THE EMBLEM OF THE UNIVERSITY



The emblem of the University takes the form of a circle with three concentric circles placed close together on the periphery, all on a background of yellow. In the center of this circle is a smaller concentric circle enclosing a full bloom lotus, *Nelumbo nucifera*, in abstract form, and consisting of two tiers of petals one underneath the other. In the center of the circle, stylized stamens enclosed in two concentric circles surround the receptacle. Between the outer set of concentric circles and the central lotus is a wide circular band carrying the motto of the University on the upper half of the band, while the name of the University appears in the lower half, both written in Sinhala characters. The Motto, taken from an ancient Buddhist text, reads;

‘Vijja Uppatataṃ Settha’

(‘among all that rise knowledge is greatest’)

REVIEW OF VICE CHANCELLOR



The year 2019 was a milestone in the long journey of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura as the university was able to celebrate Sixty-years since its glorious inception. The university in celebrating its sixty-year journey also paid tribute to its 145-year legacy.

The composition of the University during the year 2019 is as follows: The University of Sri Jayewardenepura comprises of eight faculties (8) of education: the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences (FHSS), Faculty of Applied Sciences (FAS), Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce (FMSC), Faculty of Medical Sciences (FMS), the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS), Faculty of Technology (FoT) and the Faculty of Engineering (FoE) and the Faculty of Allied Health Sciences (FAHS). Measures have been taken so as to establish a Faculty of Urban Agriculture and Aquatic Resource centre by the beginning of the second quarter of the year 2020.

Furthermore, the University also consists of one Postgraduate institution; the Postgraduate Institute of Management (PIM), located in Colombo 08. The institute today has expanded into Global Markets such as Dubai (UAE), Doha (Qatar), Muscat (Oman) and Kuwait City (Kuwait) and Bangladesh.

The beginning of the year was indeed rewarding as the Vice-Chancellor of the University was nominated as the Chairman of the Committee of Vice-Chancellors and Directors (CVCD), thereby making the University of Sri Jayewardenepura a hot-bed for action that concerns the development of the Higher Education system in the country. The role of the Vice-Chancellor as the Chairman in the CVCD was further rewarded when he was appointed as a member representing the Constituency II of the Association of Commonwealth Universities, where he was responsible as one of the members representing the Universities of South East Asia.

While the university was gaining recognition nationally and internationally, the university was also developing in terms of infrastructure, and academic developments. The Faculty of Allied health Sciences was officially initiated in January 2019. Several refurbishment projects saw its completion in the first quarter of the year.

The year can be considered a revolutionary year where a number of innovative introductions were made. Many of these projects were exhibited to the public during the Innovate Sri Lanka 2019 Exhibition, Vice-Chancellor provided the public with an outlook of the capabilities of students, their talents etc.

During the first quarter of the year, 2019 many celebrations were held in celebration of the legacy of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura. The event was officially marked by the almsgiving and Pirith Chanting ceremony that took place on the 17th and 18th of February 2019.

The almsgiving held on the 18th of February 2019 was graced by 145 monks marking the 145-year-old legacy dating back to the inception of the Vidyodaya Pirivena which was the foundation for the success of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura.

Blood donation camps, international symposia, open learning programmes, medical camps and evenings of music were part and parcel of the celebration. The main highlight of the 60th Anniversary celebration was Innovate 2019 exhibition and the Sandeshawili Kavinaluwa.

The second quarter of the year was marred by tragedy that befell the Nation. The Easter Sunday Attacks that took place towards the latter part of April crippled the University system. While student activities were paused further after New Year vacation, the academic, non-academic and administration staff of the university worked tirelessly to restore normalcy.

The third quarter of the University academic year was equally challenging as Administrative and Non-Academic Staff launched a Trade Union Action with regard to an issue in salary uniformity. The University activities were crippled, however, the staff agreed that the students should not suffer in the process. Thereby, the 45th convocation of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura took place in a smooth manner.

In the year under review, the student intake of the University in all faculties have increased significantly in comparison to the year 2018, the total amounting to 12,982 which is a significant increase in comparison to the 12,608 students recorded in the year 2018. The present values only indicate that of the Internal Graduate intake.

There has also been an increase in the staff recruited in the year under review. While the academic staff of the university as recorded as of December 2018 stood as 931 which has increased to 946 in the year 2019. Total permanent staff recorded as 1726 as at December 2018 increased to 1759 as at December 2019.

The University also introduced a new Department, Department of Polymer Science to the FAS and several new departments for the newly established Faculty of Allied Health Sciences

The University is dedicated to providing its main stakeholders with the best facilities, thereby a number of departments have been subjected to refurbishment, and the hostel occupancy rate has increased from 4555 in 2017 to 5424 in 2018.

Furthermore, the university in its journey to becoming a self-sustainable university that will provide its mother nation a wealth of knowledge and human resources has increased its internal revenue to Rs. 6,635,297,907 in 2019, which is a significant increase from Rs. 5,649,251,082 recorded in 2018.

This journey of succession is only afforded by the university due to the commitment of its forefathers Rev. Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Thero and Rev. Welivitiye Sri Soratha Thero, accordingly, the University commemorated our forefathers in a ceremonious manner in the year under review. The 108th Commemoration of Ven. Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Thero, founder of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura was held on 26th April 2018 at the University premises and 56th Commemoration Ceremony of Rev. Welivitiye Sri Soratha Thero was held on the 25th of July 2019.

THE UNIVERSITY



The University of Sri Jayewardenepura situated in the heart of Colombo boasts of a long and glorious history. Having been established in the 1959 at Gangodawila, its roots can be traced back to the Vidyodaya Pirivena established in 1873 by Hikkaduwe Sri Sumangala Thero at Maligakanda. Today the University pays homage to 60 years of history while paying tribute to journey of 145 years.

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura formerly known as Vidyodaya Pirivena was the essence of the revival of Sri Lankan Education. It is the second oldest University in Sri Lanka and the first University established in Independent Ceylon.

Today the University stands strong with eight faculties, faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Applied Sciences, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce, Faculty of Medical Sciences, Faculty of Graduate Studies, Faculty of Engineering, Faculty of Technology and its latest addition Faculty of Allied Health Sciences. The University is home to over 12,000 Undergraduates, over 1000 postgraduate students. It is considered the largest University in terms of Student Population in Sri Lanka.

The University is also in the forefront of research and innovation with a research council of over 22 research centres and an Invention, Innovation and Venture Creation Council with over 50 Entrepreneurs and stakeholders with over 15 patents.

The University has also maintained cordial relationship with many international bodies of education and have signed over 60 MoUs with recognized internationally acclaimed universities; and over 60 MoUs with established international and local companies, the university strives to give its students an international experience, offering student exchange programmes and internships.

Throughout the years the University of Sri Jayewardenepura has managed to develop in many areas expanding its horizons and will continue this journey reaching many milestones that will no doubt ensure that the University will produce smart, efficient, skillful and professional individuals that will aid in the development of our mother nation.

