Vice Chancellor's Message



It is with great pleasure I present the Annual Report of the University of Colombo for the year 2022.

The University was ranked 1st among Sri Lankan universities throughout the 2022 in the Webometrics Rankings. The Times Higher Education World University Rankings placed the University of Colombo within the top 601 – 800^{th} Universities among 1799 universities in 104 countries. Additionally, the university was ranked within 301 – 400^{th} Universities in Clinical, Pre-clinical and Health, 1001+ in Physical Sciences and 801+ in Social Sciences subject categories.

The Higher Education sector in Sri Lanka has been facing an unprecedented set of challenges from the beginning of the Covid-19 health crisis. Online education became the lifeline for the higher education sector to maintain minimum continuity during this period. The situation forced everyone to change their practices irrespective of willingness, capabilities, location, and resources. The new experience in online interaction introduced a new culture in all segments of the higher education sector, including Administration.

Despite all the challenges emerged, to align the University activities with its goals, nineteen (19) International Conferences were organized and successfully conducted and a total of 630 new research papers were published by the Campus/ Faculties/ Institutes during the year 2022 in order to disseminate research findings of the University.

Our student community has shown themselves to be resilient in digitization, virtual learning and remained as true "Made in UOC" products we all envision. Men's team of the UoC won the overall championship in the Inter-University Games in the year 2022 and a student of UCIARS has won first place in the University Student Startup competition organized by AHEAD operations together with ICTA to celebrate Global Entrepreneurship Week 2022, Sri Lanka. I am truly proud of students' achievements in studies, sports, performing arts and in community service alike achieved with discipline and dignity.

University of Colombo adopted and promoted Sustainable Development Goals in the year 2022. As stated in the 17th SDG Goal, University promoted Partnerships with domestic and international Universities, Institutions, and multilateral organizations. The University of Colombo also started to implement JICA Chair Programme in 2022.

We have been able to elevate the status of the University by promoting research, improving research profile and involving community outreach and industry collaboration. For achieving this, everyone in the university including the Academics and the Students actively involved and contributed.

Hence, I take this opportunity to express my gratitude to the Council, the Senate, the Registrar, the Bursar and all the other staff of the University for making 2022 a very productive year.

Highlights - 2022

- The University was ranked 1st among Sri Lankan universities during February and July 2022 in the Webometrics Rankings and The Times Higher Education World University Rankings placed the University of Colombo within the 601 800th universities among 1799 universities in 104 countries. Additionally, the university was ranked within 301 400th universities in clinical & Health, 1001+ in Physical Sciences and 801+ in Social Sciences subject categories.
- The University of Colombo has been able to advance in its rank from 297 in 2021 to 262 in 2022, out of the 956 universities which applied for this year's UI Green Metric Award. The University has also been ranked 02nd among the Sri Lankan Universities.
- UOC retained its top position among Sri Lankan Universities in the SCImago Institutions Rankings (SIR) 2022.
- The first ever radial endobronchial ultrasound procedure in Sri Lanka was performed on the 06th of January at the National Hospital of Sri Lanka by Dr Yamuna Rajapaksha of the Department of Anatomy, Genetics and Biomedical Informatics together with the team of the Central Chest Clinic. Dr Udari Liyanage of the same department also contributed with her expertise in medical imaging to carry out the procedure.
- A team from the Faculty of Medicine together with colleagues from the Ministry of Health carried out the first allogeneic bone marrow transplantation at the Lady Ridgeway Hospital for Children successfully. The team led by Prof Lallindra Gooneratne consisted of Dr Ruwangi Dissanayake and Dr Malik Samarasinghe who were involved as paediatrician and surgeon respectively.
- Diabetic Foot Conference (CDFC)2022 organized by the University Vascular Unit of the Department of Surgery and NIROGI Lanka Project of the SLMA was held successfully on 1st of February 2022 at the Surgical Auditorium Complex of the NHSL. This event was organized capacity building of healthcare professionals with special interest in the management of wound care amputation prevention inpatients with diabetes.

- The circulation standard commemorative coin to mark the 150th anniversary of Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo was officially presented to His Excellency Gotabaya Rajapaksa, the President of Sri Lanka by Hon. Ajith Nivard Cabraal, Governor of Central Bank of Sri Lanka at the Presidential Secretariat on 21st March 2022. Professor Chandrika N Wijeyaratne, the Vice Chancellor at the time, represented the University of Colombo at occasion. The coin with a face value of Rs.20/- and can be used for all payments in Sri Lanka.
- Patents received by the Faculty for the PhD project of Prof Priyanga Ranasinghe of Department of Pharmacology. Ceylon Cinnamon (Cinnamomum Zeylanicum) for reducing cholesterol capsule (International patent classification (IPC) A61K 36/54, A61K 36/481 (Date of Government publication in gazette22/01/2021) -Priyanga Inventors Ranasinghe. Privadarshani Galappatthy, Prasad Katulanda, Godwin R Constantine, M Ranil Jayawardana, GAS Prmakumara, HD Weeratunga. Nutraceutical composition for treating pre-diabetes, comprising Zinc sulphate compound (International patent classification (IPC) A61K 31/352, A61P 3/10 (Date of publication in Government gazette 22/01/2021) Inventors - Priyanga Ranasinghe, Privadarshani Galappatthy. Prasad Katulanda, Godwin Constantine, M Ranil Jayawardana
- The Colombo Medical Congress (CMC) 2022 is an international annual event of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo jointly organized by the Faculty and the Colombo Medical School Alumni Association (CoMSAA). This was held from 18th to 28th November 2022 at the Faculty with the option for online participation.
- 17th International Research Conference on Management & Finance (IRCMF - 2022) was held successfully on 21st November 2022 via a Virtual platform under the theme of "Challenges of Change in the Volatility." In addition, IRCMF 2022 is coupled with the salient events of the Doctoral Colloquium and Industry Dialogue.
- International Research Conference, an annual event organized by the Faculty of Management & Finance was held in October 2022 at the Faculty premises.

- The University of Colombo opened its Weidong Smart Classroom on the 17th of February 2022. The Smart Classroom was implemented in collaboration with the Southern University of Science and Technology (SUSTec) and the International Centre for Higher Education Innovation under the auspices of UNESCO (UNESCO-ICHEI), and it was sponsored by Weidong Cloud Education Group (Weidon Education), China.
- On March 21, 2022 the International Astronomical Union (IAU) officially named an asteroid to honour the University of Colombo. The University of Colombo alumnus, Dr Nalin Samarasinha, and fellow astronomer, Dr Tod Lauer, discovered this asteroid in 2000 from the Kitt Peak National Observatory in Arizona, USA. Recently, after its orbit was well established, the asteroid was assigned the number 607372 and the discoverers were granted the official discovery credit.
- The launching ceremony of the Coffee Table Book College House – the Cradle of Sri Lanka's University Education edited by Professor Sandagomi Coperahewa and Dr. Shravika Amarasekara was held on Saturday, 9th April 2022 at 3.00 pm at Senate Hall, College House, University of Colombo.
- Senior Professor (Chair) H.D. Karunaratne assumed duties in the Post of Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo on 12th April 2022 at the Vice Chancellor's office.
- The newly appointed Country Representative of the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) for Sri Lanka, Mr. Kunle Adeniyi visited the University of Colombo with his team to meet Senior Professor (Chair) H.D. Karunaratne, Vice Chancellor, University of Colombo, on 6th of July 2022.
- For the first time in the Sri Lankan University Sports history, the University of Colombo took the first step to introducing Blind Cricket to visually impaired students.
- The Committee of Vice-Chancellors and Directors (CVCD) Excellence Awards Ceremony 2020 was held on 2nd September 2022 in the Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall (BMICH) under the distinguished patronage of the Chief Guest Prof. Ranjith Senarathne, Chairman of the National Science Foundation and Guests of Honour Mrs Deepa Liyanage, Additional Secretary to the Ministry of Education and Prof. Sampath Amaratunge, Chairman of the University

