Objectives

- To develop the life skills and personality of both male and female youth
- To provide vocational education, vocational training and the referral to employment opportunities

Major Duties

- To organize the activities related to the recruitment of male and female cadets for the Life Skill Course of the National Youth Corps and make recruitments thereto
- To map out the Life Skill Course appropriately and see to its implementation
- To conduct the Information Technology Course and the English Language Course
- To direct the male and female youth completing the Life Skill Course to vocational training and arrange for their job placements
- To provide life skill training to external parties in addition to the internal male and female cadets
- To see to the conduct of the hotel school and the courses of training in relation thereto
- To make a contribution towards the improvement of both aesthetic skills and sports skills of the male and female youth
- To ensure the proper implementation of the management of physical resources in the organization

Message of the Chairman

The competitive nature of the existing education system does not play an effective role in developing the life skills of young people. In such a background, the Youth Corps is in the process of implementing what it calls the development of life skills of the community of youth as its prime task.

The first three months of this program is earmarked for life skills training and the next trimester is reserved for practical training in the subjects of Information Technology and English Language. It is also especially noteworthy in this regard to create skilfulness in computer technology as well as the ability to handle the English language among young people. Centers of 55 youth corps across the island undertake non-stop training courses to improve these life skills, and the participants of the courses also have the opportunity to acquire an internationally recognized City & Guild certification. The cadets who successfully complete this course will be referred to a recognized professional training institute in the state or private sector for appropriate training according to their skills and interests. A scholarship will also be awarded to young people who show special talents in the basic course to pursue a vocational training course worth up to one hundred thousand rupees. The National Youth Corps also provides guidance and facilities for vocational training to all of its community of young cadets who have gone on to complete the basic courses.

In addition to this, the Youth Corps has been able to positioning itself by developing the strategy of vocational education and job training according to the needs of the youth and creating self-operational vocational training institutes such as the Dambulla Hotel Training School in conjunction with the third-party vocational training system. The young cadets undergoing training at the hotel training school will be directed to job training in the leading hotels in the island and will be employed in the same work places. In addition to these courses, a bungalow caretaker course was also initiated by the hotel training school in 2022 as a new introduction.

Opening up a new path in the field of vocational training, the Youth Corps was also able to launch several job-oriented vocational training courses jointly with public and private sector institutions in the year 2022. It was also able to implement foreign language (Chinese, Japanese, Korean)

training programs in 14 training centers and undertake training courses to train and build up young men and women with ability in singing, playing music and dancing as professional artists in the Yakkala Aesthetic Institute and to introduce them to the related field. It was also a great impetus on the part of the Youth Corps that it was in a position to initiate training courses in volleyball, netball, archery and air rifle shooting at the Divulapitiya Sports Training Center towards achieving a comprehensive youth development drive.

In addition to these training programs, the Youth Corps also conducts leadership and personality development training programs for school student leaders and skill-based life skills training programs for other public and private sector staffs, having them designed according to the needs of each institution. Also, the interim budget of 2022 that stressed the need of "special vocational training program implemented with the aim of facilitating new jobs based on skills" was conducted by the National Youth Corps as an accelerated efficient and effective program.

Accordingly, the National Youth Corps expresses its great pleasure that it was able to carry out a viably lasting mission for the development of the youth in the country despite various difficulties encountered in the past few years. I would like to extend my thanks and gratitude to the Secretary of the Ministry of Youth and Sports including all members of the Ministry's staff and the Board of Directors and the entire staff of the Youth Corps for their support and sacrifices.

I fervently hope that the year 2023 will be an auspicious year that gives us the continued strength and courage to lead the Sri Lankan youthfulness to a prosperous future with further empowerment.

The National Youth Corps which has identified its ongoing objective as the bridging up of the skill gap in the community of youth, is committed to implementing life skills training programs as a youth development strategy to fill that hiatus. In addition, the youth will be given the opportunity to learn the necessary aptitudes associated with it, such as learning English language and IT skills, and they will also be directed to vocational education and job training whilst efforts are made to nurture the youth with new attitudes and socially integrate them as a productive economic human.

2. Training and Development Activities

It is a matter to be happy that the Youth Corps has been able to accomplish an excellent mission towards the discipline, leadership and personality development of the community of youth in Sri Lanka over the past twenty years.

The primary role of the National Youth Corps is :

- a. Youth development; and
- b. Vocational education and job-oriented training.

In the exercise of carrying out the task of youth development, the Youth Corps has chosen life skill development in the youth as its primary strategy. Accordingly, a three-month life skills training course is in operation across the 55 youth corps training centers in the island. The course awardees will also have the opportunity to obtain an internationally recognized City & Guild certification by virtue of this course. Also, a three-month Advanced Certificate Course is being conducted by the Youth Corps in collaboration with an institution recognized by the University Grants Commission in order to develop the IT skills and English language skills needed to empower the youth. Any young man or woman between the ages of 16 and 29 can participate in this course and the trainees who are enrolled in the course are called "Youth Cadets". The aim of the concept of youth cadet is to produce a citizen with high qualities such as national discipline, patriotism, commitment to national development and pride in work.

Following activities can be identified as other youth programs undertaken by the Youth Corps :

- a. Implementation of foreign language training programs in 14 training centers. (Chinese, Japanese and Korean languages are operational);
- b. Conducting training courses to groom young people with singing, music playing and dancing abilities as professional artists at Yakkala Aesthetic Training Institute and introducing them to the related field;
- c. Commencement of the training courses in volleyball, netball , archery and air rifle shooting at Divulapitiya Sports Training Center.



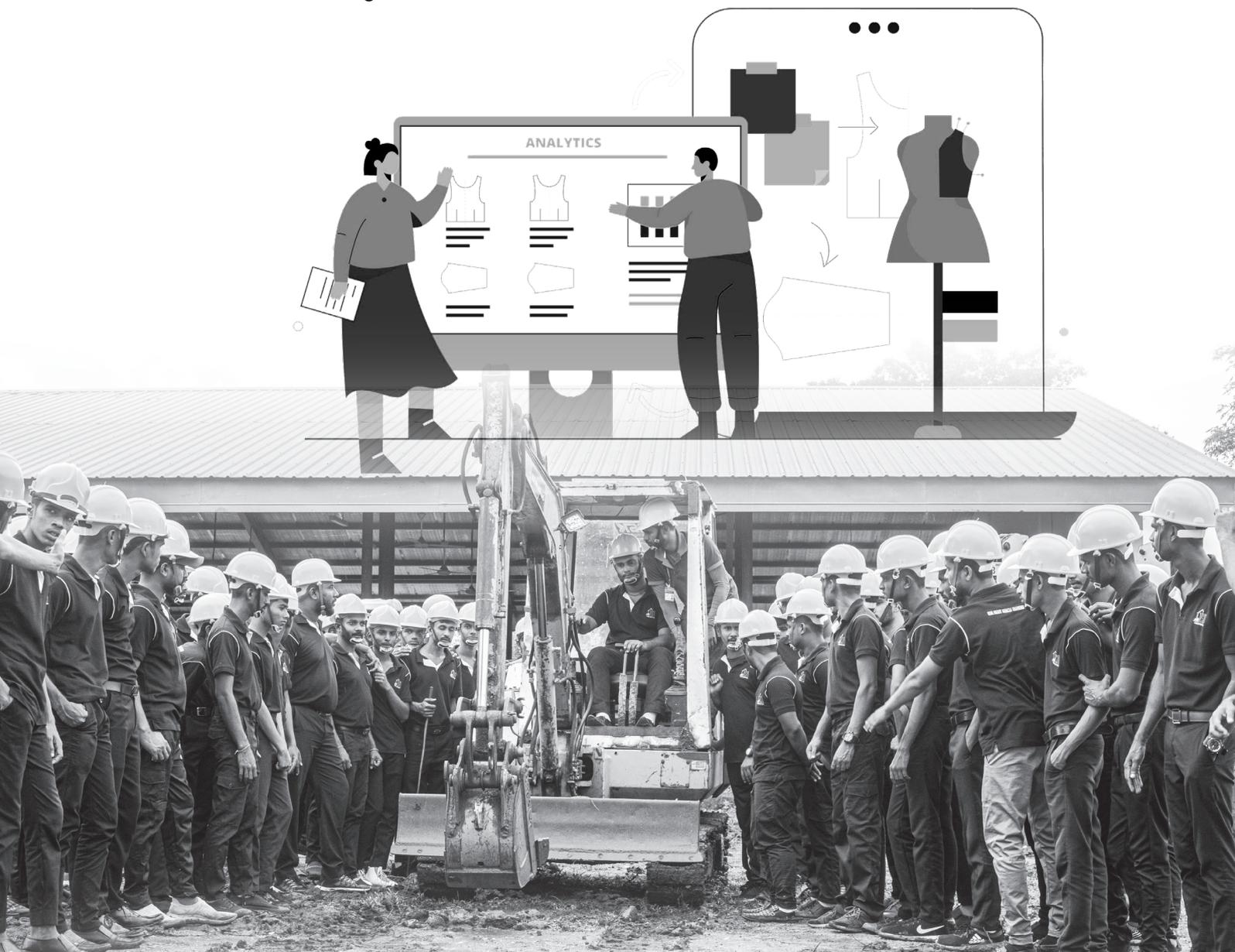
The fact that these training courses are designed for the development of professional skills based on life skills is also a great help for a complete process of youth development.

In addition to these training programs, the Youth Corps also conducts leadership and personality development training programs for students of schools and talent-based life skills training programs for other public and private sector staffs designed according to the needs of the respective institutions.

Even though the Youth Corps is not supposed to be a traditional vocational training institution, it performs a unique task in the field of vocational education and job training. The National Youth Corps is in possession of an ability that no other vocational training institute has. That is to say, the National Youth Corps is capable of providing vocational training to the youth by coordinating any public or private vocational training institute in the island. Accordingly, the young cadets who successfully complete the life skills training are directed to a professional training that matches their ability and interest pursuant to a proper and accurate socio-metric testing method. Young cadets who excel especially in the Life Skills Training Course will be given the opportunity to pursue any vocational training course worth up to one hundred thousand of rupees.

Opening up a new path in the field of vocational training, the Corpse was also able to jointly launch several job-oriented vocational training courses during the year 2022 with the following institutions.

- Apparel Industry Courses - Sri Lanka Textile Garments Institute
- Caregiver Course - Lanka Hospitals Private Limited
- Heavy Equipment and Machinery Course - RSM Institute, Galle
- Diamond Cutting Course - Diamond Cutters Institute



It is also a remarkable fact that the young cadets have directly entered the professional training field by virtue of the courses operational in the hotel sector through the hotel training school situated in Inamaluwa, Dambulla, which is under the purview of the National Youth Corps. The young cadets undergoing training at the hotel training school will be directed to job training for leading hotels in the island and asked to be employed there. In addition to these courses, a bungalow caretaker course was also started by the hotel training school during the year 2022 as a new introduction.

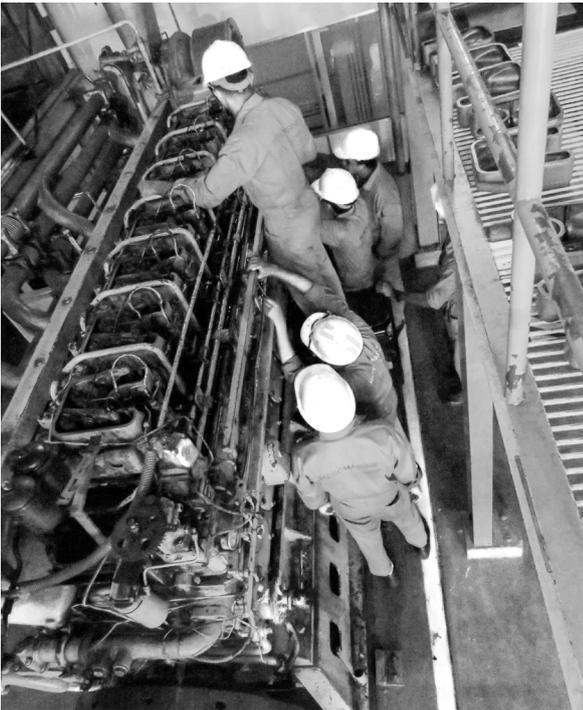
Currently, pre-school training courses based on life skills have also been commenced for pre-school wardens and the pilot program in that regard was implemented at Madirigiriya Training Centre.