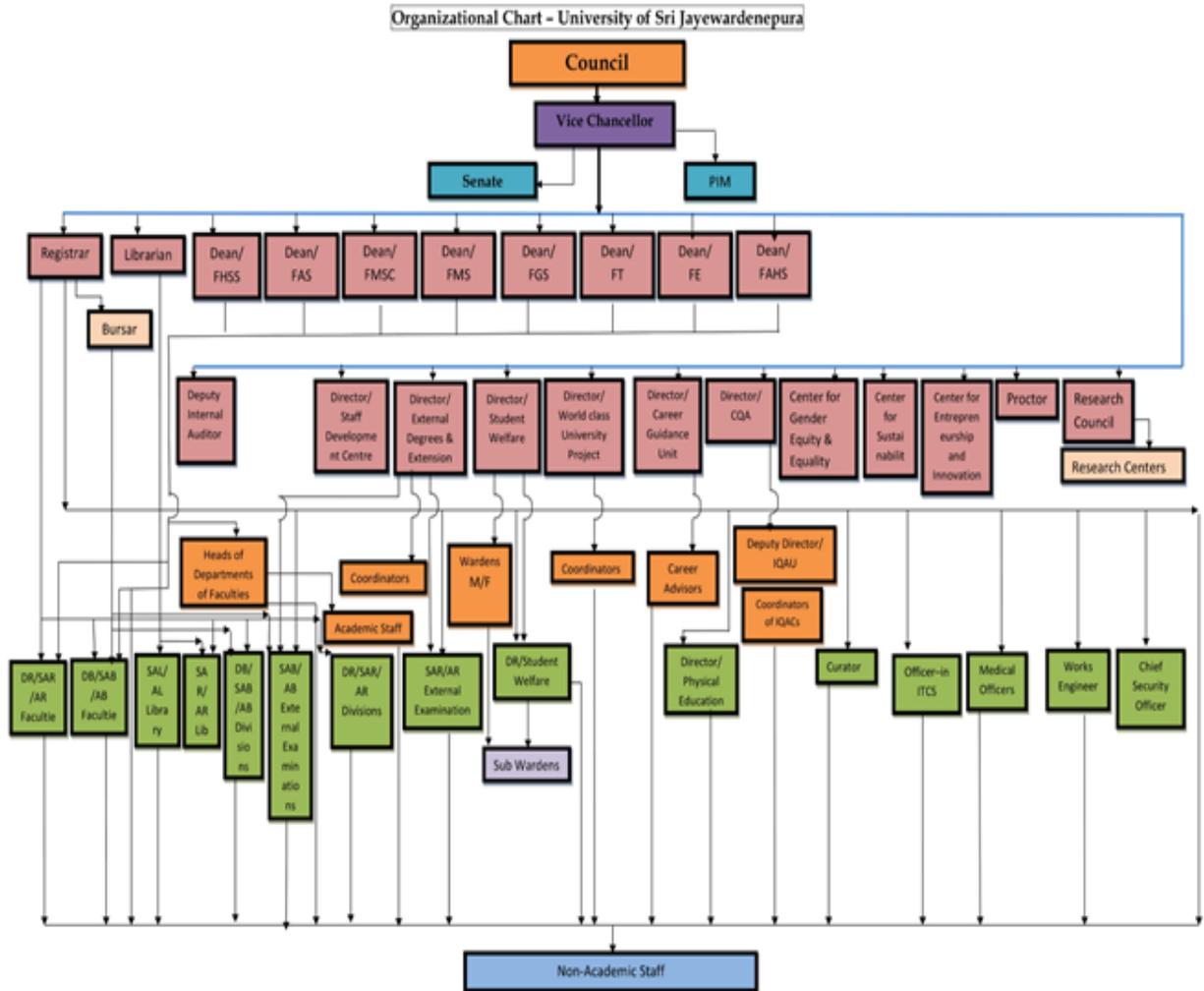

FACULTY OF MANAGEMENT STUDIES AND COMMERCE



The Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce is the pioneering management faculty in Sri Lankan university system which is regarded as the Centre of Excellence in Management Education in Sri Lanka. Management education at University of Sri Jayewardenepura also has a history of more than 60 years.

The first programmes of study were commenced in 1959/60 with the introduction of two undergraduate degree programmes in Business Administration and Public Administration under the Department of Economics, Business and Public Administration of Faculty of Arts. In 1968 the Department was reconstituted as the Department of Management Studies under Faculty of Arts. Under the reorganization of the university system, the Department of Management Studies was elevated to Faculty status and the Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce (FMSC) was established with two Departments, namely, the Department of Management Studies and the Department of Commerce in 1972.

Having been strengthened by twelve academic departments at present the Faculty offers globally competitive degree programmes in the broad areas of Management and Commerce. Indeed, for the last four decades, the Faculty has been the most popular faculty, particularly among the students who have excelled in Advanced Level in the Commerce Stream. Yet, the Faculty's role in Sri Lankan higher education sector is not restricted to the undergraduate education. The Faculty is also committed to Continuous Professional Developments and Lifelong Learning of the leaders in the World of Work. Therefore, it offers – in collaboration with the Faculty of Graduate Studies – a range of highly recognized postgraduate programmes, including PhD, MBA, MPA and M.Sc. in Management. FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES



The Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) was established in the University in January 1996 under Section 48A of the Universities Act No 16 of 1978. According to the Act, the Faculty is the main administrative centre for promoting research and providing courses of study leading to higher degrees and other academic distinctions. The vision of the Faculty is “to firmly establish itself as a centre of excellence for advanced learning, research and scholarship both within and outside the domain of the country”.

The FGS is under the oversight of a Dean who guides the academic and administrative functions of the Faculty. A Deputy Registrar heads the operational division while an Assistant Bursar heads the finance division.

The academic programmes of the FGS are conducted through 9 Boards of Study, which are in close collaboration with other faculties and academic departments in the university. These Boards of Study are Humanities, Social Sciences, Life Sciences, Physical Sciences, Management Studies and Commerce, Medical Sciences, Multidisciplinary Studies, Engineering and Technology. The programmes offered by the Faculty include Certificate Courses, Post Graduate Diplomas, One year Masters Degrees, Masters Degrees by course work and research and Higher Degree Programmes by research only. All the programs are aligned along the Sri Lanka Qualification Framework which sets the benchmark of higher education in the country.

All Boards of Study had been instructed to prepare guidelines-Arrangements have also been taken to publish selected suitable theses with reputed publishers in Sri Lanka in order to disseminate research finding to the general public. The FGS has setup an Editorial Board to achieve this task

ETHICS REVIEW COMMITTEE OF THE FACULTY OF GRADUATE STUDIES

On the recommendation of the Faculty Board of Graduate Studies, at the 368th Senate which was held on 31st January 2019, respective senate members have accepted and recommended a proposal for the approval of an Ethical Review Committee (ERC) for non-medical research at the FGS. The Ethics Review Committee will be established in the FGS in 2020.