- Grants Commission, Senior Professor N.D. Karunaweera, Department of Parasitology, Faculty of Medicine and Senior Professor L. Manawadu, Department of Geography, Faculty of Arts were awarded as the Most Outstanding Senior Researchers in the field of Health Science/Medicine/Dental Science/Veterinary Science/Allied Sciences and Humanities/Aesthetics/Social Sciences respectively. Dr W. V. A. Dinesha Samararatne, Department of Public and International Law, Faculty of Law was awarded as the Most Outstanding Young Researcher in the field of Management/Law.
- The Centre for Diagnosis and Research in Cancer (CeDARC) was awarded the Royal College of Pathologists (RCPath) achievement award for the year 2022.
- Dr Chathuranga Ranasinghe, The Director of the Sport and Exercise Medicine Unit Member of the Medical Committee, National Olympic Committee Sri Lanka | Senior Lecturer, Department of Allied Health Sciences, Faculty of Medicine, was awarded the 7th Sheikh Fahad Hiroshima-Asia Sports Medicine and Science Award in line with the Asian Games 2022, by the Hiroshima City Sports Association, Hiroshima, Japan at the General Assembly of the Olympic Council of Asia (OCA) (Mother organization of all 45 National Olympic Committees (NOC)/countries in Asia) on the 4th October 2022 in Phnom Penh, Cambodia.
- The Annual Research Symposium 2022 [ARS-UoC 2022] of the University of Colombo was held on the 16th of November 2022 on the theme "Digital Transformation and Innovative Approaches to Mitigate Challenges in the Higher Education Sector". It was organised in hybrid mode, with participants attending in person at the Prof. V. K. Samaranayake Auditorium of the University of Colombo School of Computing and online via Zoom, Youtube and Facebook.
- University of Colombo launched an Online Job Portal System "Gateway to the World of Work" on the 1st of December 2022 with the presence of the Vice Chancellor, Senior Professor (Chair) HD Karunaratna as the chief guest of the event.





1.5 OVERALL PERFORMANCE

In 2022, the University continued to deliver its academic activities through nine faculties and Campus composed of 63 departments of study.

The University of Colombo marched towards its goals with the assistance of 1825 staff members comprising 707 academics, 51 administrative, 56 academic support and 1011 non-academic staff members.





2.9 FACULTY OF NURSING

The Faculty of Nursing in the University of Colombo is the first and only Faculty that is dedicated for producing graduate nurses. It was established in 2017 by the order published in Gazette Extraordinary No. 2002/32 of January 18, 2017, to address a long felt need in Sri Lanka to strengthen and upgrade the nursing education. Faculty of Nursing offers a four-year bachelor's degree in Nursing (BScN) to those who enroll in the faculty (Sri Lanka Qualification Framework Level 6). There are two entry pathways to the faculty, where 70% of the students are selected from GCE A/L Biological Science stream and the remaining 30% are recruited through the lateral entry pathway for nurses with a diploma level education. Overall aim of the Faculty of Nursing is to enhance Sri Lanka's capacity to produce graduate nurses who are capable of catering for both national and international health care needs with advanced knowledge and skills which are based on a sound theoretical and practical foundation. At present 5 student batches consisting 462 students engaging academic activities.

2.12 "CYBER CAMPUS" - CENTRE FOR OPEN AND DISTANCE LEARNING

The "Cyber Campus" is the administrative entity of the University of Colombo to handle matters relating to its External Degree Programs (EDPs) and extension courses offered through the Faculties/Departments. It was first established as Virtual Campus of University of Colombo - Coordinating Centre in October 2011 as a self-financing Centre with the mission of 'to be a facilitator for expanded higher education through extension, distance and blended courses using advanced technology, thereby contributing to national development'. Virtual Campus of University of Colombo - Coordinating Centre was renamed as Virtual Centre of University of Colombo in June 2016. Again, in January 2019 it was renamed as "Cyber Campus" of University of Colombo in January 2019 with the view to attract more local and foreign students for higher studies through blended learning.

Vision

To be a self-sustaining centre of excellence for providing enhanced opportunities for higher education through open and distance learning environments.

Mission

To be a facilitator for expanded higher education through virtual, and blended learning environments using advance technology, thereby contributing to national development.

2.14 CENTRE FOR CONTEMPORARY INDIAN STUDIES (CCIS)

The Centre for Contemporary Indian Studies (CCIS) is a multidisciplinary research centre to promote activities connected with developing knowledge in Sri Lanka on contemporary studies in India and strengthening Indo-Lanka relationship through an institutionalized network between the two countries. It is the only research institution in Sri Lanka dedicated to the study of contemporary India. The CCIS was established in 2012 under a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between the High Commission of India in Sri Lanka and the University of Colombo. The Centre functions under the Faculty of Graduate Studies (FGS) for academic and administrative matters and it is also linked with other faculties through its Advisory Board and Management Board.

India and Sri Lanka are connected through social, religious, linguistic, cultural, economic and strategic ties that date back to several centuries. However, it is realized that significantly less importance has been placed on the study of contemporary developments and changes in India. By realizing that such research and study undertaken at a Sri Lanka's seat of higher learning will play an important role in guiding and strengthening the social and economic development of the country and existing bonds of friendship between India and Sri Lanka, this Centre for Contemporary Indian Studies will serve to deepen the understanding of contemporary India in Sri Lanka.

The chief function of the Centre is to provide an intellectual forum for academic staff and postgraduates working in the field of contemporary Indian studies and provide a base for research both for its members and in collaboration with other institutions. The Centre aims to serve as a focus for lectures, seminars and other research events in the field, including collaborative research projects. The CCIS welcomes links with other scholars, nationally and internationally.

Vision

To evolve and grow as an academic hub for promoting research and knowledge on contemporary India.

Objectives

- To develop knowledge in Sri Lanka on contemporary India through programmes of research, teaching, student/staff exchange and other academic activities which are not restricted to the University of Colombo.

2.15 Centre for the Study on Human Rights (CSHR)

Our Vision: To create a nation with a rights consciousness in which the dignity and rights of all people are respected.

Our Mission: To be a centre of excellence for human rights education and research using a multidisciplinary approach.

The experience of three decades in the field have imparted with the Centre for the Study on Human Rights (CSHR) the understanding and the capability to gauge the pulse of the society to craft new pathways to make its initiatives felt. CSHR came into existence in 1991 with the vision of creating a nation with a rights consciousness in which the dignity and rights of all people are respected; at a time when the human rights situation in the country was at a critical juncture due to the ethnic conflict and the war, as well as the southern insurrection. Human rights violations and abuses were unprecedented, widespread and atrocious.

The University of Colombo responding to the need of the hour in the country, brought human rights education into the public domain through the creation of CSHR. The CSHR is a non-profit educational institution attached to the Faculty of Law, University of Colombo. Its mandate is to conduct and facilitate human rights education and research programmes for the university community and the community at large, with the mission to be a Centre of excellence for human rights education and research using a multidisciplinary approach.

Being the first institution of its kind within the university system, CSHR gained recognition and acceptance as a leading human rights educational institute, which aims to disseminate human rights education to a wide cross-section of the population. During its 30-year existence, CSHR has carried out a wide range of activities in human rights education and research, reaching out to officials of the armed forces, police, prison officers and inmates, officers attached to the administrative arms of the State apparatus at all levels, lawyers, academics and other professionals at all levels, the university community, education sector, school children, community leaders, physically and socially marginalized groups and the public.

CSHR's activities are conducted under five key pillars. These are Education, Research, Capacity Building, Knowledge Services, and Institutional Development.

In terms of Education, CSHR conducts Human Rights programmes from postgraduate to certificate level, catering to the needs of diverse stakeholders and enhancing their understanding of their Constitutionally guaranteed rights.

In the area of Research, the CSHR carries out practically applicable research. Research conducted has been in relation to remand prisoners, legal aid in prisons, rehabilitation programmes in prisons, IDP's, children in remand homes, command responsibility, status of rights in the Eastern province and education level of Veddas, Exploring the concept of violence within post was Sri Lankan society, language rights and gender, among others.

With regard to Capacity Building, the CSHR continued to strengthen its partners in the area of rights and responsibilities with the objective of protecting the rights of others as well as theirs. The groups involved in capacity building are secondary and tertiary school students, preservice and in-service teachers, academics and non-academics, media personnel, differently abled persons, armed forces, police and prison officers, inmates, quazis, rural and plantation communities and the public among others towards their empowerment.

