BET) Electromechanical Technology and Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology (BICT) focusing on Application Development. BET and BICT degree programmes have been constructed to satisfy the accreditation guidelines of Sydney Accord as well as Institute of Engineers, Sri Lanka (IESL) and Computer Society of Sri Lanka (CSSL), respectively. The Faculty plans to produce internationally accredited Technologists. The Department of Multidisciplinary Studies will offer additional Complementary Subjects, which are required for carrier development as well as for the accreditation. The Bachelor of Biosystems Technology degree

programme, expected to be offered from the second batch of students entering in 2017, is in preparation. The student intake will be 75 (+11 on the request of UGC) and 50 for BET and BICT degree programmes respectively in the first year and another 50 students will be admitted from the second batch for the Bachelor of Biosystems Technology degree programme.

Dr. K.G.S. Harshadewa Gunawardana, Mr. Aruna Loresuhewa and Prof. E.P.S. Chandana have been appointed as the Heads of the Departments of Engineering Technology, ICT and Biosystems Technology. Senior Prof. W.G.D. Dharmaratna, who was appointed as the Head of the Department of Multidisciplinary Studies was elected as the first Dean of the Faculty at the Special Faculty Board Meeting held on XXXXX, which was chaired by the Vice Chancellor. Subsequently Prof. W.G.D. Dharmaratna was appointed as the Acting Head of the Dept. of Multidisciplinary Studies. Three Senior Lecturers and one Probationary Lecturer in the department of Engineering Technology and one Senior Lecturer and Two probationary lecturers in the Department of ICT were appointed and necessary actions have been taken to fill the remaining four academic cadre positions in January 2017. Assistant Registrar and Assistant Bursar positions have been filled. Three Technical Officer Positions have been filled on assignment basis with experienced retired Technical Officers of the University. Three labourer positions also have been filled. All required laboratory equipment, furniture, computers and Library books for the first Semester have been purchased and both departments were well prepared to admit the first batch of student in Jan. 2016.

Accordingly the Total enrolment of postgraduate students in the Faculty of Graduate Studies in the year 2016 was 639.

In the year 2016, 131 students completed their postgraduate studies and became eligible to be graduate at the next convocation. Among them 21 are Research Degree students.

The Faculty of Graduate Studies proposed to start two new Master degree programs as Master Business Management (MBM) and MA in Development planning. At the moment the proposals are under review of the UGC for final approval.

Furthermore, the FGS started 'progress review sessions for postgraduate studies' in 2016, as a way to minimize stagnation of studies & motivate candidates to complete their research degree program.

At the same time, some promising steps to motivate students in Master degree programs to complete their research projects on time also has been taken. eg. introduction of registration renewal fee for candidates who failed to complete the study in time.

A new by-law, as a common by-law for all the Master degree programs, was established in 2016.

The total earnings and expenditure during the year 2016 are Rs. 22,274,151.00 and Rs. 8,646,867.88 respectively. According to that, Rs. 13,627,283.12 is remaining as the balance (Table - 03).



Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Ruhuna for the year ended 31 December 2016 in terms of the Sub-section 108 (1) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978

The audit of Financial Statements of University of Ruhuna for the year ended 31 December 2016 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2016 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended and a summary of significant accounting policies and other explanatory information, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154(1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with Sub-section 107(5) of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978. My comments and observations which I consider should be published with the Annual Report of the University in terms of Sub-section 108(1) of the Universities Act appear in this report. A detailed report in terms of Sub-section 108(2) of the Universities Act was issued to the Vice Chancellor of the University on 01 August 2017.

# 1.2 Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these Financial Statements in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards and for such internal control as the management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatements whether due to fraud or error.



# 1.3 Auditor's Responsibility


My responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on my audit. I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards consistent with International Standards of Supreme Audit Institutions (ISSAI 1000 - 1810). Those Standards require that I comply with ethical requirements and plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatements.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the University's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of financial statements. Section III of the Universities Act, No. 16 of 1978 give discretionary powers to the Auditor General to determine the scope and extent of the audit.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my audit opinion.