RESEARCH METHODOLOGY & SCIENTIFIC WRITING COURSE

With the vision of producing quality postgraduates, FGS started a short course on “Research Methodology and Scientific Writing”. As there is a high demand for this course, FGS has decided to offer the course twice in one academic year. The program was initiated in 2017 and students who registered as postgraduate students for this course, were exempted from the course fee.

PGD IN MONITORING & EVALUATION & CENTRE FOR EVALUATION

This course is offered in a hybrid mode. 25 students have registered for the program. students. Director, External Consultant and two demonstrators have been appointed for sooth function of the centre.

INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON MULTIDISCIPLINARY APPROACHES – 2019

The international Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches (iCMA) in 2019 was held at Golden Rose Hotel, Boralesgamuwa from 26th to 27th November 2019. The theme of the conference was “Sustainability, Ethics & Governance through Multidisciplinary Research”. Senior Professor Sampath Amaratunge (Vice Chancellor of University of Sri Jayewardenepura) was the chief guest and Dr. A. M. Mubarak, Chairman, National Science Foundation was the Guest of Honour of the conference. Prof. Tom Buchanan of Mount Royal University, Canada was invited as the Keynote speaker and Senior Professor M. M. Pathmalal, Dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies Chaired the 6th international Conference on Multidisciplinary Approaches (iCMA).

257 research abstracts were received for the 6th ICMA 2019 and screening was done by the conference academic committee. The abstracts were reviewed by experts and 124 research papers (94 oral and 29 poster) were selected for publication in the Elsevier SSRN database, for the first time in the university history. The accepted publications were in line with the following six thematic research areas

1. Humanities & Social Sciences
2. Engineering, Technology & Physical Sciences
3. Health Sciences & Nutrition
4. Environmental Pollution & Natural Resources Management
5. Natural and Life Sciences
6. Management, Commerce & Industry Development

Following the inauguration of the conference, Plenary talk which was on the topic “Impactful Research” was given by Prof. Neelika Malavige, Professor in The Department of Microbiology, Faculty of Medical Sciences & The Director, Centre for Dengue Research, USJ. Senior Prof. Pathmalal Manage, Prof. Charmali Nahallage, Senior Prof. Samanthi Senarathne, Prof. Pradeepa Jaewardene, Dr. Renuka Nilmini, Prof. S.D.M Chinthaka and Dr. Nishan Dharmage participated as panelists.

INTERNATIONAL JOURNAL OF MULTIDISCIPLINARY STUDIES

IJMS is a platform for the researchers to present their multidisciplinary research work. This is a biannual journal and two issues of Volume 6 were published in July and December 2019.

GUEST LECTURES CONDUCTED BY FGS

FACULTY OF TECHNOLOGY



In order to cater to the GCE Advanced Level Technology Stream introduced by the Government of Sri Lanka in the Year 2013, University of Sri Jayawardenepura was the first University to come forward in Establishing the Faculty of Technology in the Government University System. The proposed Technology curricula were then recommended to the University Council upon the approval of the University Senate on 23rd September, 2015. Followed by the recommendation of the University Council on 08th October 2015, University Grants Commission approved the proposed Technology curricula for three degree programs including the 09 Subject Focus areas on 19th November, 2015. Fulfilling the immense efforts, dedication, and the vision of Prof. Sampath Amaratunge, Vice Chancellor, University of Sri Jayawardenepura and his teams, Ministry of Higher Education and Highways of Sri Lanka officially announced the establishment of the Faculty of Technology through the Gazette Extraordinary (No.1948/59 Order under Section 27(1), THE UNIVERSITIES ACT, No. 16 of 1978) that was published on 08th of January, 2016.

This department will also facilitate common subjects for the other degree programs.

The **Department of Biosystems Technology** will conduct the Bachelor of Biosystems Technology Honours Degree programs. The development of this program is guided by the National Biotechnology Industry Association, Sri Lanka (NBIA). It is planned that the Biosystems Technology programme will be producing skilled graduates in the three focus areas of Food Processing Technology, Agriculture and Environment Technology and Industrial Biosystems Technology.

The **Department of Information and Communication Technology** will conduct the Bachelor of Information and Communication Technology Honours degree programme. The development of this programme is guided by the Computer Society of Sri Lanka and it is planned that the Information and Communication Technology programme will be producing skilled graduates in the three focus areas of Software Technology, Multimedia Technology and Network Technology.

The orientation programme for the third intake of the Faculty of Technology, University of Sri Jayewardenepura was commenced on the 24th February 2019 at the University of Sri Jayewardenepura with the participation of 321 students and parents.

UNIVERSITY MEDICAL CENTRE

University Medical Centre provides the students and staff with a number of facilities. They include medical and dental treatments, investigations, vaccinations and counselling. Further the Centre is involved in carrying out Anti Dengue Campaigns, spraying pesticides to control pests, food testing programs in University Hostels and Canteens, testing water samples and organizing awareness programs for the students on health and social issues.

During the year 2019 Dr. Shantha Hettiarachchi, the Chief Medical Officer resigned from Medical Centre in April 2019. Dr.(Mrs.) S.De.Silva was appointed as Medical Officer Incharge by Vice Chancellor, Prof. Sampath Amaratunge. Dr. (Mrs.) D.M.L.R.H.Perera served as a Medical Officer and Dr. D.P.D.Asalage served as Dental Surgeon.

Dr.K.G.N.Senevirathne, Dr.K.A.M.Handakmbura and Dr.S.M.D.G.S.Perera served as Locum Medical Officers and from August to December, Dr.S.M.D.G.S.Perera was replaced by Dr.S.Smarasinghe.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION DIVISION

INTRODUCTION

OBJECTIVES OF THE PHYSICAL EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

1. To give an understanding on the values of Physical Education to internal students of the University and to give them a physical development through mental development.
2. To provide an opportunity for improvement of sports activities and skills.
3. To encourage sports participation by playing tournaments, with internal and external sports bodies.
4. To develop discipline by encouraging sports activities among students.

A Sports Advisory Board consists of the members of the academic and administrative staff.

The Department of Physical Education, the governing body of sports, of the prestigious University of Sri Jayewardenepura possesses unique sporting facilities.

OUT-DOOR VOLLEYBALL COURTS

The University outdoor volleyball courts are located near the swimming pool have two clay based courts. These are available for university students and staff members.

BASKETBALL COURT

The Outdoor basketball court is situated next to the volleyball courts and is mainly a hard court made of tar. These are available for university students and staff members.

TENNIS COURTS

Tennis courts are clay surfaced and well maintained. These are available for university students, staff members, and for outsiders as well.

SWIMMING POOL COMPLEX

The Swimming pool is a 50m standard size & has 10 lanes. Its shallow end is 1.5 m in depth and at the deep end, the depth is 5.5 m. The swimming pool has an adjacent two storied- building which consists of changing rooms and wash-rooms for swimmers. The pool is available for university students, staff members, and for outsiders as well upon their request.