In the area of Knowledge Services, the CSHR continued to provide services and information through its Resource Centre to students, academics, researchers, and the public. The Centre also provided information through the electronic media in the form of the E resources accessible throughout the year.

In terms of Institutional Development, CSHR focuses on delivering programmes of high quality to those with whom the CSHR works. Towards this end, the CSHR made every effort to provide opportunities to its

Staff to improve their knowledge and skills, which will contribute to enhanced programmes and to the creation of a culture of human rights in the country.

With the main focus on human rights education and research, the CSHR is on its way towards becoming the key institute and the focal point of human rights education and research

The services of NEREC are available for both government and non-governmental organizations by way of seminars, workshops, capacity development training sessions and research, related to education and evaluation. Thus, NEREC is committed to create a vibrant research community dedicated to education research.

2.18 Staff Development Centre (SDC)

The Staff Development Centre (SDC), University of Colombo has successfully completed its twenty fifth year since its inception. The Staff Development Centre of the University of Colombo was launched in 1997 as the first SDC in the national university system in Sri Lanka, due to a need to commence and establish planned staff development in Sri Lankan universities.

The Mission of the SDC is "to enhance the quality of academic work undertaken by staff and students within the system of higher education in Sri Lanka, in general, and within the University of Colombo, in particular". In order to achieve this objective, the SDC facilitates to make university teaching/learning more effective, more relevant, student oriented and of internationally high standard. It also facilitates to develop skills and competencies necessary for more effective and efficient performance among all members of the staff of the University including academic and non-academic staff. SDC carries out related training programmes and workshops that assist in career development of university staff, within the available financial and human resource limitations.

Objectives and Expected Activities of SDC¹

- 1. To provide support and assistance to academic staff in developing and enhancing the various skills needed to fulfil academic tasks like preparation and reform of curriculum, teaching and research.
- 2. To provide support and assistance to non-academic staff in developing and enhancing the skills needed to fulfil various academic support services and activities.
- 3. To provide support and assistance to academic staff already in academic administrative positions (Heads of Departments, Deans of Faculties, Directors of Institutes and School, Rector etc.) or aspiring to take up such positions to acquire the skills and competencies required in the performance of academic administration.
- 4. To provide support to individuals and groups in the evaluation and review of teaching departments and other academic units, courses and programmes, and faculties.
- 5. To collaborate with individuals and groups throughout the University on projects which aim to enhance the quality of teaching and learning in the University.
- 6. To provide to teacher's objective student feedback services on request
- 7. To contribute to the policies and general procedures within the University which relate to teaching and learning.
- 8. To contribute to the wider field of research and scholarship related to higher education.
- 9. To undertake publications in the areas of university staff development in general, and teaching and learning in particular, to be used within the University of Colombo and other institutions of higher learning.
- 10. To develop linkages among domestic and foreign university staff development organizations with similar objectives.

- 11. To raise funds through domestic and foreign sources, with the approval of the University Council, to carry out its activities, if resources placed at its disposal by the University are found inadequate.
- 12. To build up a resource and information centre in subjects related to university course structures, curriculum changes, methodology of university teaching and learning and research.

Currently, the SDC is successfully continuing its contribution to develop university education in an array of well-focused and diversified training programmes targeting all academic, non-academic and other supportive staff members of the university.

The main regular course aimed at the academic staff is CTHE (Certificate of Teaching in Higher Education) which is accredited by Staff and Educational Development Association (UK) as well as by the University Grant Commission of Sri Lanka. Further, SDC conducted certificate courses in Disability Awareness and Sensitization for Academic Staff collaboration with the Centre for Disability Research, Education, and Practice (CEDREP), Faculty of Arts, University of Colombo.

In addition, the SDC conducted the workshop for Non-Academics in collaboration with the Centre for Disability Research, Education, and Practice (CEDREP), Faculty of Arts, University of Colombo.

The SDC of University of Colombo is making its significant contribution to enhance and to improve the capacity of academic and non-academic staff of not only University of Colombo but also other universities/institutes in Sri Lanka. During the year 2022, the SDC could successfully trains over 170 university staff members in different staff categories and from several universities in Sri Lanka, including applicants from private universities who also mixed readily with state university staff.

The SDC operates from its office complex in the University of Colombo.

2.19 SOCIAL POLICY ANALYSIS AND RESEARCH CENTRE (SPARC)

The Social Policy Analysis and Research Centre (SPARC) of the Faculty of Arts, University of Colombo, provides a focal point within the Sri Lankan university system for integrating research, training, policy analysis and advocacy on critical areas of social development in Sri Lanka. The Centre facilitates collaboration between university academics from different disciplinary backgrounds within the university as well as institutions outside the university system, including governmental and non-governmental agencies.

The establishment of the Centre was approved at the 273rd meeting of the Senate of University of Colombo, followed by a formal inauguration held on the 10th of June 2005 at the Sri Lanka Foundation Institute (SLFI), Colombo.

Objectives

- To facilitate independent research within Sri Lankan Universities on social development related issues
- To facilitate interdisciplinary exchange between scholars from different backgrounds.
- To provide training and improve the quality of social science education.
- To strengthen local expertise within universities in poverty reduction and social policy
- formulation.
- To identify opportunities for social policy reforms in Sri Lanka.

The Centre conducts its research in a selected number of focal areas where it can draw on sufficient expertise and knowledge from within the university. These focal areas are reviewed from time to time, keeping with new experience gained within the university and emerging critical issues that require expert attention.

2.23 Center for Quality Assurance (CQA)

The Center for Quality Assurance (formerly The Internal Quality Assurance Unit) is responsible for monitoring and coordination of the Quality Assurance (QA) activities of the university and coordinate the progress of IQACs (Internal Quality Assurance Cells). The CQA is placed directly under the Vice Chancellor and managed by a Director who is a senior academic staff member of the university (Currently Prof. Gominda Ponnamperuma of the Faculty of Medicine). The administrative and financial functions of the CQA are overseen by the 'CQA Standing Committee of the Senate', comprising of deans, directors, and academic coordinators of Internal Quality Assurance Cells from all faculties/institutes and the Campuses of the university as well as some senior administrative officers. The CQA Standing Committee meets monthly on a fixed university calendar date and is chaired by the Vice Chancellor. Its progress and activities are reported monthly at the Senate of the University of Colombo. The director CQA is also a member of the UGC Standing Committee on Quality Assurance and represents the University of Colombo. The Director reports on CQA progress to the UGC Standing Committee and also carries out coordination and implementation of all QA related activities through the Internal Quality Assurance coordinators who represent faculties, institutes and campuses of the University of Colombo. The deputy director assists the director in all activities related to quality assurance.

Vision

Strive to be a center of excellence of regional and international repute, building synergies between knowledge, education, research and entrepreneurship.

Mission

To be the benchmark setter for ensuring and improving the quality of university teaching, learning, assessment, research and academic governance with transparency, accountability, and reflexivity for transformative education.

2.29 CENTRE FOR COMBATING TOBACCO (CCT)

Centre for Combating Tobacco (CCT) is the Sri Lankan tobacco observatory established at the Faculty of Medicine University of Colombo under the Article 5.3 of the Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC). The aim of the CCT is to monitor the tobacco industry activities related to implementation of Article 5.3 in Sri Lanka and the region. Framework Convention on Tobacco Control (FCTC) is a treaty, an agreement under international law, adopted in May 2003 by the 56th World Health Assembly, of the World Health Organization (WHO). FCTC entered into force from February 2005, legally binding 181 ratifying countries as of 2019. FCTC Article 5.3 requires Parties to protect their public health policies from commercial and other vested interests of the tobacco industry.

CCT functions as a centre of the Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo (UCFM)

Activities done by the Centre/ Unit during 2022

- Investigative research conducted on Tobacco Industry interference and activities during COVID-19 globally and dissemination.
- Launched a new page series publishing the summary of reported incidents of Tobacco Industry Interference in South Asia, to commemorate the world no tobacco day.
- Providing the expertise for Public Health Fellowship, India and the webinar series.
- Participating in the National Symposium on Tobacco and Alcohol Prevention (NSTAP).
- Monitoring tobacco industry interference in the country and the region via Tobacco Unmasked app and hotspots.