### 1.4 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report.



## 2. Financial Statements

## 2.1 Qualified Opinion

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in paragraph 2.2 of this report the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University of Ruhuna as at 31 December 2016 and its financial performance and cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

# 2.2 Comments on Financial Statements

#### 2.2.1 Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards

## (a) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 01

In terms of Paragraphs 49 of the standard, assets and liabilities and revenue and expenses are reported separately. Nevertheless, expenses incurred on 33 external courses conducted by the University totalling Rs.63,666,218 had not been separately reported or disclosed on notes in the statement of financial performance.

## (b) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 02

As stated in Paragraph 59 of the standard, the amount of significant cash and cash equivalent balances held by the University that are not available for use by the objectives of the University, together with a commentary by management should be disclosed in the notes to the financial statements. However, action had not been taken accordingly in respect of 4 account balances totalling Rs.25,292,048 which could not be used for the affairs of the University.



# (c) Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard 07

Assets and the value of constructions totalling Rs. 123,325,853 granted to the University by the Higher Education for 21 Century Project (HETC) had not been shown in the financial statements.

## 2.2.2 Accounting Policies

Although it was the accounting policy that fees charged from the foreign students studied in the Faculty of Medicine had been recognized as revenue up to the previous year, the total amount recovered in the year under review amounting to Rs.32,937,524 had not been taken to revenue and a sum of Rs.25,969,844 thereof had been credited to a fund named as "Foreign Graduate Fund" and as such the deficit of the year under review had been overstated by that amount.

## 2.2.3 Accounting Deficiencies


Incidental expenses of Rs.113,461 paid to 5 officers for the participation of a foreign workshop, had been debited to project advance account without being debited to the project expenditure account in terms of Circular No.01/2010/01 dated 11 October 2010 of the Ministry of Finance and Planning.

## 2.2.4 Unexplained Differences

Differences totalling Rs.1,376,237 were observed between the balances of 5 items of accounts included in the financial statements and the balances shown in the related schedules and records.

### 2.2.5 Lack of Evidence for Audit

Evidence indicated against the following items of accounts was not made available for audit.



# 2.3 Accounts Receivable and Payable

- (a) A total sum of Rs.22,640,929 was due from 18 lecturers by the end of the year under review who had breached agreements and bonds signed with the University in proceeding abroad on study leave remained unrecovered for periods from 1 to 15 years.
- (b) Due to non-receipt of goods ordered from foreign countries in 22 instances during the period 1990 to 1998, a balance of Rs.648,708 deposited in the Bank of Ceylon Margin Account had existed for periods from 19 to 27 years without taking action to settle it even by the end of the year under review.
- (c) Advances totalling Rs.982,648, consisting of research advances of Rs.427,580, project advances of Rs.15,000 external fund advances of Rs.365,168 sundry advances of Rs.174,900 had not been settled even up to 30 April 2017.



(d) Action had not been taken even during the year under review to return a sum of Rs.630,000 to the University Grants Commission received from the Presidential Scholarship Fund for 2 foreign students who had drop out of the courses in the year 2014.

#### 2.4 Non-compliance with Laws, Rules, Regulations and Management Decisions

The following non-compliance were observed in audit.


Action in terms of financial regulation had not been taken in respect of 22 cheques totalling Rs.491,186 relating to 4 bank current accounts issued but not presented for payment for more than 6 months.

Financial Regulation 772 (ii)

Any course of action whatsoever had not been taken in respect of various stock items valued at Rs.109,190 existed in the stores of the Faculty of Agriculture, remained unutilized for a long period even by 28 February 2017.


Sections 3.1 and 3.2 of Chapter XX of Although arrival and departure of officers should be recorded in the Attendance Register or Finger print machines, a sum of Rs.1,250,757,803 had been paid to 512 academic staff in the year under review salaries and allowances without ensuring their arrival and departure.

- All money received from persons who had breaches agreements and bonds should be invested in an interests bearing investment such as fixed deposits/ Treasury Bills. However, out of a sum of Rs.66,755,067 recovered up to the end of the year under review, only a sum of Rs.13,000,000 had been invested.
- The interest of Rs.1,283,507 (ii) earned from investments made in a prior year had been utilized for activities of the another University deviating the purposes stated in that circular.