CRICKET GROUND

The University cricket pitch is mainly a grass surfaced 65m full length area. This well maintained ground has one matting pitch & two clay pitches. The ground has an adjacent one storied- pavilion & changing rooms with attached wash-rooms for players & referees. This ground is located in a very picturesque environment. The pitch hosts Inter University matches, University intra-mural competitions, and as well as other community club tournaments.

ADMINISTRATION AND GENERAL SERVICES DIVISION

General Administration and Services Division provides infrastructure facilities for academic and non academic purposes such as transport, telecommunication, postal services, and housing facilities for staff, supply news papers and fire extinguishers. General Administration and Services Division function with 59 employees including Senior Assistant Registrar , 06 Management Assistant , Receptionist, Telephone Operator, 41 drivers , 02 lorry cleaners , 08 works Aid.

Vehicle fleet of this University consists with 48 vehicles including 12 cars, 4 jeeps, 7 buses, 11 vans, 5 cabs, 3 Ambulances , Tractor , Trailer , Hand Tractor , 2 Motor bikes and 01 Three-wheeler. 06 vehicles were added to vehicle fleet by Financial Leasing method and 05 vehicles were purchased by University Development funds during last few years. Telecommunication facilities provides intercom facilities, 9' dialling and direct line facilities with the cooperation of center for IT Services. Free housing facilities are provided to specially selected official including Proctor, Warden, Works Engineer, Chief Security Officer, Electrician, Plumber and selection is regulated by Housing committee of the University. In addition few houses are provided to academic and non academic staff with a monthly rental as a welfare facility.

Annual refilling and maintenance of fire Extinguishers are carried out with the cooperation of Department of Fire. Currently the department of fire “ Municipal council ,Colombo has been preparing a report regarding the issues of existing fire extinguishers and new requirement of the university.

Annual training programmes for Drivers and Cleaners are conducted in order to increase the knowledge on road traffic rules, regulations and safe driving. Accordingly a training program was conducted for drivers and cleaners at Club Farm Bay Hotel , Marawila for year 2019.

LIBRARY

Under the direction of the Librarian Dr. (Mrs) Nayana Wijayasundara, 01 Deputy Librarian, 04 Senior Assistant Librarians, 07 Assistant Librarians, 01 Assistant Network Manager and 54 non-academic staff were carried out duties in the library.

During the year, 978 books were purchased at a cost of Rs. 13,195,286.65 from the annual allocation. Forty Six foreign and local periodicals were purchased at a cost of Rs. 6,721,375.25. Three electronic databases; JSTOR (at a cost of Rs. 1,152,226.25), Research4life (at a cost of Rs. 270,575.60) and SCOPUS (at a cost of Rs. 3,383,617.95) were purchased. One thousand five hundred fifty-one books (valued at Rs. 5,942,698.54), 244 foreign and local periodicals (valued at Rs. 72,521.60) and 385 palm leaf manuscripts were received as donations and 48 periodicals were received on exchange basis.

In addition, access to 03 other electronic databases; Emerald, Taylor & Francis, Oxford Journals including Medical Handbooks Collection was provided to patrons through the UGC consortium, CONSAL. Also Document Delivery process through British Library was provided through CONSAL for the readers.

During the year 2019, 1534 book titles and 2525 copies were processed by the Processing Division and faculty libraries. The amount consisted of 337 to Ceylon Room (CR), 388 to Permanent Reference (PR), 316 to Scheduled Reference (SR) and 1484 to Lending (L) books. About 3941 readers were registered including Academic Staff (77), Non-academic staff (60), Undergraduate students (3637) and Diploma and Postgraduate students (167) during the year 2019. With that the total number of registered users was 18,117.

The rate of fulfillment of Inter-library loan requests was 88.8%. Laptop lending service was used by 944 users in 2019. We have 30 laptop computers allocated for this service.

Total number of entries in the Scholar Bank (Institutional repository) is 7764 and the database of newspaper articles consists of 2235 selected newspaper articles by the end of 2019.

Thirteen workshops were conducted by the academic staff of the library; for the undergraduates in order to enhance the awareness of information resources and information literacy skills.

During the year 2019, 02 PhD, 06 Masters degree, 06 degree and 07 diploma studies were carried out by the library staff.

INTERNAL AUDIT DIVISION

Internal Audit Division is headed by the Deputy Internal Auditor. Audit program for the year is prepared and submitted to the University Council for its approval with recommendation of the Audit Committee.

The Audit committee appointed by and responsible to the Council Comprises of three Independent Non Executive members of Council.

It was headed by the Chairman who was the Council member of the University in the Non-Executive capacity and consisted of two other Council members in the Non-Executive capacity. In the year 2019 committee had met 4 (Four) times and discussed following important areas;

The University of Sri Jayewardenepura being a public institution, has to exercise its responsibility to maintain its quality and standards. Quality assurance is the means by which a university can guarantee with confidence and certainty that standards of its awards and quality of its education provision and knowledge generation are being maintained.

In this context, the Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA) of the University is responsible for carrying out the quality assurance activities and coordinating these activities in line with the national quality assurance framework laid down by the Quality Assurance Council (QAC) of the University Grants Commission (UGC). Although, maintaining the expected standards of quality assurance in the University is a massive task, the Director/ CQA of the University, Senior Professor Samantha Senaratne, is working on part time basis, to fulfill the academic and administrative tasks involved with the CQA.

The activities of CQA during the year 2019, are stated below.

1. Institutional Review:

The University received the Final Review Report of the Institutional Review (IR) submitted by the review team on 02nd October 2018, after a long delay. Upon receipt, the report was carefully scrutinized and found that the review team had not given a fair hearing to most of the responses that USJP has made to the Draft Review Report. Since, USJP did not agree with certain contents of the report, and was of the view that it should not enter public domain until those disagreeing issues are sorted out. Therefore, a letter was sent to the Chairman/UGC, by the Vice Chancellor on 26th October, 2018, requesting to advise the QAC to refrain from publishing this document.

A letter was received on 19th December, 2018 (which had been written on 11th December, 2018) from the Chairman/UGC, requesting detailed response of USJP to the IR Final Review Report.

Accordingly, CQA prepared a detailed response to the 'Final Institutional Review Report' submitted by the Review Team (RT). USJP response was presented in the form of a report consisting of 90 pages by explaining the reasons for disagreement with the marks allocated by the RT for 54 standards under Criteria 1 to 10 of the Institutional Review. This report also elaborated the specific supporting evidences that were placed for the scrutiny of the RT under each standard. This Report was submitted to the Director/QAC through the Chairman/UGC on 12.02.2019.

2. Programme Review:

(i) Programme Review (PR) of Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce (FMSC):

Twelve PRs of the FMSC were conducted during the period of November, 2018 to January, 2019. The scores received by each study programme of FMSC with the departments are given below in the order in which these reviews were conducted.

(c) Review and the Score Obtained:

The PR of the FMS was conducted from 03rd to 06th September, 2019, and was awarded a 'B' Grade. The FMS prepared a response to the draft review report received in this respect and submitted to the QAC of UGC on 06.11.2019. Director, CQA assisted the preparation of responses to the draft Review Report. However, there was no change as to the B grade that was awarded.