2.30 Department of Communication and Creative Arts

(Formerly known as Journalism Unit)

The Department of Communication and Creative Arts (Formerly known as Journalism Unit) provides students with the opportunity to study Communication and Creative Arts. At present the Department caters to over 1100 undergraduate students. The Journalism Unit was established in February 1991 under the Dean of the Faculty of Arts. In May 1992, in collaboration with the Asia Foundation, the Unit inaugurated the first degree level programme in journalism at the University of Colombo. In 2003, the academic scope of the Unit was broadened in order to meet the current requirements, and the entire syllabus was fully revised to provide a wider spectrum of the discipline. The Department is now offering a honours degree in Communication and Creative Arts. The Journalism Unit has been upgraded to the departmental level as the Department of Communication and Creative Arts from January 2023. The Department has one Senior Professor, Three Lecturers and one Temporary Assistant Lecturer.

2.31 Arabic and Islamic Civilization Unit

The Arabic and Islamic Civilization Unit, in the Faculty of Arts, aims to have close collaboration and development in the areas of Islamic history and civilization, by extending its own offerings in language and civilizational studies, and by ensuring that students from all discipline of the Faculty have an opportunity to choose course or courses from a variety of course units teach about Islamic history and civilization, comparative religion and Middle Eastern studies.

In our program, we emphasize the creation of a broad understanding of the Islamic world through the understanding of Islamic history and civilization with understanding Islamic culture generally. In our language courses, students reach advanced levels of proficiency in both spoken and written Arabic. The program is designed to help undergraduates to develop their respective abilities in reading literary, religious, legal, and historical texts from all Islamic historical periods and the Muslim world to encourage cross-disciplinary interests, and an appreciation of diverse cultural values

Vision:

To be a prominent department at the university which contributes to the development of the University, and the nation as a whole.

Through teaching Arabic language and Islamic studies, developing moralities and guiding to carrier level achievements with the enrichment of an international language and a major world civilization. And, thereby serving the inter university community, the region and the entire nation.

The Center for Data Science (CDS) was established in 2016, under the Department of Statistics, Faculty of Science, University of Colombo to enhance collaboration between academics, students and industry in the field of Data Science. The vision of the CDS to be the center of excellence in research and development in Data Science in Sri Lanka and the mission of the center is to facilitate research and development in Data Science in Sri Lanka through collaborations with local and international expertise both from academia and industry.

The center strives to achieve the following objectives:

- To conduct collaborative research in the field of Data Science in collaboration with local and international academics and industry experts and to facilitate and promote postgraduate and undergraduate level research activities related to Data Science.
- To disseminate knowledge in Data Science through workshops, seminars and conferences and by conducting training programs on global certifications and career development.
- To facilitate and promote partnerships with local and international industry through consultancy projects providing them with technical expertise while enhancing skills of the students and academics in the application of Data Science techniques in the real world.

Annual Research Symposium 2022

The Annual Research Symposium 2022 [ARS-UoC 2022] of the University of Colombo was held on the 16th of November 2022 on the theme "Digital Transformation and Innovative Approaches to Mitigate Challenges in the Higher Education Sector". It was organised in hybrid mode, with participants attending in person at the Prof. V. K. Samaranayake Auditorium of the University of Colombo School of Computing and online via Zoom, Youtube, and Facebook.

The Annual Research Symposium unifies all symposia held by the respective faculties, institutes, campus, school, and the library of the University, promotes interaction among all the faculties and institutes and provides researchers with a platform to showcase their work. This year's Symposium was organized under the leadership of Senior Professor H. D. Karunaratne, Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo, and was chaired by Professor K. P. Hewagamage of the University of Colombo School of Computing. The inauguration ceremony of the ARS-UoC 2022 commenced with the lighting of the oil lamp by distinguished guests and invitees. The occasion was graced by the presence of Chief Guest Senior Professor Malik Ranasinghe, current Chairperson of the Information and Communication Technology Agency of Sri Lanka, and former Vice Chancellor of the University of Moratuwa. In his speech, Professor Ranasinghe spoke about the success of projects that attempted to introduce digital transformation in higher education, drawing on his involvement in initiatives such as the Open Learning Platform hosted by the University of Moratuwa. Before his speech, he launched the Proceedings of the ARS-UoC 2022, which presents the bulk of research work carried out in the University of Colombo last year. The publication carries a total of 256 abstracts and 20 abstracts of keynote speeches, orations or plenary lectures. The Campus, Faculties and Institutes have also published 371 abstracts and research papers in their respective 2022 symposia (some of these abstracts were included in the Proceedings of the ARS-UoC 2022). The Proceedings are now available at http://cmb.ac.lk/ars.

Three keynote speeches were delivered at the inauguration ceremony of the ARS-UoC 2022. The first of these was made by Mr. Ryotaro Hayashi, a social sector Economist from the Asian Development Bank. Mr. Hayashi spoke on "Digital Transformation Readiness of Sri Lanka's Higher Education", presenting data from a nation-wide online higher education survey that showed correlations between the rise and transformation of online higher education during the COVID-19 pandemic and the carryover effects of these shifts onto the current period of economic crisis.

Dr. Marito Garcia from the Darden School of Business Center for Global Initiatives, University of Virginia, USA addressed the gathering next, joining the ceremony virtually from the USA. On the topic "Towards a New Framework for Digital Transformation: Options for Sri Lanka's Higher Education", Dr. Garcia presented eight drivers of digital transformation for higher education institutions that could be used not only to evaluate the digital transformation of Sri Lanka's higher education institutes, but also to outline trajectories for the future.

Mr. Arjuna Nanayakkara, CEO of GTN Technologies representing Sri Lanka Association for Software Services Companies, presented the final keynote address. Speaking on "Transforming to a Digital Wave", Mr. Nanayakkara presented the industry perspective on higher education and emphasised the growing need for universities to recognise and adapt to ongoing paradigm shifts. In recognition of their contribution to the event, the University of Colombo honoured Professor Malik Ranasinghe, Mr. Ryotaro Hayashi, Dr. Marito Garcia, and Mr. Arjuna Nanayakkara with plaques presented by the Vice Chancellor of the University of Colombo and the Chairperson of the ARS-UoC 2022.

At this year's event nine researchers from the University of Colombo who were ranked among the world's top 2% of researchers were felicitated. In keeping with the theme of the Symposium, winners of Senate Awards for 2020 and 2021 were awarded digital certificates that recognised their contribution to the research profile of the University. These digital certificates are protected using encryption mechanism and can be verified using the printed badge which has a QR code. This is the first time such digital certificates encrypted using private/public keys have been issued at the University of Colombo. Hence, this could gradually be expanded to other certification in the future.

During the event, two videos showcasing the University's research profile and the ARS-UoC 2022 that were created by FoS Media and ADMT/UCSC were aired. Presenting a segment of Sri Lankan cultural practices, students of the Sri Palee Campus also performed a dance item at the inauguration ceremony. The ARS-UoC 2022 was attended by over 300 in-person participants, and 140 online participants through Zoom. The full event was webcasted through Youtube and had been accessed by more than 1000 users within the first 18 hours. Several media organizations participated in the event and publicity was provided through their channels.

Due to the present economic crisis, the event was budgeted using 50% of last year's allocation; we also received several sponsorships for the organization of the event. Asian Development Bank (ADB) and Sri Lanka Software Service Companies (SLASSCOM) sponsored two keynote speakers. The University of

Colombo School of Computing (UCSC) sponsored the venue and several other resources free of charge as the hosting Faculty of ARS-UoC 2022. It is important to mention that members of the Organising Committee volunteered to manage the event without any external event organisers. During the year 2022 newly 11 numbers children have been admitted to the Day Care center.

There were 32 children and the staff of one Pre-School teacher, one Day Care work-aid with an attendant were available during the year 2022.

Loan facility with free Interest (Rs. 75,000/-) to purchase laptop for the University students granted by the Ministry is processed during the year 2022 for all faculties.