## 3. Financial Review

#### 3.1 Financial Results

According to the financial statements presented, the operation of the University for the year ended 31 December 2016 had resulted in a deficit of Rs.76,040,266 as against the surplus of Rs.29,901,759 in the financial results for the preceding year, thus indicating a deterioration of Rs.105,941,965 in the financial results as compared with the preceding year. Even though, the government grants for recurrent expenditure had increased by Rs.103,356,340 increase in employees remuneration by Rs.203,916,706 had mainly attributed to this deterioration.

In analyzing the financial result for the year under review and the preceding 04 years, deficits in the years 2012, 2013 and 2014 and a surplus in the year 2015 and again a deficit in the year 2016 were indicated. However, when the employees remuneration, taxes and depreciation on non-current assets had been re-adjusted to the financial results, the contribution had gradually improved from the year 2012 to 2016. Accordingly, the contribution of Rs.2,175,899,984 in the year 2015 had increased to Rs.2,307,417,826, by 6 per cent in the year under review.

# 3.2 Legal Cases Initiated against the University or by the University

- (a) There were 4 court cases, one of which in the Supreme Court and 4 in the District Courts filed by the University against 4 lecturers and an encroacher by the end of the year under review. The amount receivable relating to 4 Court Cases filed in the District Courts by the University was Rs.6,704,842.
- (b) There were 27 court cases, consisting of 13 cases filed by various parties against the University, 7 complaints in the University Appeal Board and 7 complaints in the Labour Tribunal. The compensation claimed for 01 court case out of 27 cases filed against the University amounted to Rs.4,005,977.



# 4. Operating Review

## 4.1 Management Inefficiencies


According to the strategic plan prepared by the University for a 5 years period from 2014 to 2018, a summary of main objectives expected to be achieved is given below.

- \* Strengthening approaches to Education, Research and Services, improvement of quality and relevance.
- \* Ensuring fairness and equality for gender, religion and race and physically handicapped.
- \* Enhancement of Good Governance through effective and efficient Resources Management.
- \* Reaching to the first 2000 in World University rating and improvement of the identify of University.

The following observations are made in respect of achieving the above objectives.


- (a) Even though it was anticipated to increase the number of students who study Post Graduate Courses in the Faculty of Agriculture by 5 per cent annually, it had not been achieved. Out of 7 Post Graduate Courses introduced by the Faculty, 06 of them had not been implemented by the end of the year under review. Although 32 students had been registered for the course conducted in the year 2014, it had dropped to 25 students in the year 2015. However, students had not been registered for the year 2016.
- (b) Even though it was recognized as a key activity to set up an academic unit to study Tamil Language, that unit had not been set up even up to the end of the year under review since 2014.

- (c) Even though, it was planned in the year 2014 to build a new Administrative Building with the objectives of increasing office space and the works to be completed in the year 2016, only procurements had been commenced even by 30 June 2017.
- (d) (i) Even though it was anticipated to come to the first 2000 in the World University rating list, the University had possessed the 4318<sup>th</sup> place in the year 2016. However, in the year 2015 it had possessed the 4525<sup>th</sup> place and as such it had improved by 207 places.
  - (ii) In the year 2013 the University had possessed 3<sup>rd</sup> place in the local rating list but by the year 2016 it had dropped up to 6<sup>th</sup> place.
- (e) (i) Even though, it was planned to introduce new graduate courses by 2016, any new courses whatsoever had not been introduced by the Faculty of Agriculture and the Faculty of Engineering even up to the end of the year under review.
  - (ii) Action had not been taken to introduce 06 new subjects for graduate courses relating to 3 faculties, proposed to be introduced according to the plan, even by 30 June 2017.
- (f) (i) The responsibility in the implementation of various activities to be achieved had been assigned to the Deans of the Faculties and to Heads of Divisions and those activities should be Co-ordinated and the action plan should be prepared by the Registrar.
  - (ii) As an action plan or performance reports had not been prepared for the year under review, it could not be examined and ensured whether each of activity stated in the objectives could be achieved to what extent.