3. Policy Documents:

(i) Policy on Academic Accountability:

Policy Document on Academic Accountability prepared for the USJ was submitted to the University Senate and it was referred back for the comments of the faculties. As, only one Faculty has sent their response, it could not be finalized. Hence, it was circulated again among all the Faculties to obtain their observations.

Furthermore, to obtain the views of the faculties, a CQA meeting was convened, chaired by the Vice Chancellor on 31.01.2019. The following points were highlighted in the document.

- Ethical Principles in academic work
- Ethical Principles in University Teaching
- Ethical Principles in Research
- Workload and Work Norms Model
- The Workload Formula
- Different types of workload
 - * Teaching Workload Weights
 - * Research and Development Workload Weights
 - * University and National Development Workload Weights
- * Work Norms – Student Contact Hours according to Designations

It was discussed that whether there should be a fair distribution of teaching workload among the senior academic staff members and the probationary lecturers. Then it was discussed whether to agree in principle in a broad way.

Finally, it was decided to include only the areas to be focused under each aspect dealt with the documents on Ethics and Academic Accountability. These main areas were indicated in the presentation done at the meeting. The Faculties were requested to decide the specific work norms.

(ii) Policy on Gender Equity:

Policy on Gender Equity of the University was submitted to the 376th Meeting of the Senate held on 31.10.2019.

4. INQAAHE and APQN Conferences:

CQA was involved with the organization of INQAAHE and APQN Conferences held in Sri Lanka.

INQAAHE 15th Biennial Conference 2019 organised under the theme 'Quality Assurance, Qualifications, and Recognition: Fostering Trust in a Globalized World' was hosted by UGC, Sri Lanka, was held at the Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall (BMICH) from the 25th to 28th of March, 2019.

APQN (The Asia-Pacific Quality Network) Annual Academic Conference (AAC) 2019 organized under the theme 'Quality Assurance in the Asia-Pacific Region: Insight into the Future' was held at the Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall (BMICH), from 28th to 31st March, 2019.

5. Management Guide for USJP:

The initial meeting to prepare a Management Guide for USJ was held on 21.03.2019 with the participation of the Registrar, Bursar and other senior officials of USJ. The Quality Assurance (QA) Consultant Prof. Kalyani Perera and Director/CQA, Senior Professor Samantha Senaratne guided the preparation of the Management Guide. This was followed by a several rounds of discussions in this respect.

It was discussed that the Management Guide needs to be developed through a participatory approach under the leadership of the Registrar of the University. To be successful, the administrative officers attached to different administrative Departments, Divisions, Faculties, Centres and Units should assume the responsibility and leadership in documenting administrative procedures relevant to their respective departments, divisions and units.

It was further decided to appoint committees in each section and division, headed by the sectional head and compile all the documents related to that section and send the compiled documents to the Registrar for preparation of the Management Guide.

6. Strategic Plan for Quality Assurance:

Strategic Plan for Quality Assurance has been prepared under the guidance of the QA Consultant, Prof. Kalyani Perera and it was presented by the Director/CQA at the QA meeting held on 27.06.2019.

This meeting was attended by the Vice Chancellor, Dean/Faculty of Applied Sciences, Dean/Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce, Dean/Faculty of Graduate Studies, QA Consultant, Director/CQA, Faculty Coordinator/IQAC-FMS, Faculty Coordinator/IQAC-FHSS, Faculty Coordinator/IQAC-FGS, Faculty Coordinator/IQAC-FT, Representative/IQAC-FAS, Representative/IQAC-FAHS, Head/Dept. of Entrepreneurship, Secretary/IQAU and Research Assistant/IQAU.

8. Action Plans to implement the recommendations of the Programs Reviews:

Similarly, actions plans are being prepared for the implementation of the review comments of the PRs conducted in the Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences (FHSS) and the FMSC. The five PRs of FHSS were conducted in 2017 and the twelve Program Reviews of FMSC were conducted in 2018-2019. The action plan of the PRs of FHSS were submitted to the QAC.

9. Proposed Changes under Commission Circular 09/2019 on further strengthening of Internal Quality Assurance Systems in universities and higher educational institutions

The following changes proposed by the Commission Circular 09/2019 dated 07.10.2019 was submitted to the Senate and the council.

- The IQAU to be renamed as the Centre for Quality Assurance (CQA) in order to better reflect its university wide remit. Administratively, CQA should function as part of an academic division of the University.
- The present Management Committee (MC) of the IQAU to be converted to a Standing Committee of the Senate of the University in accordance with provisions stipulated in Section 46(6)(vii) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 (as amended). The composition of this standing committee will remain same as of the MC.
- The Director, CQU of the University to be placed at an appropriate place in the University Organogram. The guidance in this respect is provided in the Annex 3 of this Circular.

10. Quality Assurance Awareness Programmes:

The Director/CQA and the QA Consultant conducted the following Quality Assurance Programmes during the year 2019.

1. 01.08.2019 – For the academic staff including the Dean of Faculty of Allied Health Sciences, an awareness programme
2. 05.09.2019 – For the Heads of Departments and the Dean of Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, an awareness programme
3. 06.09.2019 - For the participants of Certificate in Teaching in Higher Education(CTHE) on Quality Assurance, an awareness programme
4. 05.11.2019 - For the academic staff of the Faculty of Allied Health Sciences, to review their Vision & Mission Statements and Graduate Profile
5. 13.12.2019 - For the Academic Staff of the External Degrees and Extension Courses Unit on the program review manual for external degrees to carry out a self-evaluation of the external degree programmes

11. The Visit of Director, Quality Assurance Council to the University of Sri Jayewardenepura :

The Director/Quality Assurance Council (QAC), UGC, Prof. Nilanthi de Silva visited the University on 06.11.2019 and held a discussion with the members of the Management Committee (MC) of CQA as to the progress of quality assurance activities. This meeting was chaired by the Vice Chancellor of the University, who is also the Chairperson of the MC of CQA. The members of the MC, which comprise the Director- Postgraduate Institute of Management (PIM), Deans of all faculties, Registrar, Librarian, Bursar, Co-chairperson of the Research Council, Director - External Degrees and Extension Courses, Director- Staff Development, and faculty IQAC coordinators participated in this meeting. At the beginning of this meeting, the Vice Chancellor made a

presentation about the present activities of the University and its future directions. This was followed by a presentation of the Director/CQA as to the present status of internal quality assurance activities of the University, status of external reviews conducted, and the action plan prepared to implement the recommendations of the Final Review Report of IR. This was followed by a discussion between the Director, QAC and the members of the MC. The QA, Consultant and the members of the Corporate Planning Committee of the University were also participated in this meeting on the invitation of the Vice Chancellor.

On conclusion of this meeting, Prof. Nilanthi de Silva had a discussion with the Dean, Heads and members of QA Cell of FHSS as to the Action Plans prepared to implement the review recommendations of the PRs conducted. Both Director/CQA and QA Consultant of the University participated at this meeting.