Furthermore, the interim budget of 2022 proposed program, "special vocational training program implemented with the aim of facilitating new jobs based on skills" was conducted by the National Youth Corps as an accelerated efficient and effective program. The following courses were implemented in conjunction with recognized professional training institutes to cater to the demand of the job market, opening up easy avenues to employment opportunities.

Apart from this, as a leadership and personality development exercise, adventure-based training is one of the components of youth development process of the National Youth Corps, and these programs are conducted at the center of outbound adventure-based training at Naula as its pivotal point. Any public or private institution in the island can avail the service through this center to add to the enhancement of the efficiency of their staff members and to groom them with leadership and personality qualities. Also, all the training centers in the island currently have the facility areas for outbound adventure-based endurance training, commencing from the year 2022.

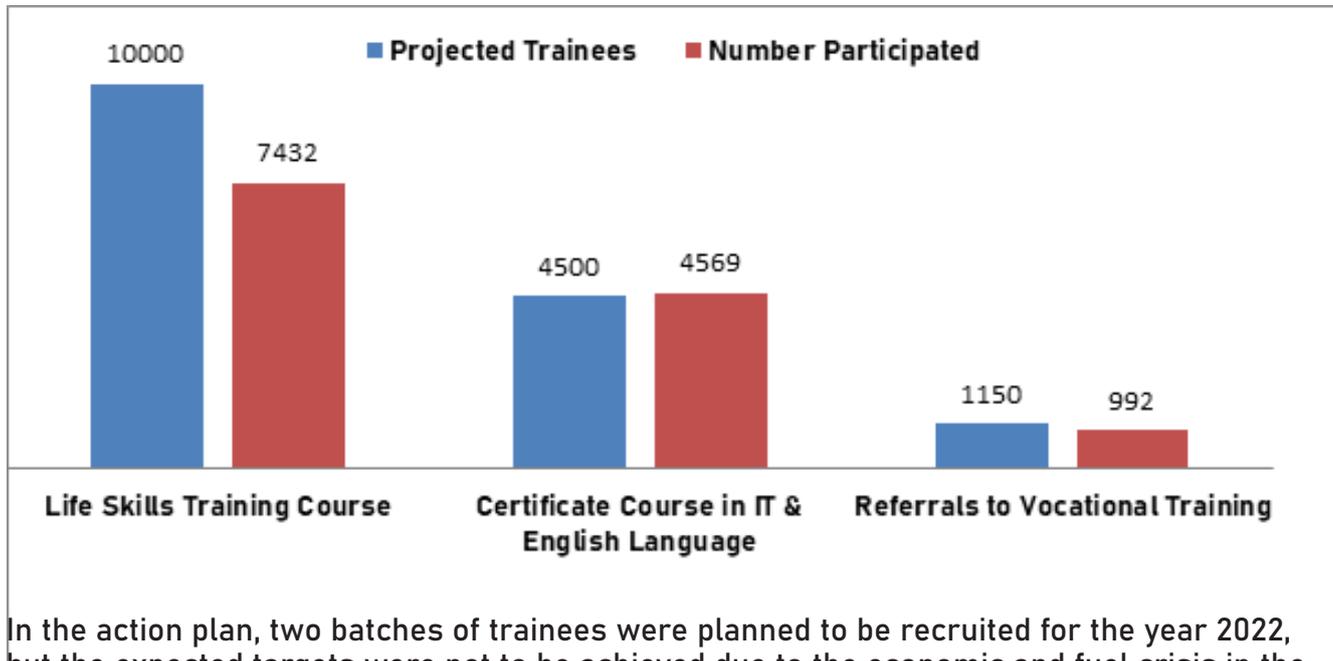
3.1 Training and development programs (Young Male and Female Cadets)

number of trainees referred to vocational training as at 31.12.2022 is 992. As the vocational training courses relating to the respective vocational fields selected by some of the trainees were started in the year 2023, they have been directed to vocational training during that year. The number of trainees involved therein were 116. Accordingly, the actual number of trainees referred to vocational training in relation to the year 2022 is 1108.



In the action plan, two batches of trainees were planned to be recruited for the year 2022, but the expected targets were not to be achieved due to the economic and fuel crisis in the country at the time of recruitment. Accordingly, the re-recruitment was started in October 2022 and the third batch made its way in. As such, 03 courses have been arranged to have taken place for this year.

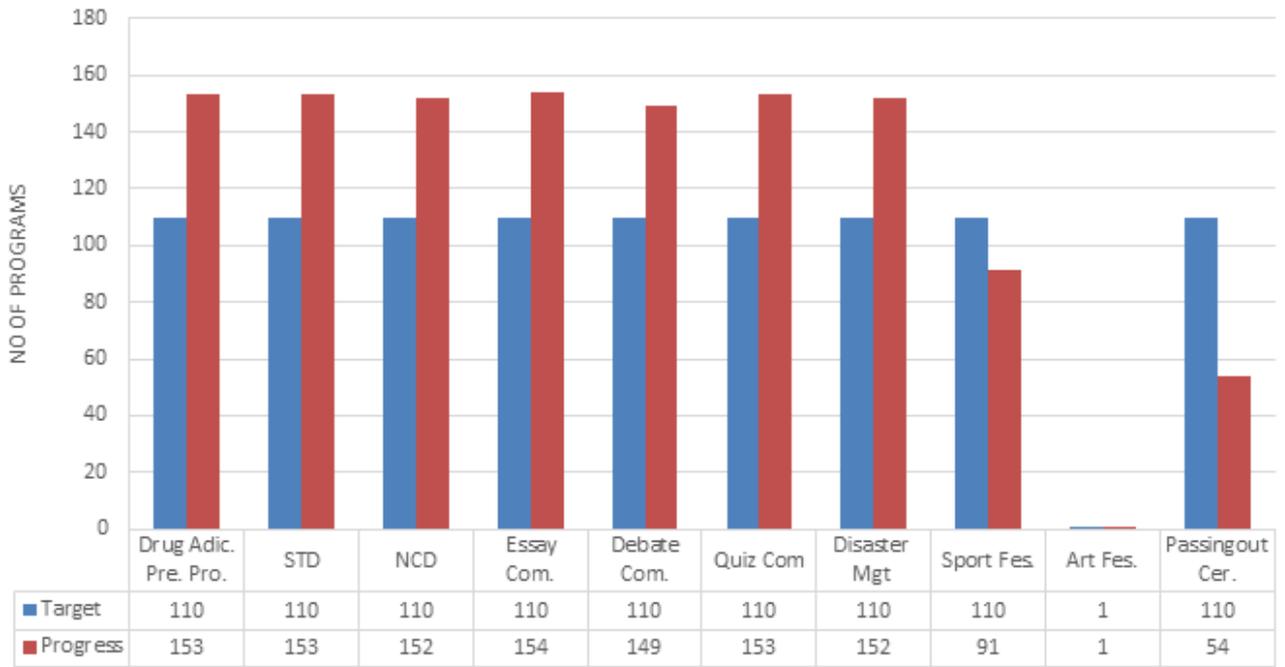

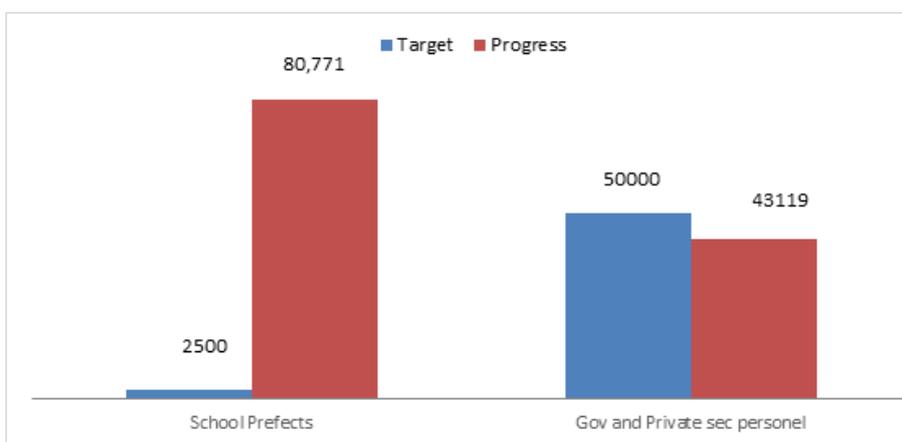

04 Training Courses

4.1 Life Skills Training Course

The youth turns out to be a very important social factor in every country, and the economic growth of a country as well as the national security depends on the youth in a very large scale. It is considered as one of the prime needs of any country to build the youth as a complete group of community full of skills replete with qualitative attributes. The most important thing here is to establish and inculcate life skills in students. A student who has not come up with life skills in himself does not have the attitudes of trying to understand the very essence that would allow everyone to live in a better society. Sri Lanka's education system has not yet been reformed to meet the above needs. Currently, the labor market is looking for life skills along with competencies in hard skills in the new aspirants of employment. In a backdrop where the need for a training program to establish life skills in the Sri Lankan youth is apparent to be very grave at present, the National Youth Corps is currently playing the role of the foremost government institution to fill that void.

In addition to keeping nationally recognized certifications on offer by the National Youth Corps, it has become the only institution in South Asia to gain international recognition for a life skill development course offering accredited hard skill and life skill certificates having entered into agreement from the year 2022 onwards with City & Guilds which is a global leader in skill development, being in the related field with more than 140 years of experience in skill development, social mobility, prosperity and success.

The City and Guilds of London Institute (CGLI) was established in the city of London in 1878. The institute, City and Guilds is a worldwide organization known for its social, economic and especially, educational development. This move has given the opportunity to conduct training and educational activities associated with the courses of the National Youth Corps in keeping with the international standards. Furthermore, the trainees have been provided the



opportunity to enter the local and foreign job markets and work hard with the Chartered Life skill Instructors and other staff personnel of the National Youth Corps. The City and Guilds Institute constantly keeps on overseeing and monitoring the life skills course of the National Youth Corps and its evaluation process.

Pursuant to the agreements entered into with the partner institutions as such, more opportunities are kept open for Sri Lankan youths to have exposure to capacity development as well as to gain access to opportunities of acquiring foreign labor market placements.

This course has been designed in order that the young men and women can acquire the necessary knowledge through various activities in such a way that they are not confined to a classroom and receive theoretical and practical training. This course is conducted free of charge by qualified instructors on the subject at 55 National Youth Corps Training Centers spread out all over the island.