# (g) The following observations are made in respect of the enrolment of students

- (i) Thirty four students had been enrolled for three graduate courses of Medicine, Arts, Engineering and Technology for the academic year 2015/2016 in excess of the prescribed number of students. Except for Engineering Courses, the number of students to be enrolled to the balance 13 courses of the University amounted to 1245, but only 1056 students had been admitted. Accordingly, another 189 students had been deprived of the admission to the University. It was observed as the under utilisation of resources.
- (ii) According to the Strategic Plan of the University, the number of students for an academic year had to be increased up to 2142 by the year 2016, but the total number of students enrolled for the academic year 2015/2016 was only 1970, representing less than 8 per cent of the expected level.
- (iii) As compared with the other faculties, more vacancies had existed in the Faculty of Agriculture and the students enrolled in the academic year 2015/2016 to that Faculty had been less than 83 students of the expected number of students.
- (iv) Of the students registered in the Faculty of Science for the academic year 2015/2016, 302 had transferred to other Universities by 26 April 2017. This position had adversary increased in the academic year 2015/2016, as compared with the previous academic year.
- (v) The total number of students in the Faculty of Science as at 31 December 2016 amounted to 890. According to the data indicated in the financial statements for the year under review, cost per student on direct cost (academic cost + examination cost) had been Rs.357,204 approximately.




The total number of vacancies in the Faculty of Science relating to the above period had been 387. When those vacancies had been added to the students actually existed, the total number of students to be enrolled amounted to 1,277. Had enrollments been effected without vacancies, the cost per students on direct cost could be reduced to Rs.249,449 approximately.

## 4.2 Management Activities

- (a) In terms of Section 117 (a) of the Inland Revenue Act No. 10 of 2006 as amended by Act No.22 of 2011, although a sum of Rs.19,120,338 had been paid in the year under review as visiting lecture fees to the visiting lecturers who engaged in more than 2 employments, the 'PAYE' tax amounting to Rs.2,342,027 thereon had not been deducted and remitted to the Commissioner General of Inland Revenue.
- (b) No any transaction had been effected from the margin account available in a state bank after the year 1998 and action had not been taken in respect of this dormant account for more than 19 years. However, there was a balance of Rs.648,708 in that account by the end of the year under review.
- (c) A sum of Rs.1,857,250 had been given to the Divisional Secretary, Matara on 19 December 2006 to pay compensation for the acquisition of Mirissagewatta lands for the construction of the Faculty of Management and Finance of the University of Ruhuna. As compensation claimants were not present, that money had been returned to the University on 21 December 2012 and it had been deposited in the sundry deposit account. However, 10 years had elapsed since the commencement of acquisition of this land in the year 2006, it had not been completed even by 31 March 2017.

- (d) Construction works should be initiated only after ensuring the availability of funds for the achievement of construction works to be performed during the year under review under the government capital grants. Contrary to that, a total sum of Rs.223,119,427 had been spent for 7 constructions and 2 procurements in the year under review and it had been set off against the balance of the unspent government capital grants account and shown in the financial statements.
- (e) Balances of Rs.12,264,450 and Rs.2,087,500 in the unpaid bursaries account and Mahapola account respectively were available as at 31 December 2016. Those balances had been continuously increased from year to year but reasons therefore were not made available for audit.
- (f) (i) The Chief Public Health Inspector of the Matara Municipal Council had informed the Manager of the Cleaning Division of the University on 24 August 2016 that garbage should be grouped in taking it to the Kotawila yard and hand over to the recycling yard by separating plastic and polythene. However, a large stock of garbage emitted from 8 canteens at Wellamadama premises of the University and offices had been disposed of daily without being classified to the Municipal Council, Matara by the cleaning services private company, being paid money.
  - (ii) Even though programs could have been implemented with the participation of various government institutions in order to minimise direct and indirect impact on Health, Environment and Social due to use of plastic and polythene, a sufficient attention had not been paid by the University in this connection.
- (g) Out of 45 audit queries issued during the year under review, replies to 13 audit queries valued at Rs.116,579,796 had not been presented even by 30 June 2017.