Prof. Nilanthi de Silva visited the FMSC on 22.11.2019 to discuss the preparation of Action plans to implement the review recommendations of the PRs conducted.

1. Allocations for Result Area One

The objective of this result area is to increase enrollments in higher education programs of strategic importance for economic development. The GoSL will promote the expansion of enrollment in state universities and ATIs, with a focus on STEM degree programs through a combination of demand- and supply-side initiatives.

Under this result area WB funds will be released to improve the Faculties of Medical Sciences and Technology.

Using the grant received to purchase goods, many medical equipment were purchased during the years 2018 and 2019. Total expenses incurred was Rs. 29.9 million. Some of the higher value items such as Oil immersion binocular light microscope, Real time PCR machine, Gel imaging system, ELISA reader, 80 °C deep freezer, Manikin only for advanced life support, Manikin for ALS (child),

Interactive Whiteboard and Autoclave were purchased using the funds. Procurement activities were completed in March 2019.

In May 2019 Rs. 156 million was awarded for the extension of Anatomy Building for the Department of Pathology. Currently bidding documents are in progress.

Faculty of Technology purchased many high technologically advanced equipment using the Rs.120.4 million for the teaching and research purposes during the years 2018 and 2019. Almost all the money allocated under the grant category Goods was utilized and there are payments to be made for few more items during the year 2020. Some of the items purchased under this grant were Gas Chromatography-Mass Spectrometry Machine, High Performance Liquid Chromatography Machine, Video Camera and Vision mixer, Air Compressor - oil free air compressor, Bioreactor, Distillation, Dryer, Extruder, Fermentation Wot, Grinder, Mixer and Roster.

Faculty also received Rs.350 million under the civil work cost component to construct an Academic Building Complex at Pitipana.

World Bank will provide full funding for the administration building of the Technology Faculty and during the year part payment of Rs. 339.4 million was paid. By the end of 2019, 90% of the civil work have been completed. This project is expected to complete by March 2020.

2. Allocations for Result Area Two

The objective of this result area is to improve the quality of higher education, especially in the HEMS streams of undergraduate programs. Under this result area universities are eligible to receive grants on competitive basis for three sub areas namely:

- ELTA-ELSE Faculty Level Grants,
- ELTA-ELSE Department Level Grants
- PhD Scholarships for PhD studies.

Our university was able to secure three faculty grants each worth of Rs. 120 million. Three grants winners are Faculty of Humanities and Social Sciences, Faculty of Management Studies and Commerce and Faculty of Applied Sciences.

Under the Department level competition our university was able to win 5 department level grants. The winning departments will receive Rs.18 million each. Department of Anthropology, Department of Geography, Department of Decision Sciences, Department of Marketing Management and the Department of Sport Science won the round one allocation.

Under the PhD scholarship program our university staff members were awarded 40 PhD each worth of Rs.9 million. Due to the various reasons only 17 were able to start their PhD studies during the years 2018 and 2019. Due to non-compliance of the OMST guidelines other scholarships were canceled.

Faculty of Medical Science won a grant of Rs. 35 million in the competitive category and under the Innovation Commercialization Enhancement (ICE) grant Faculty of Applied Science won Rs.40 million worth grant.

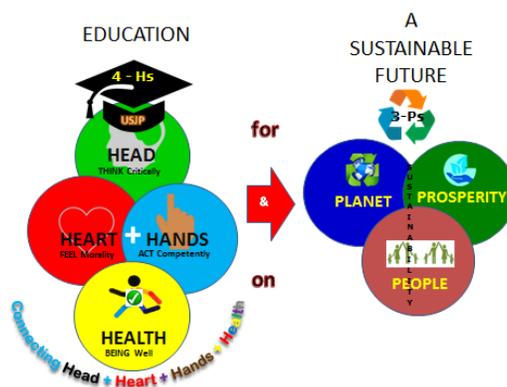

Transition to a sustainable university

USJP to become a Sustainable University

1. Top Management Commitment – Administrative Influence

The university's top management commitment towards sustainability has a significant impact at the very outset and in the process of implementation. 3. Research Endeavours

SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNT POLICIES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - 2019

1. Reporting Entity

University of Sri Jayewardenepura University has been incorporated under the Universities Act No.16 of 1978, and located at Gangodawila, Nugegoda Sri Lanka. University is functioned under the Ministry of Higher Education, Technology and Innovation.

1.1. Date of authorization for issue

The Financial Statements of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura were authorized for issue by the Council dated on 26.02.2020.

1.2. Reporting period

The financial period of the University represent from 01st January 2019 to 31st December 2019.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

2.1 Statement of compliance

The Financial Statements of the University have been prepared and presented in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS's). However Sri Lanka Accounting Standards also have been used in the areas where no Public Sector Accounting Standards are available. These Financial Statements comprise the statement of Financial Position, Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Cash flows, Changes in equity and Notes to the Financial Statements.

2.2 Basis of measurement

The Financial Statements of the University of Sri Jayewardenepura have been prepared on the historical cost basis and apply consistently. No adjustments have been made for inflation factors affecting to the financial statements except for the property, plant and equipment measured at fair value.

2.3 Comparative information

All accounting policies adopted by the University are applied consistently with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

2.4 Materiality and aggregation

Each material class of similar items have presented separately in the financial statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have presented separately unless they are immaterial.

2.5 Offsetting

Assets and liabilities, revenue and expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by SLPSAS.

2.6 Going concern

The University has assessed the ability to continue as a going concern. The council of University has a reasonable expectation that the University has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. University does not foresee a need for liquidation or cessation of operations, taking into account all available information about future. Accordingly the University continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

2.7 Events after the reporting period

All material events after the reporting date have been considered and where appropriate adjustments or disclosures wherever necessary have been made in the Financial Statements.

2.8 Functional & presentation currency

Items included in the financial statements of the University are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the University operates (the functional currency). These financial statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lankan Rupees' (Rs.), which is the University's functional and presentation currency.

2.9 Transaction of foreign currencies and balances

Foreign currency transactions are translated into the functional currency using the exchange rates prevailing at the dates of the transactions or valuation where item are re measured. Foreign exchange gains and losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the translation at year end exchange rates of monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are recognized in the income statement.

2.10 Rounding

The amounts in financial statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, except otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

2.11 Property, Plant & Equipment (PPE)

The University's Property Plant & Equipment (PPE) includes Land, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Office Equipment, Furniture & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks, Sport Goods and Other Assets.

a. Basis of recognition

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associate with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

i) Initial recognition

Property, Plant & Equipment are initially recognized at cost including the cost of purchase with any incidental expenses incurred in bringing the assets to its working conditions, for its intend use, Subsequent to initial Recognition and PPE are measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses.

ii) Subsequent expenditure on existing Property, Plant & Equipment

Expenditure incurred on tangible PPE is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which case it is capitalized and depreciated over the relevant useful life time.