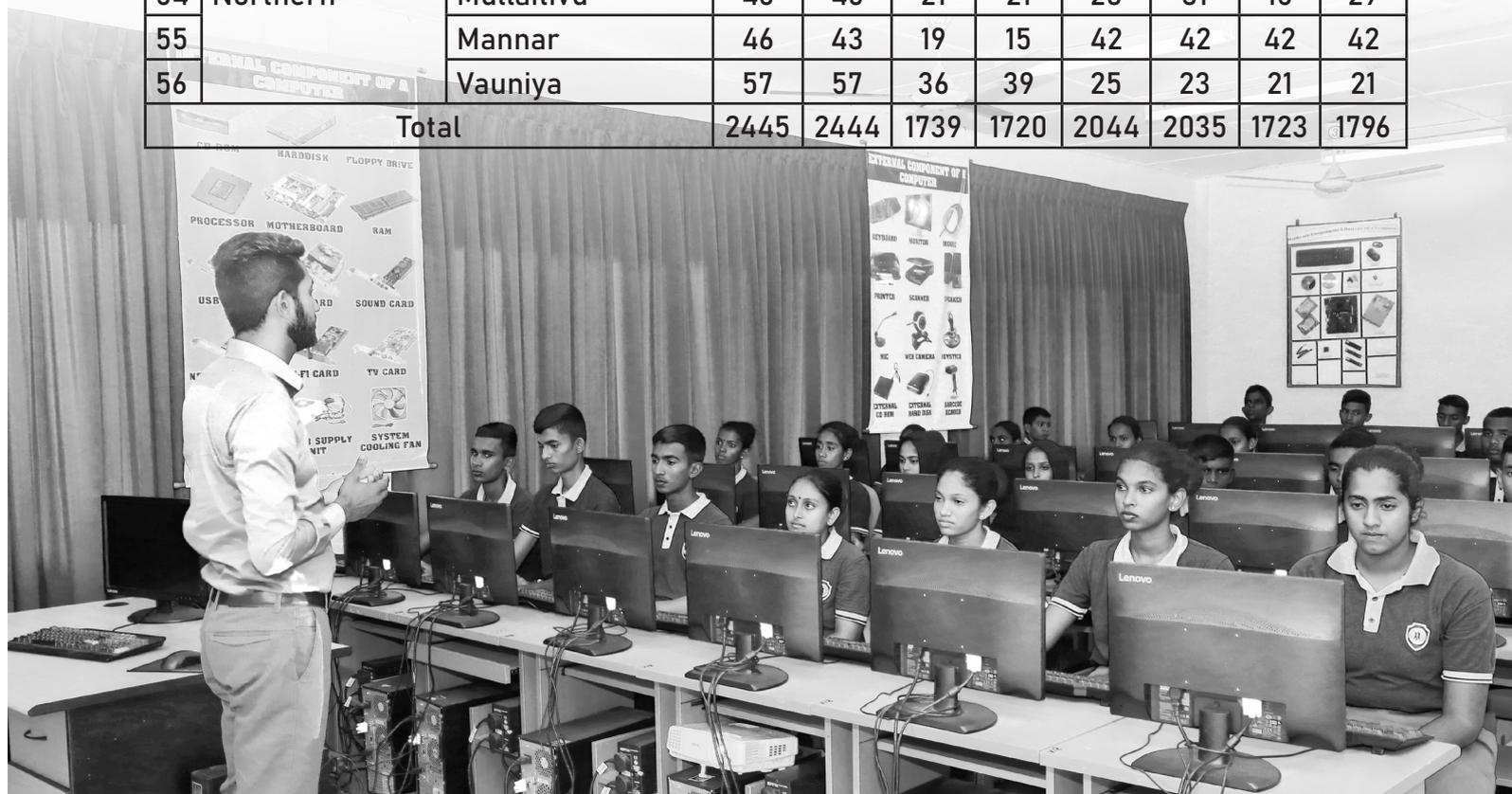
4.2 Advanced Certificate Course in Information Technology and English

Young male and female cadets completing life skills training who are interested in English and Information Technology can enroll in the Advanced Certificate in Information Technology and English course. This six-month course is conducted in collaboration with the Sri Lanka International Buddhist Academy approved by the University Grants Commission.

At the end of the course, two separate certificates are awarded for the subject of English and the subject of Information Technology, and the course has been designed in such a manner that those who successfully complete the course can proceed to the diploma course, the advanced diploma course and the graduate course for those who have passed 03 Advanced Level subjects.

4.3 Referrals to Vocational Training – Young Male and Female Cadets

Apart from basic life skills, the life skills based on professional skills can be identified and there are also skills that are unique to each profession. And the professionals who are sent for foreign jobs should also be given familiarity with the life skills specific to each country. It is important to pay attention to it in vocational education and job training as well. A person will also need those unique life skills to boost efficiency and effectiveness in his or her respective profession. Particularly important in this regard are effective communication and interpersonal skills, leadership ability, problem solving, work ethics, time management and team spirit.

The trainees who successfully complete the six-month training will be directed to the vocational training courses under the following professional fields handled by the recognized vocational education institutes of the public and private sector selected according to their professional interest and the capabilities they have at present. The hitherto existed method of paying a sum amounting to Rs. 10,000 as course fees paid to the trainees by the National Youth Corps saw a revision to pay out a maximum sum of Rs. 100,000 per trainee after having selected 30 persons from each of the training center for the purpose of referring them to follow vocational training courses on full-time scholarships with effect from the Phase I in 2021. The rest of the male and female trainees are directed to the charge free vocational training courses of their choice, laying the necessary basic foundation for them to find the way forward to their future professional field.

In the same vein, the National Youth Corps continues to monitor the progress of the trainees whilst their vocational training courses are in motion and carries on with the task of guiding them through to suitable employment opportunities.

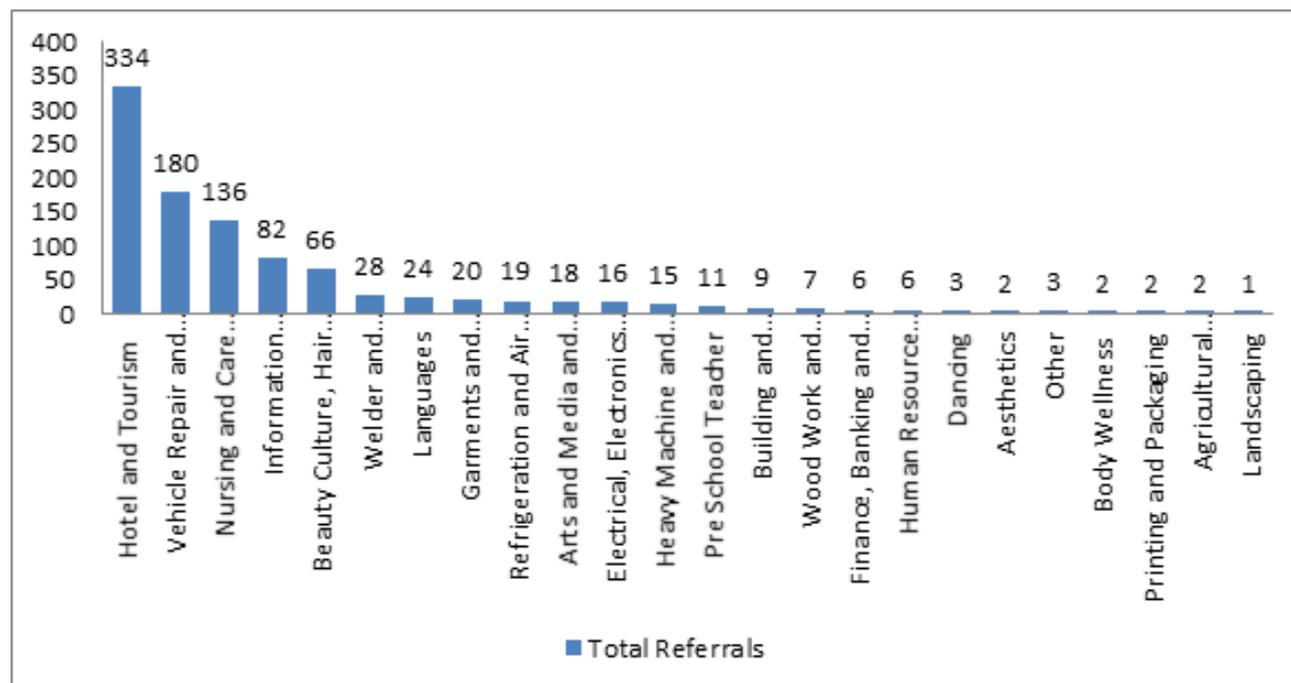

5 Vocational Training Courses Conducted by the Youth Corps

5.1 Hotel Training School - Dambulla

The hotel sector fulfils a great responsibility towards the advancement of the tourism industry. Moreover, the number of local and foreign job opportunities generated by this sector is also of very high proportion. Professionals with proper training and education should enter the hotel industry in order to carry out that duty in a proper manner and to make use of this sector for the development of the country. In that task, the role of a hotel school is very important.

The Hotel Training School of the National Youth Corps in the year 2014 gets off the ground with the prime objective of becoming the best hotel training school in Sri Lanka that provides hospitality services in the field of hotel training courses. Among the other objectives of establishing this hotel training school is to open up the opportunities to provide professional training qualification immediately after the completion of the basic course for the professional success of the trainees undergoing the basic training in the National Youth Corps and also, directly cater to the labor market young hands with practically proficient.

The youth who are directly entering the National Youth Corps training centers and the youth who wish to join in the hotel industry straight away are going under the wings of the Hotel Training School. This Hotel Training School has produced around 1500 perfect professionals for the hotel industry from the year 2014 up until now.

Two batches are admitted to the Hotel Training School of the National Youth Corps annually for training, and the following courses in the hotel industry (05) are operational under this training. From the second phase of the year 2022, the Assistant Bungalow Keeper Course got underway for the purpose of providing special training on all aspects required to work and manage as keepers or caretakers of the local and foreign bungalows.

01. Pastry & Bakery - NVQ Level IV
02. International Cookery - NVQ Level IV
03. Food & Beverage Serving - NVQ Level IV
04. House Keeping - NVQ Level III
05. Front Office - NVQ Level IV
06. Assistant Bungalow Keeper - NVQ Level III



Training in brief

The above training courses are National Vocational Qualifications at the level of (NVQ) III and IV and this hotel training institute has the capacity to provide training to 200 trainees at a time.

This training school is equipped with all the modern facilities required for a hotel training school and training is provided by a panel of qualified and skilled instructors in the hotel industry.

In this exercise herein, recruitment is done through a proper advertising channels and no fees are charged for the courses. Accommodation facilities will also be provided during the training period. After the industry-related training, all male and female trainees will have the opportunity for securing recognized jobs in the tourism hotel sector in the country with the National Vocational Qualifications (NVQ III and IV) in their possession.

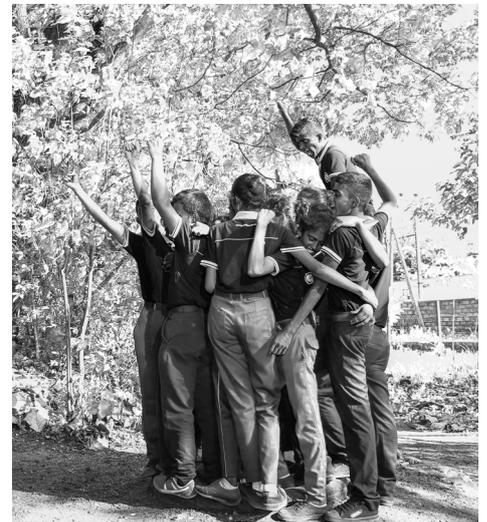


5.2 Outbound Adventure-based Training Center - Naula

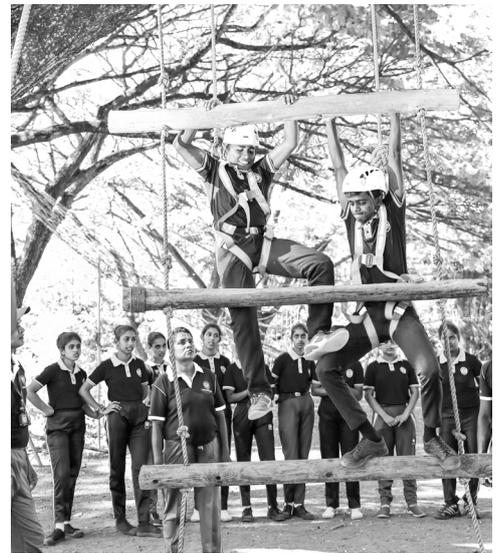

5.3 Yakkala Aesthetic Training Center

This course has been set in motion with the aim of identifying young people scattered all over the island who are talented in music and dance, developing their talents so that they are able to move up to the national and international level thereby producing talented artists. Courses implemented in this exercise are as follows:

- Higher National Diploma Course in Dancing and Drumming
- Certificate Course in Music

The Course leading to the Higher National Diploma in Dancing and Drumming which is set to be launched with the aim of producing a person equipped with a comprehensive knowledge of dancing, is a two-year course with NVQ Level – 6 qualification. The Course is conducted by the expert dancing teachers of the island. The tasks herein undertaken involve the provision of wide knowledge of indigenous dancing traditions as well as western dancing traditions, opening up of space for social media, media organizations and other performing activities through group dancing, exposure of the trainees for local and foreign exams and the provision of facilities necessary towards that end.