## 4.3 Operating Activities

- (a) Seven members of the academic staff who obtained research assistance of Rs.263,000 in the years 2008, 2009 and 2014 under the research scheme in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, had not submitted relevant research reports even up to 31 March 2017 and follow up action in this regard had also not been taken. Furthermore, information regarding the granting of research assistance for the year's 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2013 was not made available for audit.
- (b) Research assistance of Rs.405,000 had been obtained by 8 members of academic staff in the years 2012, 2013 and 2014 under the Faculty Research Scheme of the Faculty of Management and Finance. However, evidence to ensure whether such researchers had actually been carried out was not made available. Furthermore, as 6 members of the staff of that Faculty had not submitted research proposals, any money whatsoever had not been obtained under the Faculty Research Scheme during the previous 5 years.
- (c) Twelve members of academic staff who had obtained a research grant of Rs.710,000 in the year 2010, 2011 and 2012 under the Faculty Research Programme relating to the Faculty of Science had not submitted related research reports even by 31 March 2017.
- (d) A sum of Rs.52,000,000 had been received from the University Grants Commission on 18 March 2016 under the Strengthening Research Programme. According to the instructions in the Letter No.UGC/F4/CE/2016 dated 18 March 2016, the progress reports in respect of the financial and physical performance of the researches conducted by utilising this money should be forwarded to the University Grants Commission once in 3 months in accordance with the specific form stated in the National Budget Circular No.06/2015 dated 29 December 2015. Nevertheless, 8 officers in the academic



staff who had started researches by allocating a research assistance of Rs.27,451,250, had not submitted relevant reports to the University.


## 4.4 Utilisation of Funds

- (a) The balance of 5 gifts and donation accounts as at 31 December 2016 amounted to Rs.2,570,861. This money had not been utilised for intended purposes and kept idle for periods from 3 to 11 years.
- (b) According to the information made available for audit, out of the provision of Rs.150,369,330 given to the University by the Higher Education for 21 Century Project (HETC), work proposals for only Rs.99,173,565 had been presented by the time of completion of the project on 30 June 2016. Accordingly, 34 per cent of work proposals valued at Rs.51,195,765 had been deprived of as work proposals were not presented.
- (c) A fund had been opened from a donation totalling Rs.1,827,899 received on 30 November 2012 and 03 September 2013 in order to reach, 4 main objectives including the improvement of mental, Health and Physical fitness of students. This money had been invested in 2 fixed deposits and only a sum of Rs.192,000 had been spent during the past 3 years therefrom for students counselling. However, the balance of the fund totalling Rs.2,147,666 available as at the end of the year under review had been idle without being utilised for the intended objectives.
- (d) According to the instructions of the Letter No.UGC/F4/CE/2016 dated 18 March 2016 of the University Grants Commission, a provision of Rs.5,000,000 had been made by the University under the title of "Research into Demographic Socio-Cultural and Economic Issues." Nevertheless, the academic staff of the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences had not presented any research proposals and as such that money could not be utilised.

- (e) Balances totalling Rs.1,473,877 in 6 scholarship deposit accounts under the deposit account balances had remained under utilised for a long period.
- (f) A sum of Rs.696,897 received on 28 November 2015 from the 'Shanhai Xintu Foundation' for the Population Health Research and Teaching Programme in the Faculty of Medicine had been retained in the general deposit account for more than one year without being utilised for the relevant objectives.
- (g) Cash balances totalling Rs.2,745,617 existed in a fund account and 02 savings accounts had remained idle for 11 years from 2005 to 2016 without being utilised for the relevant objectives.
- (h) There was a balance of Rs. 1,625,368 as at 31 December 2016 in the Medical Faculty Fund Account relating to World Health Organization Project. Even though it was stated in the reply letters submitted to audit on 09 September 2015 and 17 January 2017 that the balance of that Fund account would be utilised to purchase a new bus to the Faculty, it had not been implemented even up to 31 March 2017.