- Increase in the capacity of the asset.
- Substantial improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- Significant extension of the life of the asset beyond that confirmed by repair and maintenance.
- Market value of PPE has subsequently increased.
- Expenditure incurred on repairs or maintenance of property, plant and equipment in order to restore or maintain the future economic benefits expected from originally assessed standard of performance, is recognized as an expense when incurred.

iii) Measurement after recognition

Cost model

After recognition all the PPE except the classes of Land, Buildings, Motor Vehicles, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Sports Goods, Other Equipment and Furniture & Fittings are carried at its cost less accumulated Depreciation.

Revaluation model

After initial recognition below classes of PPE whose fair value can be measured reliably has been carried at revalued amounts, which is fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

Land & Buildings,

Office equipment,
Lab & Teaching Equipment,
Furniture & Fittings,
Computer & Accessories,
Sports goods & Other Assets,

Carrying value of PPE and intangible assets are reviewed at each reporting date to determine whether there is any indication of impairment if any such indications exist, then the assets recoverable amount is estimated. An impairment loss is recognized if the carrying amount of an asset exceeds its recoverable amount. Impairment losses are recognized in the statement of financial performances.

iv) **Library Books & Cloaks**

Cost of Library books and Cloaks are depreciated on the straight line basis over a period of 5 years.

V) **Intangible assets**

Computer softwares and online journals have been recognized as intangible assets when it is probable that future economic benefits that are attributable to the assets will flow the enterprise and the cost of the asset can be measured reliably. Intangible assets acquired are stated at cost less accumulated amortization and accumulated impairment losses. These costs are amortized over their estimated useful lives.

b) **Depreciation**

Depreciation is recognized in the statement of Financial Performance on the straight line basis on each component of an item of PPE other than freehold land.

Depreciation of an asset begins when it is available for use and ceases at the earlier of the date that the asset is classified as held for sale and the date that the asset is de-recognized.

The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

The assets residual values and useful lives are reviewed, and adjusted if appropriate, at the end of each reporting period, assets carrying amount is written down immediately to its

recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

Gains and losses on disposals are determined by comparing the proceeds with the carrying amount and gain / (Loss) is recognized in the statements of comprehensive income.

c) **De-recognition**

The carrying amount of PPE is derecognized at the disposal or when no future economic benefits or service potential is expected from its use or disposal. The gain or loss arising from the derecognition shall be included in surplus or deficit when the item is derecognized.

2.12 Financial Assets

Investment

Investments represent investment in fixed deposits and savings accounts. These investments have been accounted in compliance with SLFRS 09. The investments in fixed deposits and savings accounts have been classified at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. They are initially measured at fair value and subsequently measured at fair value less amortized cost by using effective interest rate as required by SLFRS 09

Staff Loan

The staff loan includes distress loan, computer loan, publication loan, vehicle loan and other staff loans. The staff loans have been classified as financial assets at amortized cost as per SLFRS 09. Impairment losses in any staff loan have been recognized on expected lost method as stipulated in SLFRS 09.

2.13 Capital work-in-progress

Capital expenses incurred on PPE which are not completed as at the reporting date are shown as Capital Work-in-Progress and cost incurred on Capital Work-in-progress is transferred to PPE when it is available for use.

2.14 Current assets

Current Assets classified in Statement of Financial Position are those which are expected to be realized in, or consumption in, in the university's normal operating cycle, expected to be realized within twelve months after the reporting date or cash or a cash equivalent.

2.15 Inventories

Inventories which are for consumption and not for resale are stated at cost and determined on First in First out (FIFO) basis.

2.16 Advances to staff and receivables

Advances to staff and receivable comprise, festival advance and book allowances.

2.17 Cash & cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are defined as cash in hand, demand deposits and short term highly liquid investments readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of change in value. For the purpose of cash flow statement, cash & cash equivalent includes cash in hand and deposits in banks. Investments with short term maturity of six months or less from the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents. The cash flow statement is prepared based on the indirect method.

2.18 Accounting for government grants for capital expenditure

2.18.1 Recurrent grant

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis. Cost of rehabilitation of PPE and capital grants for construction and new work are recognized either as work in progress or Capital Assets where necessary.

2.18.2 Contribution to capital outlay from outside grants

The value of PPE purchased out of generated funds & various project funds were shown as “Contribution to Capital Outlay from outside Grants”.

2.18.3 Capital grants

Government Grants and Donations received by the way of treasury and other lending agencies have presented in the Financial Statements in accordance with the SLPSAS (11) Revenue from non-exchange transaction and LKAS 20 Government Grants, has been recognized as deferred income in the statement of financial position and amortized over the useful life of the asset.

2.18.4 Internally restricted funds

Internally restricted funds include funds committed for specific purpose. Faculty Development Funds represent the cumulative position of Faculties/Departments Funds with net unspent balances at the year end.

2.18.5 Endowment fund

Endowment funds include restricted donations received by the University and investment returns generated from endowment funds are used in accordance with the various purpose established by the donors.

2.19 Employee benefits

Defined contribution plans

Employees are eligible for University Provident Fund (UPF) Contributions, Employees' Trust Fund (ETF), University Pension Fund, Contributions is in line with the respective statutes and regulations. The University pays fixed contributions on basic emoluments plus Cost of Living allowances, academic allowances and monthly compensation allowances of employees to the University Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund, University Pension Fund and will have no legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. This obligation falls within the scope of the defined contribution plan SLPSA 19 on employment benefit. Obligation for contribution to define contribution plan are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performances as the related service is provided.

Defined benefit plans

Defined benefit plans are post-employment plans other than defined contribution plans. The University is liable to pay gratuity in terms of the Payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983.

2.20 Liabilities and provisions

Current liabilities

Current Liabilities are stated at their book value.

Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the University has present obligations (legal and constructive) as a result of a past event, where it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation.

2.20.1 Define benefit obligations

In accordance with the Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, a liability arises for a defined benefit obligation to employees. Such defined benefit obligation is a post-employment benefit obligation falling within the scope of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting SLPSA 19 Employee Benefit. The liability recognized in the Statement of Financial Position is the present value of the defined benefit obligation at the reporting date. The calculation is performed annually by a qualified actuary using the projected unit credit method (PUC). Remeasurement of the defined benefit liability, which comprises actuarial gains and losses are recognized immediately in the statement of financial performances. The University recognizes the increase in defined benefit liability attribute to the services provided by employees during the year (current service cost) in profit or loss together with interest expenses. The discount rate has been derived considering the yield of government bonds.

Accounting Estimate

The actuarial valuation involves making assumptions about discount rates, expected rates of return on assets, future salary increase and mortality rates, due to the long term nature of the obligation, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.

2.20.2 Contingent liabilities and contingent assets

Contingent assets and liabilities have been accounted in accordance with SLPSAS8. Accordingly a contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be continued by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the program or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that an outflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be measured reliably. The uncertainty does not recognize a contingent liability but disclose its existence in the financial statement.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the University. The University does not recognize contingent asset but discloses its existence where inflow of economic benefits are probable but not virtually certain.