The Certificate Course in Music is a one-year course with NVQ Level – 4 entitlement. This Course will be conducted by the expert musicians, artistes and teachers of the island. The tasks herein undertaken involve the provision of extensive knowledge in the fields of Indian music, western music, applied music, dancing techniques and group music, opening up opportunities for social media, media organizations and other performing activities through group music, exposure of the trainees for examinations and the provision of facilities necessary towards that end.



5.4 Courses of Language Training

Making available 2000 trainees or thereabout annually by way of providing the language training (Chinese, Japanese and Korean) and developing the skills of young men and women with the expectation of producing trained labor for overseas employment opportunities assumes a major place among the strategic plans of the National Youth Corps.

Accordingly, these language courses are being implemented with the participation of youth corps trainees as well as external parties. The teaching activities of these courses are conducted in 14 Training Centers of the National Youth Corps and the said languages are taught by the expert instructors in Chinese, Japanese and Korean languages.

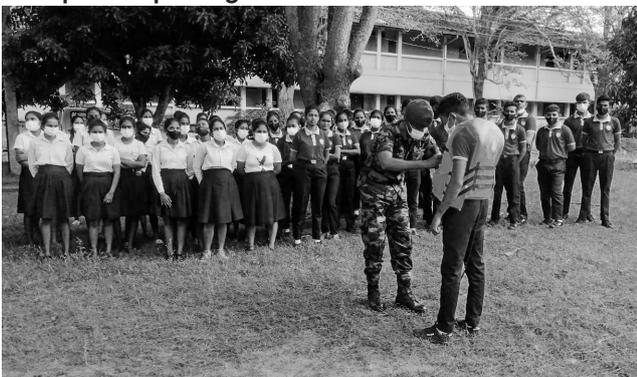

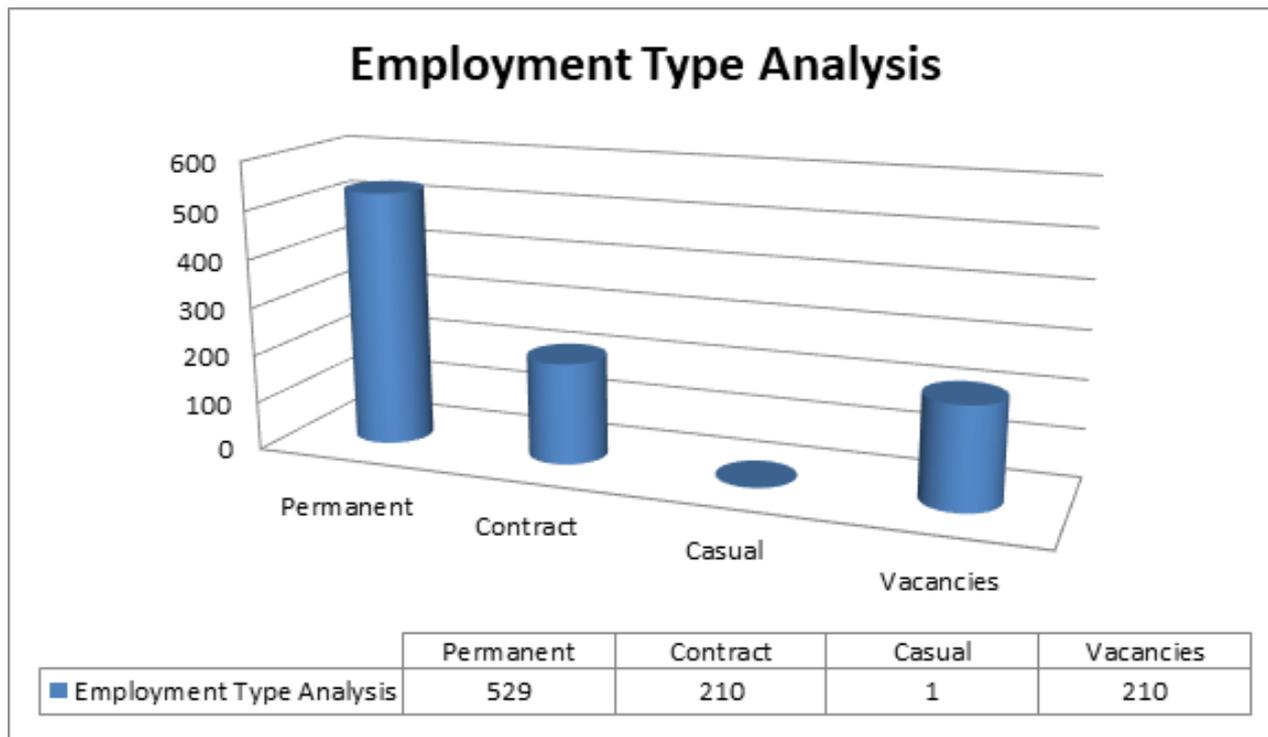

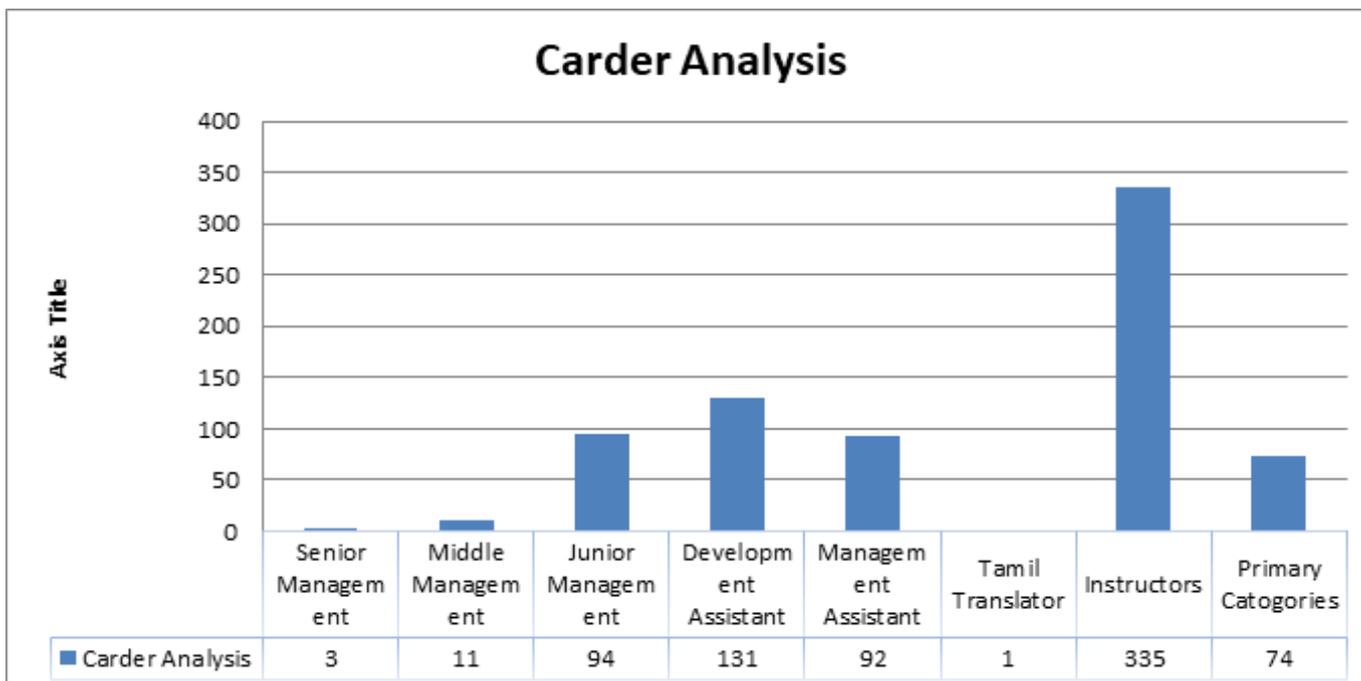

The Youth Corps, which is an organization that conducts courses for youth development, consists of a trained panel of personnel and an administrative staff. Training of trainers is undertaken on a regular basis in order to maintain and improve the quality of the training courses. Moreover, various training programs have been conducted to train the management staff to maintain the administration of the institution in an orderly, streamlined and efficient manner.

Accordingly, a capacity development training program for newly appointed Development Officers has been implemented in Hambantota district and 10 scholarships have been awarded to 10 members of the staff. Three training programs have been undertaken for the purpose of training trainers as well whilst spending 2958 human days of training.

Furthermore, a six-day seminar series on Sri Lankan Accounting Standards, a workshop on career counseling and positive guidance, a residential training workshop on skill development and a workshop on discipline and office etiquette for drivers and office assistants have been conducted.

In 2022, the National Youth Corps was also able to lay claim on the following achievements in the training programs of staffs and instructors.

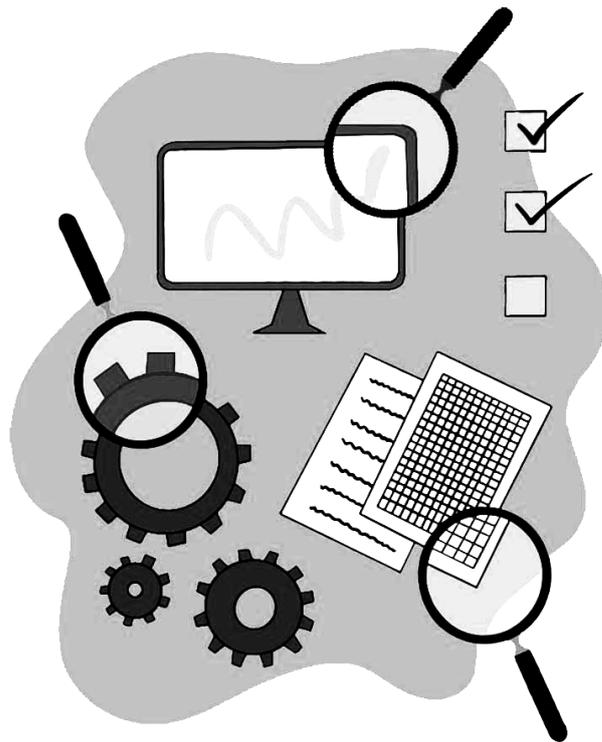
- 14 life skills instructors participated in the psycho-counseling certificate course conducted by the National Authority on Tobacco and Alcohol (NAITA) and among the lot, the National Youth Corps emerged as winners, securing the first place in the island.
- The National Youth Corps had the opportunity for representing the CERTs 2022 International Tournament on Disaster Management held in Pakistan.
- The participation of an officer representing the National Youth Corps in the 'Program for Enhancement of Emergency Response (Peer) in South Asia (Master Instructor) held in Thailand.

7.4 Legal Division

This Division, with the assistance from its respective staffs carry out its duties such as the convening of the Youth Corps Council, the tabling of the council papers presented by the respective Divisions to the Council, forwarding the decisions made by the Council on the papers approved by it to the relevant Divisions and the officers concerned, attending to coordination work of all Council members including the taking up of minutes of the Council meetings and attending to all legal and judicial matters and appearing on behalf of the Youth Corps in such cases under the direct supervision of the Director of the Youth Corps.

7.5 Internal Audit Division

The Internal Audit Division, consisting of a staff under the Internal Audit Officer, is in operation under the direct supervision of the Director of the National Youth Corps and the respective audits are carried out by this Division at the Youth Corps Headquarters and all training centers and the audit queries arising from such audits are duly raised wherever necessary.