CANTEENS

Number of 14 Canteens and 3 number of Milk Bars are available in the University at present. Out of these 03 Milk Bars, 01 Milk Bars as Highland is running by Milco (pvt.) Ltd. The University has already taken action to charge a monthly rental and monthly electricity charge from the Milco (pvt.) Ltd for the space provided them with effect from 01.09.2016.

The University Charges Rs. 1000/- as monthly rental and Rs. 5000/- as electricity charges per month from each canteen.

PHOTOCOPY SERVICE

There are 08 number of Photocopy Service Centers available at each faculty including Main Library. The University charges Rs.8000/- as monthly rental, Rs.5000/- as electricity charges per month and Rs.1500/- for an additional photocopy machine from each contractor.

ISSUING TABLETS COMPUTERS

Due to the current Covid 19 pandemic situation in the country, the University in collaboration with the University of Colombo Alumni Association has launched a program to provide the Tablet Computers to the students who has financial difficulties to attend the online lectures.

SEASON TICKETS

The University provides railway seasons for the undergraduates for a concession rate. (The University allows students to take railway season tickets subject to the condition that who did not receive hostel accommodation)

7. CAPITAL WORKS & PLANNING BRANCH

The main function of the Capital Works and Planning branch is planning, procurement, and monitoring of Capital building projects and large scale of Renovation projects of the University of Colombo according to the user department requirements. These functions include carry out the relevant pre- and post-procurement activities, monitoring the construction works, maintenance of projects' documentation and contract communication, certifying & issuing of interim payment certificates, settling of bills, handling disputes and coordinating of testing, commissioning, handling of Bonds and Insurances, Creation and retaining fund as security for remedying of defects & taking over on successful completion of the project.

The major capital projects, the Capital Works & Planning branch, during the year under review could be categorized as follows.

- I. Ongoing construction projects commenced in year 2017 and are progressing.
- II. Ongoing construction projects commenced in year 2018 and are progressing.
- III. Ongoing construction projects commenced in the year 2019 and are progressing.
- IV. Ongoing construction projects commenced in the year 2020 and are progressing.
- V. New construction projects which are pending cabinet approval.
- VI. Rehabilitation and improvements projects

Three ongoing construction and new construction projects were in progress in the year under review. Almost all the projects experienced some impact on project progress, and delays in mile-stone targets, including the delays consequent to the COVID-19 pandemic related isolation lockdown and curfew since March 11 – May 2020.

- 1. Construction and Completion of Proposed Building Complex for Pre-Clinical Department, Library, Canteen & Teaching Facilities at No.25, Kinsey Road, Colombo 08 for Faculty of Medicine, University of Colombo Balance Works.
- Total Cost Estimate is LKR 6,604 million.
- Contract Awarded amount LKR 4,707.56 million (Excluding VAT).
- The contractor of the project is Sanken Construction (Pvt) Ltd.
- The consultant of the project is State Engineering Corporation.
- The funding source is GOSL.

Current Status of the project

The construction works commenced in June 2017 and expected completion in 2022 with time extensions. However, the project experienced several delays due to COVID-19 pandemic related isolation lockdown and curfew from March 11 – May 2020 and on the lapses on the part of the contractor. The Contractor had agreed to complete the project in January 2022. However, with project complexity and risks continuing to increase and additional pressure due to work method changes and supply chain disruption, that decided to take 08.06.2022 as the practical completion date. The physical progress by the end of November 2022 is 99.9% and the cumulative expenditures up to end of November 2022 is LKR 5609.9 million (With VAT, Consultancy & Other payments).

II. Ongoing construction projects commenced in year 2018 and are progressing.

- 2. Proposed Student Service Centre for the Faculty of Science Premises, University of Colombo
- Total Cost Estimate is LKR 468.40 million.
- Contract Awarded amount LKR 439.25 million (Including VAT).
- The contractor of the project is the State Engineering Corporation.
- Funding source is GOSL.

Current Status of the project

The project was commenced in April 2018 and now expected to be completed in 2023. The project experienced several delays due to COVID-19 pandemic related isolation lockdown and curfew from March 11 – May 2020 and is still ongoing with some time extensions. The physical progress by the end of November 2022 was 82% and the cumulative expenditures up to end of November 2022 is LKR 319.6 million (With VAT).

III. Ongoing construction projects commenced in the year 2019 and are progressing.

3. Design and Construction of Proposed Help Zone Building, University of Colombo (Proposed Multi-Purpose Facility)

- Total Cost Estimate is LKR 599.616 million.
- Contract Awarded amount LKR 599.616 million (Including VAT).
- Contractor of the project is Kandy Constructions.
- Funding source is LKR 230 million from the GOSL funds and LKR 366.616 million from the University of Colombo Generated funds.

Current Status of the project

The project was commenced in September 2019 and now expected to be completed in June 2023. However, the project experienced several delays due to COVID-19 pandemic related isolation lockdown and curfew since March 11 – May 2020. The physical progress by the end of November 2022 was 86% and the cumulative expenditures up to end of November 2022 is LKR 462 million (With VAT).

IV. Ongoing construction projects commenced in the year 2020 and are progressing.

- 4. Construction of extension to the Library Building at Sri Palee Campus, University of Colombo
- Total Cost Estimate is LKR 60 million
- Contract Awarded amount LKR 50.76 million (Excluding VAT).
- The contractor of the project is Malalathunga Constructions (Pvt.) Ltd.
- The funding source is GOSL.

Current Status of the project

The project commenced in May 2020 and expected to be completed in February 2021. However, the project experienced several delays due to COVID-19 pandemic related isolation lockdown and curfew since March 11 – May 2020. Somehow, the Contractor of the project terminated by the University due to the poor working progress and estimating the amount for balance work is in progress. The cumulative expenditures up to end of November 2022 for the terminated Contractor is LKR 27.26 million (With VAT).

• Establishment of Faculty of Technology, University of Colombo Stage II - Phase I

This entails group work assignments where Colombo students have to engage intensely with Jaffna students in

1. General Information

1.1 Legal and Domicile Form

University of Colombo has been established under Universities Act No.16 of 1978. The main administration building is located at the College House, No.94, Cumaratunga Munidasa Mawatha, Colombo 03.

The Colombo Science & Technology Cell established as a limited Liability Guarantee Company in line with the first schedule to the Companies Act No.7 of 2007.

1.2 Principal Activities and Nature of

Operations

- a) to admit students and to provide instructions in any approved branch of learning;
- b) to hold examinations for the purpose of ascertaining the persons who have acquired proficiency in different branches of learning;
- c) to cooperate, by way of exchange of teachers, students and scholars or otherwise, with other Universities or institutions in Sri Lanka or abroad, having objects similar or substantially similar to those of the University;
- d) to provide Postgraduate courses, and for this purpose, to cooperate with other universities or authorities in Sri Lanka or abroad, in such manner and for such purposes as the University may determine:
- e) to grant confer degrees, diplomas and other academic distinctions to and on persons who have pursued approved courses of study in the university or in any recognized institution and who have passed the examinations of the University prescribed by By-laws;
- f) Research and disseminates knowledge as a co-activity.

Vision

To be a center of global excellence in education, research and stakeholder engagement to enrich human potential for the betterment of society.

Mission

To discover and disseminate knowledge; enhance innovation; and promote a culture of broad inquiry throughout and beyond the university through engagement and collaboration with industry and community.

1.3 Going Concern

The University has made an assessment of the University and its ability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that it has the resources to continue its entity for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, the Council is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the University's ability to continue as a going concern. Accordingly, University adopts the going concern basis in preparing the Financial Statements.

1.4 Financial Period

The Financial period of the University is from 01st January to 31st December 2022.

All accounting policies adopted by the University are consistent with those of the previous year, where necessary comparative figures have been adjusted to conform to the changes, in presentation of current year figures.

1.5 Basis of Preparation of Financial Statements

1.5.1 Statement of Compliance

The Financial Statements of the University of Colombo have been prepared and presented in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka.

These Financial Statements comprise the Statement of Financial Performance, Statement of Financial Position, Statement of Cash Flows, Statement of Changes in Equity and Notes to the Financial Statements.

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of the Financial Statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all periods presented in the Financial Statements unless otherwise stated.