## 4.5 Delayed Projects

A contract agreement had been entered into on 05 January 2015 at an estimated value of Rs.3,346,168 for the modification of Computer Resources Unit belonging to the Faculty of Electronic and Information Engineering. In terms of the agreement, that work should have been completed within 30 days but only a part of work had been completed and the contractor had abandoned the balance works by 17 September 2015. As this unit had not been modified, computers had been set up only on 10 Computer tables, out of 60 computer tables purchased on 04 November 2014 from a private firm for Rs.463,008 and the computers for the balance 50 tables could not be purchased. Even though, 75 students are required to use the computer resources unit at once, it was observed that installation of only 10 computers therefor was in sufficient.



### 4.6 Personnel Administration

The following observations are made.

## (a) Academic Staff

All 5 Professor posts approved for the Faculty of Engineering had follen vacant and there were 132 vacancies in the lecturer posts in all 8 faculties. Of them the number of vacancies in the Faculties of Medicine, Engineering and Science amounted to 39, 25 and 21 respectively, which represented high values.

## (b) Non-academic Staff

Vacancies of 11 staff posts in the Administration Division in one faculty, 71 non-staff posts in the Administration Division in 3 faculties and 146 minor employees posts in the Administration Division had existed. Excess cadre of one staff officer post in one faculty and 38 minor staff posts in 5 faculties had existed.

Action had not been taken to regularise excess cadre and to fill vacancies even by the end of the year under review.

## 5. Accountability and Good Governance

## 5.1 Action Plan

Action Plan for the year had not been prepared in terms of Paragraph 4 of the Public Finance Circular No.01/2014 of 17 February 2014.

# 5.2 Internal Audit

Although an internal audit unit had been established, consisting of 06 officers, copies of internal audit reports had not been presented to audit in terms of Financial Regulation 134 (3) of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka to examine and ensure whether sufficient internal audit in respect of cash transactions and work proposals and progress of projects of the University had been carried out.

## 5.3 Budgetary Control

Significant variances between the budgeted expenditure and actual expenditure of 79 objects of the year under review, ranging from 15 per cent to 242 per cent were observed and as such the budget had not been made use of as an effective instrument of management control.

## 5.4 Tabling the Annual Reports

Even though the Annual Reports for the years 2012 and 2013 had been presented to the Ministry of Higher Education and Highways for tabling, annual reports for the years from 2012 to 2014 had not been tabled in Parliament up to 31 May 2017 in terms of Paragraph 6.5.3 of the Public Enterprises Circular No.PED/12 of 02 June 2003.

## 5.5 Unresolved Audit Paragraphs


Even though audit paragraphs as detailed below stated in the previous Auditor General's reports, the attention of the University had not been paid to rectify them even by the end of the year under review.

- (a) (i) Financial assistance totalling Rs.1,740,622 had been provided to a temporary lecturer and a permanent lecturer to fulfil the higher education qualification under the project implemented during the period 2006 to 2010 by the Faculty of Fisheries and Marine Science and Technology without entering into any security bond.
  - (ii) Both lecturers are not in the Service of the University at present and any evidence whatsoever to ensure whether higher educational qualifications had been fulfilled was not made available and as such it was observed that any benefit had not been received by the University from the expenditure incurred thereon.

- (b) (i) An advance of Rs.751,463 had been paid 4 years ago for the purchase of science equipment from an entity in Germany required for the Department of Food and Technology of the Faculty of Agriculture such equipment had not been received by the University even up to the year 2014.
  - (ii) As such equipment was not received, it had been imported from an entity in India by spending a sum of Rs.329,179 and that entity had supplied equipment not ordered as well. Another part of goods were not yet received. Although 2 years had elapsed after the receipt of equipment with various defects, any action whatsoever had not been taken in that connection even by the end of the year under review.
  - (iii) After indicating the matter in paragraph (b)(i) above from the audit query dated 09 February 2015, the relevant goods had been released from the Orugodawatta ware house belonging to Sri Lanka Customs on 29 April 2016. Accordingly, storage charges of Rs.88,700 and airport charges of Rs.30,750 had to be paid due to retention of goods in the stores for 887 days from 25 November 2013. Action in terms of Financial Regulation 156 (1) had not been taken in respect of the loss to the government due to delay and negligence of officers.

## 6. System and Controls

Weaknesses in System and Controls observed in audit had been brought to the attention of the University from time to time by way of audit queries. Special attention is needed in respect of the following areas of Systems and Controls.