8 Social Empowerment Programs

The National Youth Corps, being in the forefront of advocating the objectives of widening the range of experience of the trainees, developing good attitudes in the young cadets, enhancing the sense of pride of the labour, developing the sense of patriotism, building a good social relationship in them and also for them to gain practical experience of interpersonal and inter-institutional relations, build human and social sensitivity, etc., sets in motion a host of social empowerment programmes towards that end.

'Senehe Piyasa' Housing Project

The 'Senehe Piyasa' housing project has been implemented under the Community Development Program with the aim of gifting the society a sensitive generation of youth by imparting an understanding about the needs of others by getting the young trainees engaged in a mission of building a house for the sake of the poor, low-income or disabled families due to various reasons who find it impossible to afford a need of a house by themselves alone.

Construction of 55 new houses, one house each from one training centre will be undertaken under this initiative. This project is an exercise the young cadets themselves engage in overseeing its planning and putting into practice and this whole effort envisages the establishment of a sort of intended experience expected of it in the minds of young cadets.

With a view to fulfilling our social obligation for making room for the survival of every living being around us in our environment within the context of building the soft skills in the youthfulness in a gesture of kindness and compassion towards animals, the National Youth Corps centres across the island, in a special humanitarian program to quell the hunger of those animals close to us, including the street dogs, who are helpless due to lack of food on a daily basis, set in motion the 'Sathva Mithuru Sathkara' animal friendly programme as a humanitarian campaign. This was a project open to the trainees of all centres throughout the island, past trainees of the Youth Corps as well as the staff members of every centre.



"Y - Green" Youth Home Garden Cultivation Project

The "Y - Green" Home Garden Cultivation Project was launched as an active national agri-entrepreneurial youth home garden cultivation drive in a manner that will be beneficial to



the day to day life of the young men and women linked to the National Youth Corps with a view to making a contribution by them to accomplish the food security situation in the country.

General Policies

1.Assets and Base of their valuation

1.1 Cash and Cash Equivalent

Cash and short-term deposits in the Statement of Financial Position comprise cash at banks, and on hand and short –term deposits with a maturity of three or less. Cash and cash equivalents in the cash flow statement comprise cash and short - term deposits as defined above, net of outstanding bank overdrafts.

1.2 Short Term Investment

Short term investment comprises of short term deposits held in commercial banks with a maturity of three or less. The interest income of the deposit is credited to the respective fund which is invested.

1.3 Receivables

Receivables are stated at the amounts they are estimated to realize, net of provisions for bad and doubtful receivables.

1.4 Capital Work - in progress

Work in progress of the projects are carried at cost.

1.5 Property, Plant and Equipment

National Youth Corps prepared financial statements on year 2015 onwards. Assets were revalued by the committee appointed by the Ministry of National Policies & Economic Affairs base on the recommendation of the council of NYC since the value of the assets have not been previously accounted.

Buildings accommodate by the NYC have not been revalued since the title of those lands were not belong to the NYC. The construction cost incurred from 2011 onwards has been depreciated at the rate of 5% since those constructions were based on capital funds released by the treasury. The vehicles are not belonging to the NYC except three wheelers but all have been depreciated at the rate of 20%.

NYC applies cost model to Property, Plant and Equipment and records at cost of purchase or construction together with any incidental expenses thereon less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment loss. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to the statement of financial performance during the financial period in which they are incurred.

Where item of Property, Plant and Equipment are fully depreciated, the entire class of asset is revalued by considering the fair value changes in the asset or reviewing the life time of the asset and adjusting in accordance with the SLIPSAS 03 “Accounting policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors.”

Where item of Property, Plant and Equipment is revalued the entire class of such assets is revalued. Any revaluation surplus is recognized in Other Comprehensive Income and accumulated in equity in the Asset Revaluation Reserve, except to the extent that it reverses a revaluation decrease of the same asset previously recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss, in which case the increase is recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss. A revaluation deficit is recognized in the Statement of Profit or Loss, except to the extent that it offsets an existing surplus on the same asset recognized in the asset revaluation reserve.

Accumulated depreciation as at the revaluation date is eliminated against the gross carrying amount of the asset and the net amount is restated to the revalued amount of the asset. Upon disposal, any revaluation reserve relating to the particular asset being sold is transferred to retained earnings.

Depreciation

Depreciation on assets is calculated using straight-line method to allocate their cost or revalued amount over their estimated useful lives, as follows:

The depreciation on Property, Plant and Equipment begins from the year in which the assets were purchased or constructed and no depreciation is charged in the year of disposal.

1.6 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets acquired by the entity are initially recognized at cost less accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment losses. Depreciation on intangible assets is calculated using straight –line method at a rate of 25% over their estimated useful lives.

2. Liabilities and Provisions

2.1 Current Liabilities

A liability is considered as current when it is expected to be settled in normal operating cycle and due to be settled within twelve months after the reporting period or there is no unconditional right to defer the settlement of liability for at least twelve months after the reporting period

2.2 Employee Benefit Obligation

Defined Contribution Plans - Employees' Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund

Employees are eligible for Employees' Provident Fund Contributions and Employees' Trust Fund Contributions in line with the respective statutes and regulations. NYC contributes 12% and 3% of gross emoluments of employees to Employees' Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund respectively.

2.3 Government Grants and Subsidies.

Government grants are accounted on receipt basis. Grant related to recurrent expenditure is credited to the Statement of Financial Performance under the operating revenue. Capital grant is credited to the Differed Income Capital grant and Capital grant is differed and recognized in a statement of financial performance on a systematic basis over the useful life of the asset.

3. Revenue and Expense Recognition

3.1 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the entity, and the revenue and associated costs incurred or to be incurred can be reliably measured. Revenue is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

3.2 Expenditure Recognition

All the expenses related to the financial year in the form of outflows or consumption of assets or incurrences of liabilities are recognized on accrual basis in the Statement of Financial Performance.

Auditor General's Report in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 on the financial statements and other legal and regulatory requirements for the year ended 31st December 2022 of the National Youth Corps

1. Financial Statements

1.1 Qualified Opinion

The audit of the financial statements of the National Youth Corps for the year ended 31 December 2022 comprising the statement of financial position as at 31 December 2022 and the statement of financial performance and the statement of changes in net assets for the year then ended and also, the cash flow statement, the notes to financial statements and the summary of significant accounting policies for the year then ended was carried out under my direction in pursuance of provisions in Article 154 (1) of the Constitution of the Democratic Socialist Republic of Sri Lanka read with the provisions of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 and the Finance Act, No. 38 of 1971. My report will be tabled in due course in Parliament in terms of Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

I am of the opinion that, except for the effects of the matters described in the Qualified Opinion section of my report, the accompanying financial statements give a true and fair view of the financial position of the National Youth Corps as at 31 December 2022, and of its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards.

1.2 Basis for the Qualified Opinion

- (a) Even though, in accordance with the paragraph 65 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 07, the residual value and the effective life span of an asset should be reviewed at least at the end of each annual reporting period, action had not been taken to adjust the estimate of the effective life span of 05 items of the assets still in use following their full depreciation amounting to Rs. 333,349,252 million in the accounts as at 31 December 2022, after having them subject to revaluation.
- (b) Even though, in accordance with the paragraph 69 of Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 07, the depreciation was stated to have been calculated from the date when the non-current assets became apt for use, a sum amounting to Rs. 37,812,139 had been over-depreciated due to the fact that the non-current assets acquired by the Corps during the year under review were depreciated for the whole of the year.
- (c) Even though, in accordance with the paragraph 49 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 07, when an item of property, plant and equipment is revalued, the class of property, plant and equipment to which such asset belongs should be subject to revaluation as a whole in its entirety, the Corps had not revalued 03 motor cars owned by the institution at the time of the revaluation of the motor cars during the year 2022. The allocation of cost and accumulated depreciation in respect of these 03 vehicles which were not revalued had been adjusted to the revaluation account.
- (d) In the financial statements, the amount of depreciation worth Rs. 391,413 in respect of the year 2022 in the calculation of profit made due to the execution of the revaluation of the institution's vehicles on 31 December 2022 had been understated whilst the amount of depreciation worth Rs. 19,401,587 due to the calculation of vehicle depreciation for the whole year based on the revalued value had been overstated.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Sri Lanka Auditing Standards (SLAuSs). My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my qualified opinion.

1.3 Other information contained in the 2022 Annual Report of the Corps

The 'other information' means the information included in the 2022 Annual Report of the National Youth Corps that is expected to be given to me after the date of this audit, but, not included in the financial statements and my audit report in that respect. The management is responsible for this other information.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information and I, in any manner, do not guarantee or make any statement on them.

My responsibility on the audit of the financial statements is to read the above mentioned other information when they are made available and to consider if such other information is significantly inconsistent with the financial statements or the knowledge I obtained during the course of the audit or otherwise.

When reading the 2022 Annual Report of the Corps, if I conclude that there are significant misrepresentations, such matters should be communicated to the governing parties for correction. If there exist further uncorrected misrepresentations, they will be included in the report that will be tabled in due course in Parliament in terms of Article 154 (6) of the Constitution.

1.4 Responsibilities of the management and those parties charged with governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation of financial statements that give a true and fair view in accordance with Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards, and for such internal control as management determine is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the ability of the Corps to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intend to liquidate the fund or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those parties charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the financial reporting process of the Corps.

As per sub section 16 (1) of the National Audit Act No. 19 of 2018, the corps is required to maintain proper books and records of all its income, expenditure, assets and liabilities, to enable annual and periodic financial statements to be prepared of the Corps.

1.5 Responsibility of the auditor in the audit of Financial Statements

My objective as a whole is to provide a reasonable assurance that the financial statements are free from frauds and errors that occurred due to inaccurate false statements and to release the auditor's report along with my opinion. While fair assurance is a high-level guarantee, it may not always be an assurance that the auditing in accordance with Sri Lanka Audit Standards will always detect incorrect substantial errors. Frauds and errors are likely to result in substantial disclosures, either due to individual or collective effects, and the substantiality of it may depend on the impact of the economic decisions made by the users, based on these financial statements.

The audit was carried out by me with professional judgment and professional skepticism in keeping with the Sri Lanka Audit Standards. And, I further,

- Designed and implemented audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances in identifying and assessing the risks of material misstatements that could result in the financial statements owing to frauds and errors, in setting up a basis for the audit opinion that was expressed. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is more severe than that caused by the reasons such as material misstatements resulting from the erroneous recording and collusion, preparation of forged documents, intentional omissions or the override of internal controls.

- Acquired an understanding on the internal control relevant to the audit of the Corps in order to design circumstantially suitable audit procedures, even though it was not with the intention of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of such internal control.

- Evaluated the suitability of the accounting policies used, the reasonableness of the accounting estimates and the related disclosures made by the management.

- Concluded on the relevance of applying the going concern basis of the entity's sustainability for accounting purposes based on the audit evidence acquired as to whether there exists a substantial uncertainty on the sustainability of the National Youth Corps due to events or conditions. In case I determine that such uncertainty exists, my report should pay attention to the disclosures regarding the financial statements and if those disclosures are not sufficient, my opinion must be modified. However, continued sustainability may cease to exist due to future events or conditions.

- Evaluated the fact that the transactions and events underlying the structure and content of

the financial statements have been incorporated in a reasonable and fair manner and the overall presentation of the financial statements including disclosures.

The governing parties concerned will be made aware of the significant audit findings, major weaknesses of the internal controls and other matters identified during the course of my audit.

2. Report on Other Legal and Regulatory Requirements

2.1 National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 contains special provisions relating to the following requirements.

2.1.1 In accordance with the requirements set out in Section 12 (a) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018, I have, except for the observations made in the Qualified Opinion section of my report, obtained all the information and explanations required for the audit and as was evident according to my investigation, the Corps had continued to maintain proper financial records.

2.1.2 The financial statements presented by the Corps in accordance with the requirements of Section 6 (1) (d) (iii) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 are consistent with the previous year.