The Financial Statements were not incorporated with the financial status of the University students' societies and Colombo Science & Technology Cell.

1.5.2 Basis of Measurement

The Financial Statements have been prepared on accrual basis and under the historical cost basis, except where appropriate disclosures are made with regard to fair value under relevant notes.

1.5.3 Comparative Information

Comparative information including quantitative, narrative and descriptive information is disclosed in respect of the previous period for all amounts reported in the Financial Statements, in order to enhance the understanding of the Financial Statements of the current period and to improve comparability, where necessary comparative figures have been re-arranged to conform to the current year presentation.

1.5.4 Responsibility and Approval of Financial Statements

The Council of the University of Colombo acknowledge their responsibility for the Financial Statements and were approved and authorized for issue by the Council on the meeting held on 08.03-2023.

1.5.5 Materiality and Aggregation

Each material class of similar items have been presented separately in the Financial Statements. Items of dissimilar nature or function have been presented separately unless they are immaterial.

1.5.6 Offsetting

Assets and liabilities, and revenue and expenses have not been offset unless required or permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.5.7 Functional & Presentation Currency

Items included in the Financial Statements of the University are measured using the currency of the primary economic environment in which the University operates (the functional currency). These Financial Statements are prepared and presented in 'Sri Lankan Rupees' (Rs.), which is the functional and presentation currency of the University.

1.5.8 Transactions of Foreign Currency

All foreign currency transactions are converted to Sri Lankan Rupees, which is the reporting currency, at the rates of exchange prevailing at the time the transactions were effected.

Foreign exchange gain/losses resulting from the settlement of such transactions and from the monitory assets of the year and are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance.

1.5.9 Rounding

The amounts in financial statements have been rounded-off to the nearest rupee, unless otherwise indicated as permitted by the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.6 Significant Accounting Estimates and Judgments

The preparation and presentation of Financial Statements, in conformity with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, require management to make judgments, estimates and assumptions that affect the application of accounting policies and reported amounts of assets, liabilities, income and expenditure. Actual results may differ from these estimates and judgments used.

Information about significant areas of estimates, uncertainty and critical judgments in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effects on the amounts recognized in the Financial Statements are as follows:

(a) Defined Benefit Plan

The cost of the retirement benefit plan of employees is determined using Projected Unit Credit (PUC) method. Such method involves use of assumptions concerning the rate of interest, rate of salary increase and retirement age. Due to the long-term nature of the plan, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.

(b) Changes in Accounting Estimates and Judgments

Any changes in accounting estimates and critical judgments are disclosed in the relevant notes to the Financial Statements.

1.7 Contingent Assets and Liabilities

Contingent assets and liabilities have been accounted in accordance with SLPSAS8. Accordingly, a contingent liability is a possible obligation that arises from past events whose existence will be continued by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the program or a present obligation that is not recognized because it is not probable that anoutflow of resources will be required to settle the obligation.

A contingent liability also arises in extremely rare cases where there is a liability that cannot be measured reliably. The uncertainty does not recognize a contingent liability but disclose its existence in the financial statement.

A contingent asset is a possible asset that arises from past events whose existence will be confirmed by the occurrence or non-occurrence of one or more uncertain future events beyond the control of the University. The University does not recognize contingent asset but discloses its existence where inflow of economic benefits are probable but not virtually certain.

1.8 Events after the Reporting Period

The materiality of events occurring after the reporting period has been considered and appropriate adjustments, wherever necessary, have been made in the Financial Statements.

2 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

2.1 Statement of Financial Performance

1. Revenue Recognition – Treasury and Other Grants

The Government grant for recurrent expenditure, income of research grant and projects, grants received for acquisition of assets and Donations have been recognized as revenue when they are received and other revenue are recognized on accrual basis.

Accounting for government grants

Grant Received form the treasury and the other agencies have been recorded and accounted inaccordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLIPSAS11) Revenue from Non exchange transaction (Taxes and Transfers)

Recurrent grant

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance as revenue received on nonexchange transaction and recognized on cash basis. In addition to that grants received and spent for rehabilitation of PPE, research and human capital development also recognize as recurrent grant in the statement of financial performance.

Capital grants and Donations

Capital Grants and Donations received by the way of treasury and other lending agencies to purchase Property Plant and Equipment have presented in the Financial Statements in accordance with the Sri

Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards (SLPSAS 11) Revenue from non-exchange transactions (Taxes and Transfers) .Fair value of the assets received as donation has been accounted as revenue in the year of received..

Internally Generated Revenue

Income from fee levying courses such as Course fee examination fee work shop fee registration fee and revenue from other activities are recognized on accrual basis over the period of the course and degree programmers as per the revenue from exchange transactions as per (SLPSAS 10). Course fee has been identified based on the percentage of completed method.

Finance income

Interest income is recognized on accrual basis using effective interest rate method.

2. Gains /losses from sale of property, plant and equipment

Net gains and losses on the disposal of property, plant and equipment are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance after deducting from the proceeds on disposal, the carrying value of the item disposed of any related selling expenses. In the case of any revalued asset, any balance remaining in the revaluation reserve account is transferred to the Statement of Financial Performance.

(a) Other Income

Any other income not specified under above categories is recognized on accrual basis.

(b) Income from Restricted Grants

Restricted grants are provided based on agreements, contracts or other understanding, where the conditions for receipt of the funds are linked to a performance of a service or other process. The University earns the contribution through compliance with the conditions that have been laid down and meeting the envisaged obligations. Income is not recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance, until there is reasonable assurance that the grants will be received and the conditions stipulated for its receipt have been complied with and the relevant expenses that it is expected to compensate has been incurred and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance. Receipt of the funds does not by itself provide conclusive evidence that the conditions attached to the contribution have been or will be fulfilled. Until the conditions have been fulfilled, the contribution is regarded as part of restricted funds.

On receiving any restricted grants, the grant is recognized in the Statement of Financial Position. Thereafter, on a systematic basis, an amount equivalent to that which has been spent on agreed "restricted" activities during the period, is taken to income. Unutilized funds are carried forward as such in the Statement of Financial Position.

2.1.2 Recognition of Expenses

- (a) Expenses in carrying all activities of the University are recognized on accrued basis and charged to the Statement of Financial Performance during the period in which they are incurred.
- (b) All expenses incurred in respect of undergraduate education have been charged to the government recurrent grant.

- (c) All expenditure incurred in the acquisition, or improvement of assets of a permanent nature in order to carry on or increase the learning capacity of the students has been treated as capital expenditure.
- (d) Expenses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the basis of direct association between cost incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency have been charged to revenue in arriving at the surplus/deficit for the year.

2.1.2.1 Project Expenses

Expenses in carrying out the projects and other activities of the University are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance during the period in which they are incurred and the basis for identifying project expenses are mainly on locations of the project, staff allocated to the project and projected activities of the project according to the project proposal.

Expenses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the basis of direct association between the cost incurred and the earning of specific items of income.

2.1.2.2. Operational Expenses

All expenditure incurred in the running of the University and in maintaining the capital assets in a state of efficiency has been charged against income in arriving at the surplus for the year.

Expenditure on examinations, seminars and courses are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on the accruals basis.

2.1.2.3 Finance Expense

Finance expense is recognized on accrual basis when it is paid or creates liabilities.

3. Statement of Finance Position

3.1 Current Assets

Current Assets classified in the Statement of Financial Position are those which will be recovered within one year after the Statement of Financial Position date.

3.1.1 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash & Cash Equivalents comprise cash in hand and the bank balances and short term deposits with an original maturity of three months.

3.1.2 Inventories & Stocks

Inventories are stated at the lower of cost and net realizable value. In general, cost is determined on a first-infirst-out basis and includes expenditure incurred in acquiring the inventories and bringing them to their existing condition and location. The Inventory of the University includes stationery, chemicals, consumables, pharmaceutical and maintenance items.

3.2 Non-current Assets

3.2.1 Intangible Assets

Acquired computer software licenses are capitalized on the basis of the costs incurred to acquire and bring to use.