2.21 Revenue recognition

2.21.1 Income from fee levying courses

Income from fee levying courses and other activities are recognized on accrual basis over the period of the course and degrees.

2.21.2 Finance income

Interest income is recognized on accruing basis using effective interest rate method according to SLFRS 09 due to the absence of SLPSAS.

2.21.3 Expenditure recognition

Expenses incurred in carrying out all activities of the University are recognized on an accrual basis and charged to the statement of Financial Performance.

2.22 Statement of cash flows

The cash flow statement has been prepared by using The Indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS 2 whereby gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

AUDITOR GENERAL'S REPORT AND ANSWERS TO THE REPORT OF THE
AUDITOR GENERAL UNIVERSITY OF SRI JAYEWARDENEPURA FOR THE YEAR
ENDED 31.12.2019

Report of the Auditor General on the Financial Statements of the University of Sri Jayawardenepura and its affairs for the year ended 31 December 2019 in terms of 154(6) of the constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka.

1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the University of Sri Jayawardenepura for the year ended 31 December 2019 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2019 and the statement of financial performance, statement of changes in equity and cash flow statement for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies, was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read in conjunction with the provisions in section 108 and sub-section 107 (5) of the Universities Act No. 16 of 1978 and National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018. My comments and observations which I consider should be reported to Parliament appear in this report.

In my opinion, except for the effects of the matters described in Paragraph 1.5 of this report, the financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the University as at 31 December 2019 and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for Qualified Opinion

My opinion is qualified based on the matters described in paragraph 1.5 of this report.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities, under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

1.3 Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the University's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intend to liquidate the University or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the University's financial reporting process.

As per Section 16(1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the University is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the University.

1.4 Auditors Responsibility for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objective is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by the management.

- Conclude on the appropriateness of the management’s use of the going concern basis of accounting and based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the University’s ability to continue as a going concern. If I conclude that a material uncertainty exists, I am required to draw attention in my auditor’s report to the related disclosures in the financial statements or, if such disclosures are inadequate, to modify my opinion. My conclusions are based on the audit evidence obtained up to the date of my auditor’s report. However, future events or conditions may cause the University to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

The scope of the audit also extended to examine as far as possible, and as far as necessary the following;

- Whether the organization, systems, procedures, books, records and other documents have been properly and adequately designed from the point of view of the presentation of information to enable a continuous evaluation of the activities of the University and whether such systems, procedures, books, records and other documents are in effective operation;
- Whether the University has complied with applicable written law, or other general or special directions issued by the governing body of the University;
- Whether the University has performed according to its powers, functions and duties; and
- Whether the resources of the University had been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws.

1.5 Financial Statements

1.5.1 Internal Control over the preparation of financial statements.

Entities are required to “devise and maintain” a system of internal accounting controls sufficient to provide reasonable assurance that , transactions are executed in accordance with management’s general or specific authorization, transactions are recorded as necessary to permit preparation of financial statements in conformity with the applicable reporting standards , and to maintain accountability for assets, access to assets is permitted only in accordance with management’s general or specific authorization, and the recorded accountability for assets is compared with the existing assets at reasonable intervals and appropriate action is taken with respect to any differences.

2 Financial Review

2.1 Financial Result

The operations for the year under review had been a deficit of Rs. 871,320,870 as compared with the corresponding deficit of Rs. 159,969,855 for the preceding year, thus indicating an deterioration of Rs.711,351,015 in the financial result. Increase in the personal emoluments and gratuity expenditure had been the main reasons for the said deterioration.

3. Operational Review

3.1 Operational Inefficiencies

Audit Observation

Even though the university should introduce new courses for new ideas, innovations and technological advancements and for the new job market, the University of Sri Jayewardenepura had introduced only 01 and 04 new courses in 2011/2012 and 2015/2016 academic years only in the last 10 years period.

Management Comment

New courses have been introduced according to the resources available at the University and the annual allocation.

Recommendation

In line with the increase in the annual financial allocation, new courses should be introduced targeting the new job market.

3.2 Under -utilization of Funds

Audit Observation

Out of total sum of Rs. 32 million available in 101 Prize and Scholarship Funds, had been utilized only Rs. 5 million or about 15.6 less percentage for the intended purpose at the end of the year under review and a sum of Rs. 20,385,955 remained in 30 inactive funds had not been utilized for the relevant purpose. Also, as on 31 December of the year under review, a sum of Rs. 40,074,900 available in 36 research fund accounts had not been utilized for more than 04 years and total sum of Rs. 4,699,502 available in 08 research fund accounts and a total sum of Rs. 73,067,553 available in 15 special funds had not been utilized during the year under review.

Management Comment

Scholarship and prize funds were established for a specific purpose or objective and will only be utilized if the relevant objective and criteria are achieved

Recommendation

Funds should be utilized for the relevant purposes.

3.4 Procurement Management

Audit Observation

As per the decision of the Cabinet of Ministers in March 2016, a VAT free cost estimate amounted to Rs. 49.14 million had been approved to expand the administrative building of the University and the entire construction work was to be completed within 10 months. Due to the removal of several items from the initial cost estimate and prepare a separate estimate, the estimate was increased to Rs. 150.4 million. Accordingly, the approved initial cost estimate for the project was increased by Rs. 91,619,877 or by 186 percent and the project could not be completed even by 30 June 2020.

Management Comment

Arrangements have been made to award the contract by slicing according to the allocations received by the University in each year.

Recommendation

Should be complied with the procurement guidelines.

3.5 Human Resources Management

Audit Observation

As of end of the year under review, the university had 1236 approved academic cadre, 1173 non-academic cadre, and 142 administration and academic support service cadre and the actual cadre was 959, 1045, and 142 respectively. As such, there were 277 posts in academic staff, 128 posts in non-academic and 37 posts in academic support service cadre were remained vacant.

Management Comment

The faculties of Engineering and Technology are the newly created faculties and recruitments are in progress. Recruitment has been delayed due to non-availability of applications from the qualified lecturers in certain specialized subject areas. Administrative officers are appointed by the University Grants Commission not by the university.

Recommendation

Action should be taken to fill the vacancies.

4. Accountability and Good Governance

4.1 Annual Action Plan

Audit Observation

The Annual Action Plan and related progress reports had not been submitted for audit.

Management Comment

No reply was made.

Recommendation

The information required for the audit should be provided.

4.2 Sustainable Development Goals

Audit Observation

All government agencies are required to comply with the United Nations Agenda for Sustainable Development 2030, but the University of Sri Jayewardenepura did not have a sufficient understanding of how it should operate within its scope of the year under review. Accordingly, in accordance with the United Nations Agenda for 2030, the University had not identified the Sustainable Development Goals, objectives and milestones to be achieved and the indicators to be achieved on targets.

Management Comment

This has been taken into consideration in the preparation of the plans of the University and it is planned to include the indicators relevant to the next five year plan.

Recommendation

The Universities' goals should be identified in relation to the United Nations 2030 goals on sustainable development