2.1.3 The recommendations I made in the previous year, excluding the observations made in the Basis for the Qualified Opinion section of my report, have been included in the financial statements submitted in accordance with the requirement of Section 6 (i) (d) (iv) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2 In terms of the measures adopted and the amount of evidence that was obtained and within the limitation confined to material considerations, nothing met with my attention as to make the following statements.

2.2.1 That any member of the governing body of the Corps has any direct or indirect interest in any contract entered into by the Corps which is out of the normal cause of business as per the requirement of section 12 (d) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2.2 That the Corps has not acted in a manner inconsistent with any applicable written law, general and special directions issued by the governing body of the Corps as per the requirement of section 12 (f) of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018.

2.2.3 That the Corps has performed in a manner inconsistent with its powers, functions and duties as per the requirement of section 12 (g) of the National Audit Act, 2018.

2.2.4 That the resources of the Corps had not been procured and utilized economically, efficiently and effectively within the time frames and in compliance with the applicable laws as per the requirement of section 12 (h) of the National Audit Act.

3. Other Matters

(a) Out of the Corps owned 65 lands where the training centres have been established as at 31 December 2022, only 22 lands had been acquired to the Corps and the acquisition of the remaining 43 lands had not been finalized up until this point of time.

(b) Even though a new Act should be passed after rescinding the existing Youth Corps Act in order to carry out the work of empowering the community of youth in the country even better and more effectively, according to the Cabinet Decision dated 15 December 2011, action had not been taken in that regard in pursuance of such Cabinet Decision despite a period of more than 11 years had lapsed.

(c) The overpaid sum amounting to Rs. 1,976,042 and the receivable contract advances amounting to Rs. 119,664,051 between 2 and 5 years old in respect of the construction of the Wennappuwa training center, work of which had been completed on 21 August 2018, had not been recovered so far.

(d) Between the periods of 02 to 09 year ranges, the retained money amounting to Rs. 1,162,513 had been shown in the financial statements of the year under review without being settled up.

(e) There was an advance balance totaling Rs. 60,625,716 which was the sum paid to the contractors during the years 2016 - 2017 in relation to 5 training centers whose construction work has been stopped. Even though these contracts were canceled from the periods between 02 and 06 years, the Corps had not taken steps to recover such advances so far.

(f) In the year 2016, the Cabinet of Ministers had approved the construction of 10 new training centers and 21 building units of the existing centers by a government agency outside of the open tender procedure. Due to the setbacks of related construction progress, these contracts had been canceled in pursuance of the decision of the Cabinet of Ministers in the year 2022. Even though, a sum amounting to Rs. 71,618,995 out of the advance amount of Rs. 109,234,674 given for the construction work had remained settled in 2016 and 2017, the Corps had failed to recover the yet outstanding advance amount worth Rs. 37,615,680 in spite of the lapse of more than 03 years since the cancellation of the construction work concerned.

(g) In the year 2022, the Corps had been provided with an additional allocation of Rs. 90 million for the purpose of directing the young men and women for employment based on their skills. Towards that end, the institution had drawn out plans for the implementation of a job-oriented training program consisting of 16 courses for 4499 trainees by 07 private vocational training institutes. However, in the implementation of the training activities, there were 2 courses that were run by the institution included in its action plan of the respective year and a sum amounting to Rs. 25.8 million had been spent for these courses from the said provision. Even though, an online training course had been conducted for 1392 trainees at a cost of Rs. 1.6 million, the institution had no data in its possession about the progress of the trainees. The institution had feedback data of only 723 trainees. Of these, only 712 Vocational Training Qualification (NVQ) certificates had been issued so far. As such, the training activities conducted with the aim of providing a new job based on the skill, had not achieved adequate performance during the year under review.

(h) As of 31 December, 2022, there were 950 approved cadre and 743 actual staff in the Corps thereby resulting in 207 vacancies of officers. Among those vacancies, there were 117 vacancies in the post of instructor, which, in the main, has a high impact on the desired objectives and performance of the National Youth Corps.

Auditor General's Report in terms of Section 12 of the National Audit Act, No. 19 of 2018 on the financial statements and other legal and regulatory requirements for the year ended 31st December 2021 of the National Youth Corps

01. Financial Statements

- 1.1 Opinion
- 1.2 Comments on the Financial Statements

(a) Deviation from the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standards

(i) It is admitted that action has not been taken by the National Youth Corps to review the assets of the institution having the value of an asset depreciated by reducing the residual value and life span of it at the end of every year despite the fact it is so required in accordance with Paragraph 65 of the Sri Lanka Public Sector Accounting Standard No. 07. However, the revaluation of musical instruments and motor vehicles has accordingly been carried out and the relevant adjustments have been made in the annual financial statements for the year 2022 as of now.

Likewise, revaluation of computer equipment is currently being undertaken, and in the ensuing year, I will take action to subject other items as well to revaluation and make relevant adjustments.

(ii) The National Youth Corps maintains an asset register using excel software. As a large number of assets was purchased for the new centers and the centers then existed under the pilot project during the years 2016 and 2017, it was found to be

practically problematic to so compute the depreciation from the date of use of the asset separately for each item of such asset by way of the software.

Due to this, disclosures were made in the accounting policies of the statements of accounts to provide for depreciation for the full year related to the date on which an asset becomes apt for use and not to give effect to depreciation for the year in respect of which it is removed. The relevant provisions for depreciation are made accordingly and, in the future, it is planned out to enter the related data to the fixed assets module of the currently used accounting system, thereby making an effort to rectify the issue.

(iii) 80 of the 83 vehicles owned by the National Youth Corps have been revalued, and at the time of the revaluation of the vehicles at the headquarters (the numbers of such vehicles bearing Nos. 03 - PD 6147, PC - 1157, GC - 1157 as indicated in the audit query should read correctly as follows.), the vehicles bearing Nos. PD - 6147, PC - 1157 and GC - 9245 were assigned for essential duties of the Youth Corps and could not therefore be revalued together at the same time where the respective inspector of motor vehicles informed that it would be done at a later date. On inquiry on a later date, it was advised that another inspector of motor vehicles be appointed as the said inspector of motor vehicles has been transferred from the Narahenpita office. Accordingly, another inspector of motor vehicles has been nominated and available for the revaluation of the aforesaid 03 vehicles. As such, the revaluation concerned is due to take place on 26 May 2023, and I will take action to get the revaluation done and show it in the accounts for the year 2023.

Furthermore, I accept that the cost and accumulated depreciation provisions related to those 03 vehicles which were not subject to revaluation have been adjusted to the revaluation account. Action will be taken to correct it in the accounts for the year 2023.

(b) The National Youth Corps maintains a fixed asset register using Excel software, and due to the purchase of a large amount of fixed assets under the pilot project during the years 2016 - 2018, practical difficulties arose to the said register being updated. However, those assets are currently being revalued and the assets register updated.

(c) As all the payments related to the construction work of Training Center in Monaragala from among the work items herein shown have been settled up by the year 2023, the values concerned will be capitalized during this year. As the construction of the Naula (ABT) training center still continues to be operative, it is accounted for as work in progress. However, the construction work at Tissamaharamaya, Lunugamwehera and Dehiattakandiya training centers was carried out by NEMO, and as the final bills have not been submitted for payment as yet, it needs to be shown further as work in progress.

(d) The construction work of the training centers referred to above was carried out by NEMO and the final bills have not been submitted for payment as yet, and therefore cannot be capitalized and is to be shown as work in progress.

(e) It is admitted that the revaluation profit has been decreased due to the inclusion of the repairs done to the vehicles that were not revalued and the depreciation related to the values thereof when calculating the vehicle revaluation profit at the end of the year 2022. Action will be taken to correct it in 2023.

(f) The revaluation of the vehicles was carried out on 31 December 2022 and I acknowledge that a depreciation calculation has been made for the entirety of the year. Action will be taken to rectify that error in the accounts for the year 2023.

Reference to law / direction

Observations

(i) The strategic plan for the year 2023 - 2027 has been drafted and finalized by now. The draft is to be submitted for the approval of the National Youth Corps Council and after the approval of the Council, it is to be translated into English and Tamil languages, It is scheduled to be completed by 30 July 2023.

(ii) The National Youth Corps maintains a fixed assets register using Excel software, and due to the purchase of a large amount of fixed assets under the pilot project during the years 2016 - 2018, practical difficulties arose to keep the register updated.

However, those assets are currently being revalued and the asset register updated.

(iii) Since there is no mention of these three committees in the new authority act to be amended, a council paper regarding the appointment of these 03 committees has been made to the upcoming council meeting.

(iv) (i) The Citizens / Clients Charter has now been drafted. It is expected to submit the said Charter to the National Youth Corps Council for approval, after making necessary amendments thereto.

(ii) Annual Performance Agreements for the staff are currently being signed and will be finalized soon.

(iii) I would also like to state that the responsibility of drawing out a human resource development plan, organizing capacity building programs and conducting skill development programs has been assigned to the Additional Director (Administration and Finance) of the National Youth Corps.

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(vi) The balance of gratuity payable by the Youth Corps as at 31 December 2022 has been shown as Rs. 4,883,170.00. Of that value, a sum amounting to Rs. 1,913,911.00 has been paid out as gratuity. When an officer resigns from service, the Human Resources Department will notify the officer of his entitlement to receive the gratuity. Even though such notifications were made, these payments have been further delayed due to the fact that certain officers fail to formally clearing the documents and submit necessary documentation for the purpose. Also, some officials have gone abroad now. It can also be pointed out that these circumstances too causes the payment being still delayed. I wish to further point out that the headquarters has also issued written notices to the officers who are entitled to gratuity to come forward to receive the gratuity they are entitled to.

2.2.4 (a) Management inefficiencies

(i) The number of lands where the Youth Corps training centers are situated is 62. The lands on which 22 training centers are located has been acquired by the line Ministry to which the National Youth Corps belonging. Land transfer of 02 more centers has been approved by the Commissioner General of Lands and will be taken possession of in the near future.

Apart from this, the transfer of land in 07 more centers has been recommended by the Divisional Secretaries and the Provincial Land Commissioners and submitted to the Department of the Commissioner General of Lands for which the approval of the Commissioner General of Lands will be given. Matters involving land acquisition in the remaining 31 training centers continue to be in progress. Out of these 31 centers, the lands where 09 centers are located are situated in the lands belonging to various institutions including National Housing Development Authority, Board of Investment in Sri Lanka and Kahatagaha Graphite Company. Action will be taken to take over the other lands as well, where 22 centers are located and the necessary work connected thereto is being carried out in coordination with the respective Divisional Secretaries.

(ii) The National Youth Corps Authority Act has now been completed and approved by the Attorney General and submitted to the Cabinet for approval. The Cabinet of Ministers has informed that further amendments are necessary to be incorporated in this Act, causing the approval therefor being postponed.

(iii) Recruitment and Promotion :- Newspaper, TV and Radio advertisements have been circulated for recruitment and promotion only for the first batch of 2022.

Likewise, handbills, banners and posters were not printed during the year 2022, and the activities involving the recruitment drive for the courses of training were advertised through Sri Lanka Telecom using social media in the main.

Advertising :- Due to limitations of the acquisition of assets in the year 2022 and non-receipt of cash imprest of the capital fund from the Treasury within the specific time limits in pursuance of the State Budget Circular No. 03/2022 dated 26.04.2022, the planned out procurement advertisements relating

to the purchases and works of construction were not advertised owing to the non-implementation of such activities during the year. In view of this, the physical and financial progress of the procurement process remained at a low ebb.

Sports and Special Events :- This is the money allocated for 'Paurushabhimani Programme' and as the program was scheduled to be held on 24.12.2022 at the Bandaranaike Memorial International Conference Hall (BMICH) which was reserved for the purpose, payments were made only for such reservation with the approval of the Line Ministry Secretary. But due to an unavoidable reason, the program got underway only on 17.01.2023.

(iv) Of the amount worth Rs. 43 million allocated to the Dambulla Hotel School for the year 2022, procurement requests in respect of that year have been submitted only for Rs. 31 million of the projected amount as given in details below. Accordingly, I would like to point out that the actual expenditure on food and beverages from January to December 2022 is Rs. 18,630,205.00.