Costs associated with maintaining computer software programmes are recognized as an expense as incurred. Costs that are directly associated with the production of identifiable and unique software products controlled by the University are recognized as intangible assets when the following criteria are met:

- (i) technically feasibility to complete the software product so that it will be available for use and the Management to complete the software product for use.
- (ii) ability to use the software product;
- (iii) ability to demonstrate how the software product will generate probable future economic benefits;
- (iv) adequate technical, financial and other resources to complete the development and to use the software product are available; and
- (v) the expenditure attributable to the software product during its development can be reliably measured.

Directly attributable costs that are capitalized as part of the software product include the software development employee costs and an appropriate portion of relevant overheads.

Costs relating to development of software are carried in capital work-in-progress until the software is ready for use.

3.2.2 Property, Plant & Equipment

Lands, Buildings, Laboratory and Teaching Equipment, Fixtures & Fittings, Library Books and Periodicals, Motor Vehicles, Cloaks and Other Assets include the items acquired out of government grants, research grants, internally generated funds, Foreign funded projects and donations.

In order to receive the ownership of the land at Homagama, Pitipana, Mahahenawatta provided by the Government to construct the Faculty of Technology, the University is requested to pay Rs.781 Million to the UDA and the Ministry of Education agreed to pay this amount last year.

Basis of Recognition and Measurement

Property, Plant and Equipment are recognized if it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the entity and the cost of the item can be reliably measured.

All property, plant and equipment are stated initially at cost and subsequently measured at cost less accumulated depreciation and any impairment losses. Repair and maintenance costs are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred. The carrying value of property, plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment when events or changes in circumstances indicate that carrying value may not be recoverable.

(i) Initial Recognition

Equipment costing less than Rs. 2,500 per individual item is typically written-off in the year of purchase. All other Equipment is capitalized on the basis of nature. Equipment is capitalized if it is tangible, has a life of more than one year. The life of an asset is dependent on its category within 8 categories, ranging from 4 to 20 years.

(ii) Subsequent Expenditure on Existing Property, Plant and Equipment

Expenditure incurred on tangible fixed assets is charged to the Statement of Financial Performance in the period it is incurred, unless it meets one of the following criteria, in which it is capitalized and is depreciated on the relevant basis.

- (a) Market value of fixed assets has subsequently increased.
- (b) Asset capacity improvement.
- (c) Sustainable improvement in the quality of output or reduction in operating cost.
- (d) Significant extension of the asset life beyond that has already been confirmed by repair and maintenance.

(iii) Cost Revaluation Model

- After initial recognition, University chooses the cost model to measure all items of property, plant
 and equipment in accordance with SLPSAS 7's requirement for that model i.e. at cost less any
 accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment basis.
- However, the Library books and periodicals which are reported at zero net book value are not
 reviewed for remaining useful life due to technical issue in reviewing the useful life. The useful life
 of the books depends on the content of the books and their usage. The usage may be reduced when
 the content is outdated. Therefore, it is difficult to get a reliable estimate of the useful life of the
 books.
- For the assets which are recommended for dispose by the Board of Survey are not reviewed for the remaining useful life of the assets according to the SLPSAS 7.

(iv) Buildings belongs to other Institutions

Buildings of the Institute of Biochemistry Molecular Biology and Biotechnology, School of Computing and National Institute of Library & Information Sciences located in the University land.

(v) Depreciation

Depreciation is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on a Straight-Line Method over the estimated useful life of Property, Plant and Equipment items from the date that they were made available for use. Lands are not depreciated. The estimated useful life periods are as follows.

Depreciation is provided from the date of purchase and up to the date of disposal, based on the period used.

(vi) Lease - Finance Lease

Leases in terms of which the University assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases. On initial recognition, the leased assets under property, plant and equipment, is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Minimum lease payments under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

During the year University paid Rs. 2,611,812 as lease rental.

(vii) Maintenance of Premises

The University has a maintenance plan which is reviewed periodically and forms the basis of the on-going maintenance of the assets. The cost of maintenance is charged to the Statement of Performance.

(viii) Library Books

Cost of the library books are written off on the straight line basis over a period of five years and action had not been taken to restate fully depreciated books.

(ix) Re-classification Computers and Accessories

Prior to 1st January 2022 Computers and Accessories were classified under two categories such as Lab and Teaching Equipment and Office and Furniture. In 2022 re-classified all Computers and Accessories under Lab and Teaching Equipment category with useful life of 5 years by removing all assets classified under office furniture equipment amounted to Rs.146.9 transferred to Lab and Teaching equipment category and adjusted accumulative depreciation accordingly.

3.2.3 Work in Progress

Work-in-progress is stated at cost, less any impairment losses. These are expenses of a capital nature, directly incurred in the construction of property, plant and equipment awaiting capitalization. Capital work-in-progress would be transferred to the relevant asset category in property, plant and equipment, when it is available for use i.e. when it is in the location and conditions necessary for it to be capable of operating in the manner intended by the University. Financial costs are not capitalized at part of additions to the fixed assets.

3.3 Current Liabilities

Liabilities classified as Current Liabilities in the Statement of Comprehensive Income are those that fall due for payment within one year from the date of the Statement of Financial Position. All known liabilities have been accounted for in preparing the Financial Statements.

(a) Creditors and Accrued Expenses

Creditors and Accrued expenses are measured at fair value and are subsequently measured at amortized cost using effective interest rate.

(b) Deferred Income

Deferred income results when invoices relating to Self Financing Activities (Study programmes) are raised at the commencement of the study programme where the study programme delivery take place over a period of several years. Deferred income is recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance to the extent of study programme delivery taken place and the balance attributable to the remaining course period is recognized as a liability on the Statement of Financial Position until income is recognized.

3.4 Non-Current Liabilities

(a) Employee Benefits - Retirement Benefits Obligations

Employee Defined Benefit Plan – Gratuity

Defined benefit plan is a post-employment benefit plan, other than a defined contribution plan. The defined benefit is calculated by an independent actuary using Projected Unit Credit (PUC) method. The present value of the defined benefit obligation is determined by discounting the estimated future cash outflows, using interest rates that are denominated in the currency in which the benefits will be paid and that have terms to maturity approximating to the terms of the related liability. The present value of the defined benefit obligations depends on a number of factors that are determined on an actuarial basis using a number of assumptions about discount rate, future salary increments and mortality rates. Due to the long-term nature of these plans, such estimates are subject to significant uncertainty.

All assumptions are reviewed at each reporting date. Accordingly, the employee benefit liability is based on the actuarial valuation as of 31st December 2022. The University accounting policy for gratuity is to recognize actuarial gains and losses in the period in which they occur in full in the statement of other Financial Performance.

(b) Defined Contribution Plans – Employees' Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund

Employees are eligible for Employees' Provident Fund Contributions and Employees' Trust Fund Contributions in line with respective statutes and regulations. These are recognized as an expense in the Statement of Financial Performance as incurred. The University contributes 7%, 8% and 3% of gross emoluments of the employees' salaries to University Provident Fund, University Pension Fund and Employees' Trust Fund respectively. Employees also contribute 10% to the University Provident Fund. However will haveno legal or constructive obligation to pay further amounts. This obligation falls within the scope of the defined contribution plan SLPSA 19 on employment benefit. Obligation for contribution to define contribution plan are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performances as the related service is provided.

3.5 Reserved and Restricted Funds

Accounting for the Receipt and Utilization of Funds, Grants and Reserves.

The University received various grants for specific development activities, student activities, endowment etc. Funds, grants and reserves have been classified as endowment funds and Designated funds

(a) Endowment Funds

Where assets are received as an endowment, which are not exhausted, only the income earned from such assets may be recognized and used as income.

Investments income and other gains realized from funds available under each of the above categories.

(b) Designated Specific Funds

Surplus on income over expenditure of the activities are generally accounted under Designated General funds in the University, Statement of Financial Position. Designated General Funds include funds set aside for specific or committed purpose such as planned operational activities of faculties, departments and self-financing activities of the University.

3.6 Equity

(a) Capital Grant

Government Capital Grant is recognized as per Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 11.

Donated tangible fixed assets, except for non-depreciable fixed assets donated for use of the University are valued and taken to Accounts as per Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards 11.

(b) Recurrent Grant

Recurrent grants are recognized in the Statement of Financial Performance on cash basis and treated as a revenue form non exchange transaction

4. Statement of Cash Flows

The cash flow statement has been prepared by using the Indirect Method in accordance with the SLPSAS where by gross cash receipts and gross cash payments of operating activities, finance activities and investing activities have been recognized. Cash and cash equivalents comprise short term, highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value.

5. Taxes

5.1 Income Tax

University of Colombo is not liable to pay income tax on its income of the ordinary course of the business as Universities are considered as an exempt organization as per the Inland Revenue act no.24 of 2017 and amendments there to.

5.2 Advance Personal Income Tax (APIT)/Advance Income Tax

The University deduct Advance Personal Income Tax (APIT) as per the consent of the employee on primary income and secondary income and remit the deducted amount to the Department of Inland Revenue.

5.3 Social Security Contribution Levy (SSCL)

The University of Colombo is liable for SSCL. Accordingly, the university has provided Rs.4,561,867 for as SSCL payable for the period of 01-10-2022 to 31-12-2022.

5.4 Stamp Duty

Stamp Duty is deducted on payments as per the Stamp Duty act and remint the deducted values to the Department of Inland Revenue.

The University of Colombo adhere to the changes in tax laws in the country and tax is charged accordingly.

3. Mahapola, Bursary and Scholarships

Mahapola Higher Education Scholarship Trust Fund has transferred students Mahapola Scholarship installment directly to students' bank accounts from April 2019. Mahapola Trust Fund and UGC spent Rs.57.09 and Rs.54.83 Million during the year as Mahapola Scholarship respectively. Further, University GrantCommission paid Rs.54.168 Million as Bursary to the undergraduate students.

4. Advances and Receivables

A sum of Rs.138.9 Million is due from employees who breach of bonds and agreements as at 31.12.2022. Legal Action has been taken against them.

6. Lease – Finance Lease

Leases in terms of which the University assumes substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership are classified as finance leases. On initial recognition, the leased assets under property, plant and equipment, is measured at an amount equal to the lower of its fair value and the present value of minimum lease payments. Subsequent to initial recognition, the asset is accounted for in accordance with the accounting policy applicable to that asset.

Minimum lease payments under finance leases are apportioned between the finance expense and the reduction of the outstanding liability. The finance expense is allocated to each period during the lease term so as to produce a constant periodic rate interest on the remaining balance of the liability.

During the year University paid Rs. 2,611,812 as lease rental.

7. Construction of the Seventeen Storied Building for the Faculty of Medicine

During the year of 2022, 17 stores pre-clinical building of the Medical faculty which was constructed by theloan taken by the ministry, General Treasury and the university funds was capitalized Based on the actual construction cost incurred .Accordingly Rs.7,783,484,720.78 was capitalized as Building which comprised value accounted as working progress reported in the previous years and the value of the bills paid during theyear and bills payable.

8. Kalinga Mawatha Hostel

UDA handed over 12 storied housing complex to the University during the year of 2022 for hostel. The construction cost of Rs.847,891,236.51 Million was capitalized as a new building on 15-02-2022. The building has been transferred to the university by the UDA just after completion of the construction.

The process of acquiring the legal ownership of the land to the University was not completed as at 31-12-2022. Land value is not given by the UDA during the year the University will take action to value the land and taken to accounts when legal transferring process is completed.

9. Retirement Benefit Obligation

- c) As at the end of the year under review, the University had failed to recover the debt of Rs. 5,000, 000granted to the Institute for Agro-Technology and Rural Sciences (IARS) in year 2018 from the University Development Fund.
- d) As at the end of the year under review, no action had been taken to settle the payable balances amounting to Rs. 20,663,677 which has a time lapse over 1 to 3 years.
- e) The auditorium of the Faculty of Law that had been developed in the years of 2020 and 2021 incurring an expense of Rs. 16,930,946 had not been utilized even by the end of the year under review, since the chairs required for the auditorium had not been purchased.

2.3 Other Matters

(a) The University had failed to collect Rs. 138,919,322 due from thirty four (34) lecturers who violated agreements in spite of a time lapse ranging from 1 to 35 years. The due amount from 12 officers who terminated service in 2022 while still being overseas aggregated to Rs. 72,294,305.

Thirty nine lecturers have violated the bond agreements as per the audit query as at 31.12.2022 and the current status regarding these lecturers as at 08.08.2023 is as follows.

Out of these thirty nine lecturers who violated the bond agreements, thirteen breached the agreements in the year 2022. The current status regarding these thirteen lecturers are as follows.

- Three lecturers have settled the full amount of the bond as at 2023.08.08. The University has recovered an amount of Rs. 15,351,346.59 from those three lecturers.
- An amount of Rs. 23,295,520.09 has been recovered from three lecturers as a part of the due bond amount, through direct payments and gratuity. They have expressed their consent for the remaining balance to be recovered through their pension and UPF. The pension and UPF release forms have been submitted to the University Grants Commission.
- An amount of Rs. 11,327,657.65 has been recovered from a lecturer as a part of the due bond through pension, UPF and direct payments. He has agreed to pay the remaining balance within a year in installments. Accordingly, an amount of Rs. 982,016.33 (including the interest) has been recovered from him in three installments. As at 08.08.2023, a total amount of Rs. 12,309,673.98 has been recovered from him including the interest.
- Two lecturers have paid a part of the due bond amount and have made a request asking for a short extension period to make the remaining due payment. Accordingly, actions are underway to recover the due payment.
- The Attorney General's Department has been informed to take legal

actions against a lecturer as he has neglected making the due payment. At the same time, UPF forms have been submitted to the University Grants Commission in order to obtain the provident fund to the University as per the provisions of the section 15 (a) of the bond agreement. However, a memo has been submitted to the Council to reinstate this lecturer in service, as per the circular no. 04/2023 dated 13.07.2023.

- The due bond amount of one lecturer can be totally recovered from his pension, UPF and gratuity. The relevant pension and UPF release forms have been submitted to the University Grants Commission.
- Actions are underway to recover the due bonds of two lecturers.
- Accordingly, an amount of Rs. 61,338,797.68 has been recovered from these 13 lecturers as at 08.08.2023 including the interest.

The remaining twenty six lecturers except the above mentioned thirteen are those who violated the agreements before 2022. The current status regarding these twenty six lecturers are as follows.

- Ten lecturers who violated the agreements before 2022 have settled their due bond amounts along with the interest. Accordingly, an amount of Rs. 61,675,347.85 has been recovered as at 08.08.2023. Among these, one lecturer has paid the total bond amount of Rs. 3,881,337.87 and his lawsuit has been closed. His total settled bond amount has also included in this payment.
- A lecturer who violated the agreement before 2022 has paid the due amount in installments. A total amount of Rs. 6,362,722.12 has been recovered from him, including the interest.
- Actions are being taken to recover the bond amount of two lecturers

through their pension and provident fund. Arrangements will be made to recover the due amount after making an agreement regarding the period related to the contributor liability. Out of the bonds amounting to Rs. 19,085,509.22 due from the two lecturers, an amount of Rs. 13,200,826.40 has been recovered as of 08.08.2023.

- Also, three lecturers who violated the agreements have made the full payment of the due bond, yet they have continuously refused paying the interest of the due amount. Actions are underway to recover it.
- Legal actions are underway regarding seven lecturers who violated the
 agreement. The Legal and Documentation branch of the university has
 been assigned to take further necessary action. Hence, the Legal and
 Documentation Branch of the University is working on recovering the
 due amounts.
- Also, two lecturers who violated the agreements have made the full payment of the due bond, yet they have continuously refused paying the interest of the due amount. As per a decision of the Bond Committee, it was decided to write off the total amount of the due interest of Rs. 61,869.21 with the consent of the 609th Council meeting, since taking legal actions to recover it is futile.
- Legal actions are being taken as per a decision taken at the fifth Bond Committee meeting, against a lecturer who does not pay the due amount regularly.
- As at 08.08.2023, an amount of Rs. 164,219,416.10 has been recovered including the interest from the aforesaid 26 lecturers who violated the bond agreements.