A lower value in financial progress up to 43% than the estimated amount as such is because the number of trainees registered for the course was less than the projected number of trainees at the hotel school for the year 2022 and the payments for food were made only on the basis of the daily attendance of such trainees.

(v) I kindly point out that the estimated expenditure under the capital expenditure for the year 2022 is not Rs. 305.71 million but Rs. 70 million. The total estimated cost of the procurement plan is set forth by Rs. 305.71. A sum of Rs. 65.6 million was approved by the State Budget Department for capital expenditure. And also, the State Budget Department had approved only a sum amounting to Rs. 0.01 million for property, plants and equipment, even though the provision for such items was Rs. 2.00 million and, as such, the procurement process was set upon only for that purpose and payments thereon were made effective. I would also like to point out that the financial progress assumed a low value following the limitations in allocations set apart by the Department of Budget pursuant to the instructions of the State Budget Circular No. 03 /2022 dated 26.04.2022, resulting in stoppage in certain procurement activities and the deceleration of the previously awarded construction activities undertaken by the contractors owing to the circumstances of uncondusive economic situation including the excessively increased prices and the scarce supply of raw materials.

(vi) The annual subscription for the software system made available to the Accounts Division of the National Youth Corps has been recorded in the software development program vote due to an oversight. But it has been recorded as recurrent expenditure in the preparation of financial statements and the corrections required have been made. However, as a result of showing it under capital expenditure in the procurement plan, the procurement and financial progress has shown 5% less in value.

(d) Accounts Receivable and Payable

(i) In the case of the overpaid amount involving the Wennappuwa Training Center, the contractor concerned, M/s Anthony Builders, has expressed its consent in writing to pay up such overpayment to the National Youth Corps from the amount due by the 'Maga Neguma' road projects it has undertaken, and a confirmation in that regard from the said institution has also been received by the National Youth Corps through their letter dated 21.04.2023.

(ii) Out of the receivable contract advance of Rs. 121,329,423, a sum amounting to Rs. 1,665,372 has been recovered so far. I would like to inform you that the remainder of the advance of Rs. 119,664,051 to be further collected will be recovered on the completion of the relevant works of construction.

(iii) Out of the retainer of Rs. 4,541,454, a sum amounting to Rs. 1,525,218 has been paid and settled up to the relevant institutions during the year 2023. The institution involving the unfinished Dambulla Training Center whose due to be settled up retainer is worth Rs. 1,853,723 and the rest of the institutions having involvement with their retainers as well have been notified to get their retainer dues released out of the total sum of Rs. 3,016,236 that is to be further paid out to the contractors concerned, and I will take action to settle up such dues during the year 2023.

(e) Advances receivable

(i) The current progress in collecting advance payments of Rs. 62,625,716 paid out in regard to the training centers in Pelmadulla, Kotapola, Meegahakivula, Welimada and Gomarankadala whose construction work has been stopped can be shown as follows.

* Pelmadulla Training Centre

National Youth Corps Training Centers numbering 37 operating as at present under the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs were set in motion across the island at that time, and the 2016 budget proposals proposed to increase the number of such training centers to 100. Accordingly, the contract for the construction work of the Palmadulla training center has been awarded to KS Construction and Engineering (Pvt.) Limited on 12.09.2017 in accordance with the prescribed procurement procedure, for which an advance amount of Rs. 14,798,661.58 has been paid to the contracting company concerned. According to the preliminary geological survey work undertaken on the proposed Pelmadulla land by the Building Research Organization, the Department Buildings which is the consultancy service agency concerned, has informed by their letter dated 17.12.2018 that it would incur a huge expenditure for the construction of a training center of the National Youth Corps there. It has been further informed that this construction work cannot be undertaken within the provisions set aside for the purpose.

Therefore, this construction work has to be canceled and the advance amount of Rs. 14,798,661.58 paid to the relevant contracting firm should be recovered from the contractor concerned. Instructions and approval was requested by the letter dated 21.01.2019 in regard to the cancellation of these works of construction from the Additional Secretary (Youth Affairs) of the then Ministry of National Policies, Economic Affairs, Resettlement and Rehabilitation, Northern Province Development, Vocational Training, Skill Development and Youth Affairs. The said Ministry letter No. MNPEA /YAD/11/06RP/04 dated 07.02.2019 has informed the Director of Youth Corps to submit the matter before the Youth Corps Council for making a decision in that connection.

A council paper was presented in this regard, and approval was given to cancel the related works of construction by the Youth Corps Council at its meeting held on 07.08.2019. Thereafter, the construction of the proposed Pelmadulla training center was canceled and the relevant contracting agency was notified by letter No. NYC /CONST/PMD/13 dated 09.10.2019 that the advance payment be settled up forthwith.

The contract for the works of construction of the Dambulla Training Center has also been awarded to the relevant contracting agency itself, and the agreement has been expressed through the letter dated 23.01.2020 to have the relevant advance money collected when settling up the bills of the works of construction involved therein. Accordingly, at the time of the settlement of bills for the works completed in the construction of the Dambulla training center, a sum amounting to Rs. 02 million has been recovered and necessary action has been taken to collect remainder of the money as well.

* Kotapola Training Centre

National Youth Corps Training Centers numbering 37 operating as at present under the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs were set in motion across the island at that time, and the 2016 budget proposals proposed to increase the number of such training centers to 100. Accordingly, the related contract has been awarded to Ranveli Construction Company on 12.09.2017 for the construction of the Kotapola training center in accordance with the prescribed procurement procedure, and an advance payment of Rs. 17,313,228.48 has been made for that purpose.

Due to the slow and low progress of the construction work of this project, despite written and verbal notices from time to time to complete the construction work, it was not so done. Therefore, the relevant construction work was cancelled. A sum worth Rs. 5,327,435.87 for two bills submitted to this Headquarters for the construction carried out by the contractor has been retained at the Headquarters. Furthermore, an amount of Rs. 10,328,139.05 has been recovered by this Headquarters along with the money retained for the purpose of settling up bills to the relevant contracting agency. An amount of Rs. 6,985,089.43 has yet to be collected as advance money in favour of the National Youth Corps. Although the contractor was informed to settle the amount concerned, the related sum of money has not been settled up until now. Therefore, the matter has been referred to the Attorney General to take legal steps to resolve the same. Currently, further actions are being taken in this regard, and arrangements will be made to recover the relevant advance money based on the legal instructions received in the future.

* Welimada Training Centre

National Youth Corps Training Centers numbering 37 operating as at present under the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs were set in motion across the island at that time, and the 2016 budget proposals proposed to increase the number of such training centers to 100. Accordingly, the contract concerned was awarded to DKS Builders on 12.09.2017 in accordance with the prescribed procurement procedure for the construction of the Welimada Training Center and a sum amounting to Rs. 19,259,019.78 was paid as advance money. According to the preliminary geological survey work conducted by the Building Research Organization on the proposed land in Welimada, it has been suggested to redesign the plan and construct only one or two buildings (with more number of floors) that can accommodate all requirements and amenities as it will consume a considerable time for construction work, and also due to the fact that there may involve a likelihood of changes causing unstable risk factor situations in the construction of buildings owing to the location of the land and its topography as intimated by the National Building Research Organization. The Department of Buildings which is the consultancy service agency has advised by its letter No. 02-03-12-248 dated 01.08.2019 to discuss the matter over with the contracting agency and take action to cancel the said contract offered to them on this construction work.

Accordingly, by the letter No. NYC /CONST/MGK/09 dated 28.10.2019, the Additional Secretary (Youth Affairs) of the then Ministry of National Policies, Economic Affairs, Resettlement and Rehabilitation, Northern Province Development, Vocational Training, Skill Development and Youth Affairs has been apprised of it. Furthermore, by the letter No. NYC/CONST/MGK/09 dated 25.10.2019, the relevant contractor has also been informed of it and asked to pay up the advance amount to the National Youth Corps immediately and settle it. Thereafter, the relevant contracting agency has submitted bills amounting to Rs. 32,960,806.11 for their committed expenditure on the preliminary work, clearing up of the grounds, other expenses etc. they incurred before starting the construction work and the matter of such payment was referred to the Department of Buildings which is the consulting service agency for their recommendations.

Thereafter, a sum amounting to Rs. 1,227,921.86 has been recommended for the relevant committed expenditure and notified the relevant contractor of it by the letter No. 12.04.284 dated 14.12.2020 of the Department of Buildings. It has been informed by the letter dated 01.06.2021 that the relevant contractor does not agree to it and that it is necessary to get the services of an Adjudicator on the matter at issue. Accordingly, upon the agreement of both parties, the services of an Adjudicator were obtained in this regard, and according to the decision given by the Adjudicator on 28.02.2022, Rs. 1,838,630.76 should be paid to the contractor. A request was made by the letter No. DKS/HO/MGK/ADJ/007 dated 15.03.2022 stating that the contractor does not agree with that decision and the matter concerned should go to an arbitrator for its arbitration.

Currently, an arbitrator has been appointed for this purpose, and the legal proceedings in that connection are being carried out. I would like to inform you that further steps will be taken to recover the advance money paid to the relevant contracting agency, based on the decision thereon to be received in the future.

* Meegahakivula Training Centre

National Youth Corps Training Centers numbering 37 operating as at present under the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs were set in motion across the island at that time, and the 2016 budget proposals proposed to increase the number of such training centers to 100. Accordingly, the contract was awarded to DKS Builders on 12.09.2017 accordance with the prescribed procurement procedure for the works of construction of the Meegahakivula Training Center and a sum amounting to Rs. 17,097,392.48 has been paid as advance money.

The land proposed for this construction work was a steep one covered with thick thatch of bushes, and after cleaning up and preparation, it was observed that this land was a in a gravely slope terrain. Although the buildings were planned out to be constructed accordingly, it was necessary to construct retaining walls for the safety of the buildings. Since the construction of retaining walls will cost a large sums of money compared to the estimate of the project, advice was sought from the then Additional Secretary (Youth Affairs) of the Ministry of Project Management, Youth Affairs and Southern Development in relation to this construction work through the letter No. NYC /CON/2/1 dated 30.11.2018. Accordingly, the then Ministry of Buddhasasana and Religious Affairs through its letter No. MYAPSD /YAD/11/02 (Vol. ii) dated 10.12.2018, had given instructions to appoint an officer and get a report from him regarding the construction of the buildings, and to submit it to the Youth Corps Council to arrive at a decision. For that purpose, a committee consisting of 05 officers was appointed and a report obtained. A council paper was thereafter presented to the Youth Corps Council. Accordingly, approval was given to cancel the related works of construction at the Youth Corps Council meeting held on 07.08.2019.

Pursuant to such decision, the then Ministry of National Policy, Economic Affairs, Resettlement and Rehabilitation, Northern Development and Youth Affairs, by its letter No. NYC /CONST/MGK/09 dated 09.10.2019, has informed that it has decided to cancel the relevant works of construction. The contractor has been notified accordingly by letter No. NYC /CONST/MGK/09 dated 09.10.2019 to forthwith settle up the advance money paid to the relevant contracting agency by the National Youth Corps.

Thereafter, the relevant contracting agency has submitted bills amounting to Rs. 36,167,067.39 for their committed expenditure on the preliminary work, clearing up of the grounds, other expenses etc. they incurred before starting the construction work and the matter of such payment was referred to the Department of Buildings which is the consulting service agency for their recommendations.

Thereafter, a sum amounting to Rs. 1,917,428.18 has been recommended for the relevant committed expenditure and notified the relevant contractor of it by the letter No. 12.04.283 dated 20.09.2020 of the Department of Buildings. It has been informed by the letter dated 06.01.2021 that the relevant contractor does not agree to it and that it is necessary to get the services of an Adjudicator on the matter at issue. Accordingly, upon the agreement of both parties, the services of an Adjudicator were obtained in this regard, and according to the decision given by the Adjudicator on 28.02.2022, a sum amounting to Rs. 3,199,531.46 should be paid to the contractor. A request was made by the letter No. DKS /HO/MGK/ADJ/008 dated 15.03.2022 stating that the contractor does not agree with that decision either and the matter concerned should go to an arbitrator for its arbitration. Currently, an arbitrator has been appointed in this connection and legal proceedings thereon are currently being carried out and I would like to inform you that further steps will be taken to recover the advance money paid to the relevant contract agency, based on the decision to be received in the future.

* Gomarankadawala Training Centre

Prior to the construction of the National Youth Corps Training Center in Gomarankadawala, work has been started to set up a preliminary precast building for the construction of a temporary training center. While this construction work was going on, the construction work of the new training center got underway at the said premises. Therefore, the construction work of the precast building has been temporarily stopped. Furthermore, it has been identified that there are deficiencies in the preliminary bills of quantities of this construction, and although the deficiencies were planned out to be corrected and the construction works were scheduled to begin, financial provisions requested for the years 2020, 2021, 2023 were not materialized, making it impossible to commence the construction work due to non-availability of provisions for the purpose. It is expected to seek provisions for this construction for the year 2024 and if funds are provided for that year, the related construction work will be carried out and action will be taken to recover the advance money to be collected when the settlement of the bills takes place.

(ii) Due to the empowerment of the National Youth Corps, contracts had been awarded to the National Equipment and Machinery Organization (NEMO) for the construction of 10 new training centers and 21 units of building construction in the existing training centers during the years 2016 and 2014 without calling for quotations by way of a Cabinet Paper. However, due to the delay in the construction by the relevant organization, all related works of construction were canceled in the year 2020 again by way of a Cabinet Paper. As of now, a sum worth Rs. 71,618,995.00 out of the advance money paid to the said organization for this works of construction have been settled up.

The advance amount of Rs. 37,615,680.00 to be settled further will be collected during final bill settlement. In the circumstances, even though it was intimated to the Department of Buildings and the NEMO several times in writing and verbally to submit the respective payment certificates after having

computed the final bills together with the recommendation of the Department of Buildings for the purpose of the prompt settlement of the accounts, no response has been received so far despite the dispatch of repeated letters on the subject continuously. However, up until now, the relevant payment certificates have not been submitted to this Headquarters. I would like to inform you that necessary action will be taken to have the advance money promptly settled following the submission of the relevant documents through this Headquarters, after carrying out a thorough check on them.

(iii) Advance Register

As pointed in the audit query, the balance of the construction advance of the National Youth Corps in the financial statements as of 31 December 2022 has been stated as Rs. 143,033,199, but it should be corrected to indicate as Rs. 121,102,345, I would like to point out.

The National Youth Corps maintains an advance register related to each construction project in an excel software, and the information related to the construction projects such as advance payments, settlement, etc. can clearly be identified. Moreover, its hardcopy is given under Note No. 02 of the working file that was made available to your division in relation to the annual accounts for the year 2022. (I submit it again herewith as Annex 01.) I also wish to point out that the softcopy thereof has also been forwarded via the given email address for your information.

(f) Making available Interim Budgetary Provisions

(i) In pursuance of the 2022 interim budget speech for amending the Appropriation Act, No. 30 of 2021, action was taken to make provisions towards providing theoretical knowledge and training for the male and female youth in the Sri Lankan labor market, keeping in mind the objectives of directing such personnel to the jobs on the basis of their skills. Accordingly, in terms of Section 27.5 / 6 thereof, a sum amounting to Rs. 200 million was allocated for training these personnel after having selected vocational training institutes of the public sector (Youth Corps, VTA, NAITA) and the TVEC, which is the regulatory body of the vocational training sector, whose collaboration and support is vital in this aspect. Under this exercise, an allocation of Rs. 90 million was made available for the National Youth Corps in September 2022.

Even by that time, the targeted trainees were being directed for the vocational training according to the action plan drawn out by it for the aforesaid year by the National Youth Corps.

By this time, there was only a short period of 03 months available till the end of the year 2022, and it was a difficult task to achieve the goals set during that period of time, but, even in the face of the challenges, efforts required were made based on the job demand in the country, to direct the young men and women having the skills for the job market, to the job-oriented courses. Accordingly, it was decided to refer the trainees to vocational courses of training based on the following criteria:

- Should be a vocational course that can be completed in a short period of time.
- Should be a vocational training course advanced in effectiveness and efficiency.
- Should have a higher demand in the job market.
- Should be able to lead to highly paid careers.
- Should be a career field with more interest and demand among young men and women.

In the task of carrying out the procurement process approved by the Government to select as to what should be the suitable institutes for undertaking vocational training are, the procurement procedure involved is as follows:

- Appointment of Consultative Procurement Committees (duration of about 3 days)
- Drawing out specifications (duration of about 14 days)
- Preparation and publication of newspaper advertisements (duration of about 5 days)
- Calling for quotations commencement and conclusion (duration of about 21 days)
- Appointment of bid opening committees and opening of quotation papers (about 2 days) (duration of about 2 days)
- Referral to Consultative Committee and get recommendations (about 7 days) (duration of about 7 days)
- Submission of order letter (duration of about 2 days)
- Signing of Agreements (duration of about 7 days)

In the circumstances, since it is not practical to resort to such a long process in a short period of 90 days, necessary action has been taken to achieve these objectives through the 07 institutes selected by our institution through the procurement process to refer the trainees for vocational training as well as the vocational training institutes conforming to the following criteria under the approval of the Youth Corps Council.

(I) Should be a recognized institution registered with the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission (TVEC) and an institution holding NVQ qualification.

(II) Should be an institution approved by the University Grants Commission (UGC).

(III) Should be an accredited or affiliated institute with an internationally recognized institution / university.

(IV) Should be a registered institution of the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission when referring youth cadets for courses in areas where the competency standards have not been set by the Tertiary and Vocational Education Commission, or conform to the completion of I or II or III above. The selection of the 07 institutions referred to in the related audit query in keeping with the above criteria, has been made as follows:

The Advanced Certificate Course in Information Technology and the Advanced Certificate Course in English Language, jointly implemented by the National Youth Corps and the Sri Lanka International Buddhist University, were being worked off by the Youth Corps as scheduled according to the action plan of the year 2022. However, at a time of a dire situation on the backdrop the economic crisis in the country, the resultant lack of money to pay for these courses was evident and, the interim budget made it possible for the National Youth Corps to commit expenditure for the vocational training courses within 03 months from the month of September 2022.

Accordingly, among the above two courses, where the trainees undergoing the subject of Information Technology can only be directed to the vocational training to enhance their professional skills, and as such, in a situation where the fees of this course which was started on September 05 were not possible even to pay for one month, action was taken to disburse this expenditure of Rs. 15,262,500/- payable for the Information Technology Course through the aforesaid provisions, keeping in mind to safeguard the interest of the trainees in order that they can carry on with their studies uninterruptedly.

As stated above, the hotel training course, which was implemented similarly on the same line as a job-oriented course in the field of vocational training, caused to be got underway and maintained according to the action plan of the National Youth Corps for the year 2022, and for that course too, due to the prevailing situation in the country, the financial allocation was not received within the proper timelines. Furthermore, as per the institution's action plan, the job-oriented courses could not be continued due to non-receipt of the funds requested for the regular activities. On the backdrop of such a situation, the amount of Rs. 8,540,000/- required for the hotel course was disbursed through the allocated provisions through the said interim budget.

(ii) In pursuance of sections 27.1 / 27.2 of para 27 and para 28 of the 2022 interim budget speech for amending the Appropriation Act, No. 30 of 2021, opportunity was also opened up for the employed professionals with or without prior training in the field of networking under the discipline of information technology for joining in these courses in order that they can uplift their professional career path as well as get their skills of professionalism honed as a basic foundation for promotions in their respective occupations.

Accordingly, our primary objective was to build up the leeway necessary for professionals to improve their knowledge through updated information in tandem with the society of the present day context.

(iii) I would like to inform you that the National Youth Corps has already secured the feedback data of 723 out of the total of 4499 trainees referred for vocational training by the help of the interim budget and is continuing to collect the feedback information from the rest of the trainees.

The progress made in obtaining the feedback information is as follows:

It has been disclosed during the audit that only 712 out of the aforesaid 723 trainees who have submitted the feedback data in this manner have been referred to professional courses where the NVQ level certificates are obtainable. It can be pointed out that these were the 11 trainees who were referred to the Facility Management Course.

The trainees who are in pursuit of this course are given a fit and proper training in the management of electricity, refrigeration plumbing etc. and through the successful completion of the course, the path will be opened up for them to gain access into many a career opportunity that is spanning over a wide range of employable positions such as electricians, / plumbing technicians / refrigeration and air conditioning technicians / security services and maintenance services personnel.

Even though the Facility Management Course does not mean to be fetching NVQ level qualification, there is a high demand and increased salary attached to it in the job market, and as such, action has been taken to direct trainees for it.

In order to open up the opportunity for these trainees to gain access to national and international jobs, Wayamba Technical College afforded the opportunity for trainees to follow the NVQ Level 03 Refrigeration and Air Conditioning Technician Course free of charge. I would like to inform you that this NVQ Level 03 professional qualification examination is due to be held in the near future. In order to get to know of more information, I would like to append hereto the letter sent to the Wayamba Technical College inquiring about the current progress of the trainees who are following the respective course as "Annex 02".

(g) Underutilization of Assets

The hotel training school has a capacity for 400 trainees. During the year 2022, trainees numbering 371 of the total capacity were recruited for the course, of which 66 were in desertion of the training in progress. As such, a total of 305 trainees has successfully completed the course of training. Therefore, the successful completion of the hotel school training during the year 2022 is tantamount to 76 percent of the total capacity.

Due to the economic crisis in the country by the year 2023, the demand among the youth for such job-oriented courses has increased. Owing to this, in addition to the 05 hotel courses that were implemented in the year 2022, it was arranged to start the assistant bungalow keeper course as a pilot project for the year 2023.

While managing the existing physical resources, time and knowledge and imparting training to the trainees recruited for the Assistant Bungalow Keeper Course at the same time, the teaching activities on the said course are also set in motion separately, getting the trainees of the Assistant Bungalow Keeper Course together in the classrooms used for teaching the practical activities and theoretical parts of other courses of the Hotel Training School of the National Youth Corps. (Assistant Bungalow Keeper Course includes theory and practical activities covered in other hotel courses.)

In view of the facts as they are, the target number of trainees for the 05 basic hotel courses and the Assistant Bungalow Keeper Course, which will be implemented as a new course from the year 2023, is 550. Accordingly, efforts have been made use of within the resources of the existing capacity with maximum efficiency.

(h) Cadre Administration

(i) The approved cadre of the National Youth Corps as at 31/12/2022 was 950 and the actual staff was 743. It could be pointed out that the total number of vacancies is 207.

(ii) 82 Contract Staff (Including 47 Drill Instructors) and 70 Other Instructor posts (Aesthetic Instructors - 04, Tamil Language Instructors - 26, IT Instructors - 14, English Language Instructors - 20, Drill Discipline Instructors - 06) have been rendered vacant as of 31.12.2022, and it is not possible to make new recruitments for these vacancies in the backdrop of the new recruitment being suspended as at present by the Ministry of Finance in terms of the National Budget Circular No. 03 /2023 under the heading - Control over the Public Expenditure.

Nonetheless, requests have been made to the Director General of the Department of National Budget, the Secretary of the Ministry of Sports and Youth Affairs by the letter No. NYC /HR/1/12 dated 20.02.2023 and also to the Committee of Officers of the Cabinet of Ministers to review the recruitment procedure of the public service by the letter dated 28.02.2023 seeking necessary approval at least for the recruitment of essentially required vacancies to be filled or to make new recruitments to all existing vacancies with a view to carrying on of an uninterrupted training center activities and also for the sake of the continuance of the quality of the courses of training. Once the approval to make new recruitments is received, action will be taken to fill these vacancies along with other vacant positions.
